# Butt Out Smoking Fires

**Smoking is the #1 cause of fatal home fires in Ontario.**

**Alcohol is a factor in many smoking related fires.**

## How do I prevent a smoking fire?

- **To prevent smoking fires, you must be alert.** You will not be alert if you are sleepy, have consumed alcohol, drugs or medicine that makes you drowsy.
- **Never smoke in bed.**



- If people have been smoking in your home, **check behind chair and sofa cushions** for cigarette butts before going to bed.

- Use **large deep ashtrays** that cannot be knocked over.
- Empty ashes into a **metal container—not the garbage can**—and put it outside.



- **Do not extinguish cigarettes in plant pots**, which may contain a mixture of peat moss, shredded wood and bark that can easily ignite.
- Encourage smokers to **smoke outside.**



**Install smoke and carbon monoxide alarms on every storey of your home.**

**Test them every month.**

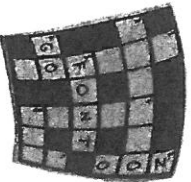
### ATV safety tips

ATV's start wildland fires every year. Debris and grass build-up on the ATV can heat up, fall off, and ignite dry grass or the forest floor. You can help reduce the risk.

**When riding your ATV in the outdoors, follow these safety tips:**

- secure dragging parts and trailer chains
- check tire pressure for exposed rims
- keep your machine clean
- maintain brakes to prevent metal-to-metal contact
- avoid operating vehicles on dry grass
- stop often to check for and remove debris build-up
- ensure that exhaust systems are free and clear of flammable material
- ensure your ATV has a proper spark arrestor
- always give time to let your machine cool
- pack a shovel, collapsible pail or fire extinguisher in case of fire

## Conserving the Forest

Conserving the Old Growth Catchacoma Forest

"Since 2019, the Wilderness Committee has worked with the Catchacoma Forest Stewardship Committee to pursue protection status for a crown forest in Peterborough County north of Catchacoma Lake. The area is home to significant old growth eastern hemlock stands as well as several species at risk, including Blanding's turtles and Algonquin wolves. Katie Krelove, the Wilderness Committee's Ontario campaigner, has sent along the following update.

"In 2021, through participation in the provincial government's forest management planning process, our committees secured a one-year moratorium on logging in Catchacoma Forest, which was recently extended to 2023.

"This allows for precious time to apply for permanent protection for this rare ecosystem through the province's Crown Land Use Planning Act. Protection status would preclude industrial activity and prioritize management for the highest level of ecological health as well as recreation, education, and research.

"In May 2022, we jumped another hurdle on the path to protection. The minister of Environment, Conservation and Parks agreed to assign biologists to evaluate the conservation values of Catchacoma Forest and report back. If that report favours protection, it will trigger public consultations on management plans going forward.

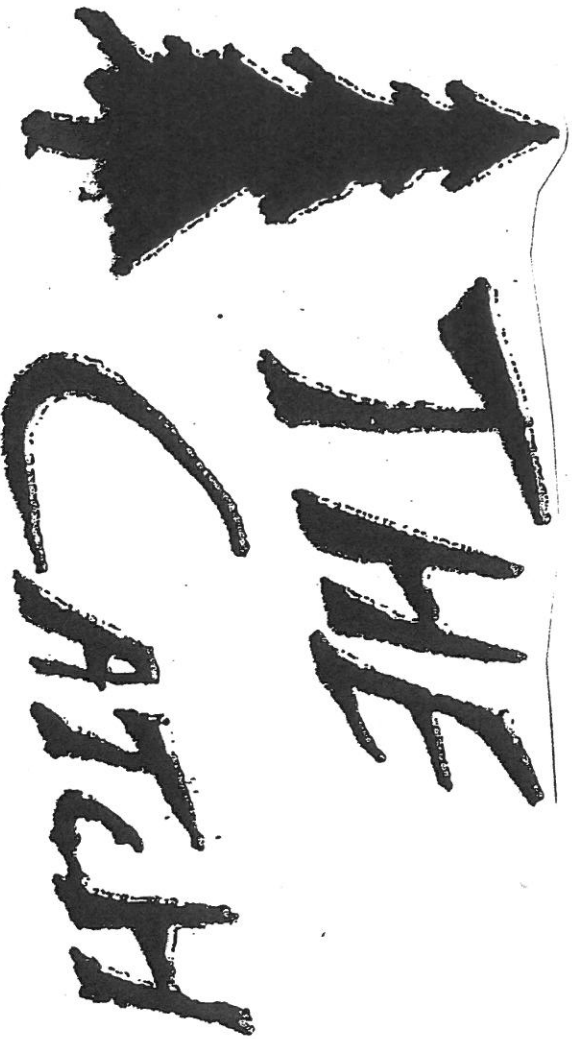
"This represents an amazing opportunity to add to Ontario's network of protected places toward achieving the federal commitment of protecting 30 per cent of Canada's lands and oceans by 2030. Meanwhile, we are continuing our own research, with two summer students hired to do various ecological surveys this summer.

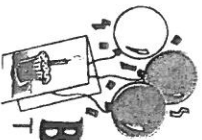

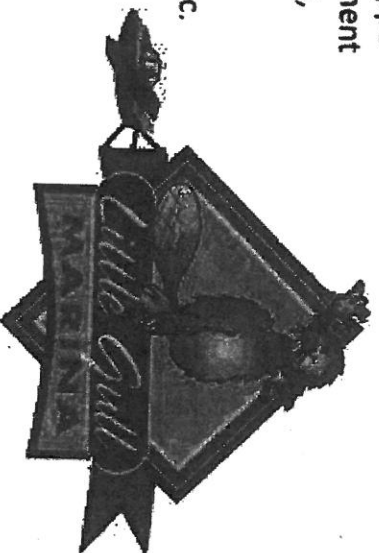

## ONE MOUNTAIN, TWO NAMES

In Canada, a great number of mountains straddle the borders of neighbouring provinces and territories. One such mountain extends into the boundary between Quebec and Newfoundland and Labrador, giving each province its highest point. Its summit lies ten metres within the territory of Newfoundland and Labrador. The mountain had no name until 1971, when the Quebec government proclaimed it Mont d'Iberville. The designation was ignored by Newfoundland and Labrador and, ten years later, the province named their side Mount Gaudvik. Even to this day, the name evidently depends on which side of the border you live on.

## THE TERRITORY THAT CHANGED ITS CAPITAL

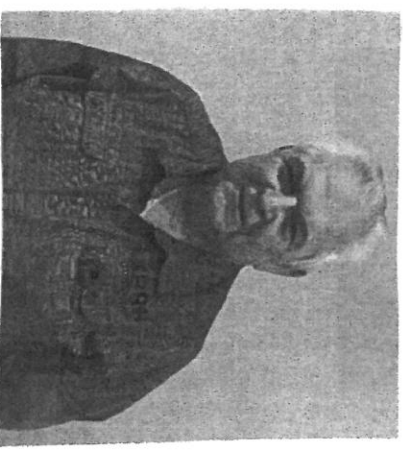
When the Yukon Territory was created in 1898, Dawson was selected to be its capital. At the height the Klondike Gold Rush, the city had 40,000 citizens, but the population decreased dramatically after the rush was over. By 1902, the population of Dawson had fallen to under 5000. In 1953, the capital was moved to the more populous city of Whitehorse. The current population of Dawson is just over 2000.

## It's a Part of Our History

Cavendish Township was not surveyed until 1861-62 when M. Lough, Provincial land Surveyor, conducted a survey of the area. His report indicates that only the south-western corner of the township is suitable for settlement purposes. Here there is deep clay-loam soils and the terrain is rolling, well-watered and free from high rock ridges. The northern part of the township contains light sandy soil which produces excellent hemlock and pine timber of considerable commercial value. The south-eastern part of the area, however, is a virtual desert of bare rock which has been burned by forest fires and is now producing inferior second-growth timber of no use to the lumberman. It should also be noted that wildlife abounds in the township and the trout and black bass can be easily caught in Gull and Catchacoma Lakes.

Despite the fact that neither Galway nor Cavendish were included among those areas opened to free homestead grants in 1868, numerous settlers have entered the township, especially Galway. In 1861, the combined population of Galway and Cavendish Townships was 352 people and 10,695 acres had been alienated for settlement purposes. Of this only 768 acres could be claimed to be under cultivation but the outright value of the total private land holdings in the townships was \$170,986. In 1871, the combined population had risen to 521 people and the total area alienated was recorded as 11,658 acres of which 3,146 were under cultivation. The population of the townships in now a mixture of Irish, Scottish, English and German stock. The predominant groups, however, are Irish of the Roman Catholic faith and Irish Protestants who are members of the Church of England.

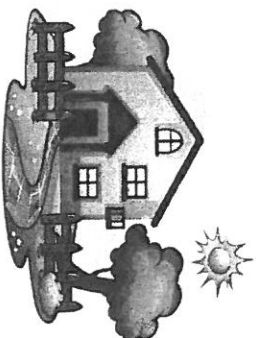

## HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- Rub the wooden handles of garden tools once in a while with a rag that has been dipped in linseed oil and you will find the shafts last longer and are much more pleasant to use.
- Soaking diamonds in club soda or ammonia will make them sparkle.
- To prevent milk from burning when boiling or scalding, put a small amount of water into the pan and heat it to boiling before adding the milk.
- Truss poultry with un-waxed dental floss – it won't burn and it is much stronger than thread.
- If you have too many berries, clean and spread out on a cookie sheet and freeze them. Than store in a freezer bag or any container until you need them.
- Store brown sugar with a slice of apple or bread to keep it soft. If it's already hard and you need some in a hurry, grate off what you need.
- Frozen bananas – make a great popsicle.
- If crackers are soggy or soft – place on a cookie sheet and bake for 2 to 3 minutes at 350 degrees F.
- For wilted lettuce or celery put in a pan of cold water and a few slices of raw potato.
- Store lettuce and celery in paper bags not plastic, they will stay fresher.

# How to prevent forest fires

Learn how to prevent fires while fishing, hunting, camping or hiking outdoors.

It's forest fire season in Ontario. If you see flames or smoke, **call 911** if you're south of the French and Mattawa rivers, or call 310-FIRE (3473) if you're north of these rivers.

**You are responsible for the fires you start.** Be careful to only start a fire when the conditions allow the fire to burn safely and remember to extinguish it correctly. If you cause a wildland fire, you could be charged under the *Forest Fires Prevention Act* (<https://www.ontario.ca/laws/statute/90f24>) and may be held responsible for the cost of putting out the fire.

Before starting a fire, remember that:

- during hot and dry weather, sparks and embers can start forest fires
- we investigate all forest fires to determine the cause

## It happened this Month....

### August

2<sup>nd</sup>, 1862 – Victoria, British Columbia, is incorporated as a city.

9<sup>th</sup>, 1988 – In a move that left hockey fans stunned, owner Peter Pocklington trades Wayne Gretzky of the Edmonton Oilers to the Los Angeles Kings for Jimmy Carson, Martin Gleinas, three first-round draft picks, and millions of dollars in cash.

13<sup>th</sup>, 1535 – the word “Canada” first appears in the journals of Jacques Cartier after he sails past Anticosti Island in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Two Aboriginal youths are said to have pointed out the route to a nearby village they called kanata (Iroquoian word for village or settlement) and Cartier adopted the name “Canada” for the entire area controlled by Chief Donnacona..

19<sup>th</sup>, 1942 – Canadian and British troops raid the French port of Dieppe. It was the first Canadian Army engagement in the war, and it was meant to test the Allies ability to launch amphibious assaults against German-controlled ports. The raid lasted only nine hours, but of the nearly five thousand Canadian soldiers involved, more than nine hundred were killed and another two thousand taken prisoner.

25<sup>th</sup>, 1873 – one of the deadliest storms ever recorded in Canada ravages the Maritimes and Newfoundland after having reached the coast of Nova Scotia the previous day. The cyclone destroyed over a thousand ships and left more than five hundred people dead.

29<sup>th</sup>, 1899 – Pioneer, author, and botanist Catharine Parr Trail dies in Lakefield, Ontario

30<sup>th</sup>, 1972 – Social worker and activist Rosemary Brown is elected to the Legislative Assembly of British Columbia, becoming the first Black woman in Canada to be a member of a Canadian legislature.

Recipe of the Month



baked carrots

Scrape and coarsely grate enough carrots to almost fill a greased casserole. Or cut carrots in dice, slivers, or fingers. Season with salt and pepper and dot with 1 or 2 tbsp butter. Add about ¼ c water, cover and bake in a moderate oven, 350°, until just crisp-tender, 30 to 50 minutes, depending on the maturity of the vegetable.

Other vegetables may be baked similarly. Try beets, parsnips, or onions. Leave small onions whole, or cut larger ones in halves or quarters.

*Note:* A pinch of herb or spice may be added to the vegetable. Carrots are good with minced chives, chopped mint or parsley, or a dash of nutmeg or cinnamon. Bake beets with a crumbled bay leaf, a few whole cloves or pinch of basil. Sage, savory, or thyme go well with onions. With parsnips, try mustard, paprika or celery salt.

# Hotter Temperatures May Increase Risk of West Nile Virus

## Residents urged to take precautions with hot weather in the forecast

With warmer weather upon us, we can expect an increase in the local mosquito population. Late July to early August is when the region will face its hottest weather of the year, averaging around 24-27°C, with risks of extreme temperatures of over 30°C. According to Public Health Ontario, warmer weather leads to more mosquitoes that can acquire West Nile Virus, increasing the chance of human exposure to the virus. Now that we have come to the hottest time of year, we should all be extra diligent in protecting ourselves.

“Research shows that when temperatures are warmer throughout the year, there is a higher frequency of mosquito pools that are positive for West Nile Virus,” said Joshua Laite, Student, Vector Borne Disease Program. “When venturing into an area with a lot of mosquitoes, keep your skin covered up as much as possible to prevent bites.”

Peterborough Public Health staff trap mosquitoes throughout the city and county from early June to late September. Since the start of trapping this year, staff have collected more than 6,000 mosquitoes for testing. To-date, no mosquito pools have tested positive for West Nile Virus. Public Health Ontario reports that in 2021 there were 105 positive mosquito pools and 23 confirmed or probable human cases of West Nile virus in Ontario. Locally, 5 human cases of West Nile virus have been reported since 2012, with the most recent case being reported in 2020. Neighbouring regions including Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge District Health Unit and Hastings Prince Edward Public Health have also reported cases in 2019 and 2020.

### How do you protect yourself?

#### Clean up:

- Always empty standing water on your property to remove the habitat where mosquitoes lay their eggs. This includes flower pots, wheel barrows, pool covers, old tires, garbage/recycling cans and other places that might inadvertently create a puddle or body of still water.
- Fill in low depressions in your lawn to prevent puddles.
- Change water in bird baths at least once a week.
- Clean out dense bushes and shrubs where mosquitoes can rest.
- Turn over compost piles on a regular basis.
- Ensure that window and door screens fit tightly and do not have holes.

#### Cover up:

- Stay indoors at dusk and dawn because mosquitoes are most active during these times.
- Use a bug repellent containing DEET, following the manufacturer’s instructions.
- Cover up with light coloured, long clothing. This includes long-sleeved shirts, long pants, and socks. Also, wear footwear that covers exposed skin.

### What are the symptoms of West Nile virus?

Approximately 80% of those infected with West Nile virus are asymptomatic (i.e. do not show any symptoms). Of the 20% that do, most experience mild illness with symptoms such as:

- Fever
- Headache
- Body aches
- Fatigue
- Skin rash
- Occasionally, vomiting and nausea

However, about 1% of those infected with West Nile virus may experience severe illness involving the central nervous system. In its most serious state, West Nile virus infection can cause an inflammation in the brain, otherwise known as encephalitis.

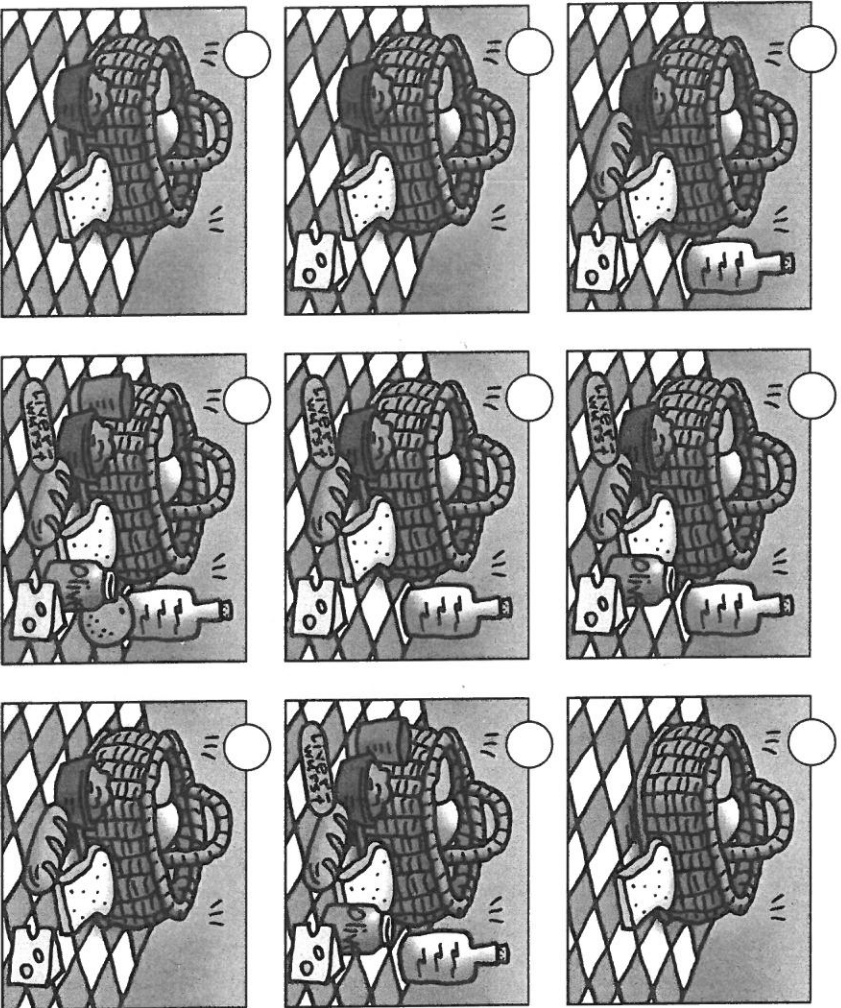

# Fire Safe Student Housing

## TOP TIPS for staying fire safe at college or university

### COOKING is the leading cause of home fires

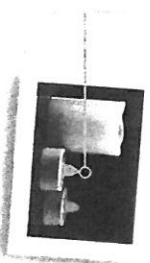
- **Stand by your pan**—always stay in the kitchen and stay alert when cooking.
- Keep **anything** that burns—*pizza boxes, dishtowels, paper towels, wooden or plastic spoons and pot holders*—a safe distance away from the stove.

### ELECTRICAL EQUIPMENT—overloaded circuits and octopus wiring are dangerous

- Use power bars with a **circuit breaker and surge protector**. Ensure the power bars have the logo of an accredited product safety testing agency such as **CSA** or **ULC**.
- Avoid using extension cords as permanent wiring.
- Making sure electrical cords are not covered by carpets or rugs where they can be easily damaged.

### CANDLES can add ambiance—they also can lead to a fire

- **Never leave a burning candle unattended.** Blow out all candles before leaving the room or going to bed.
- Consider using **battery-operated flameless candles**.
- Place candles in sturdy, safe candle holders that will not burn or tip over.
- Keep candles at least 30 centimetres from anything that can burn.
- Avoid using candles in bedrooms.



### SPACE HEATERS NEED SPACE

- Keep space heaters at least **one metre away** from anything that can burn, such as paper, bedding, furniture and curtains.
- Turn off space heaters before going out or going to bed.

### SMOKING is the leading cause of fatal fires

- Encourage smokers to smoke **outside**.
- Keep **large, deep ashtrays** on hand.
- If anyone has been smoking, **check for cigarette butts**, especially under pillows and cushions—sofas and chairs can burn fast!



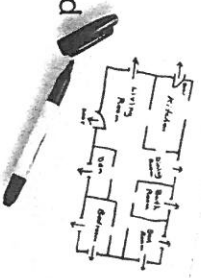
### SMOKE AND CARBON MONOXIDE ALARMS—It is the law to have working smoke and carbon monoxide alarms in your home:

- **Test alarms monthly** by pressing the TEST button and notify the landlord immediately if they are not working.
- It is **against the law** for tenants to disable or tamper with a smoke or carbon monoxide alarm.
- If a smoke alarm activates due to steam from the shower or cooking on the stove, oven or toaster, ask the landlord to move the alarm to a different location, or to install a smoke alarm with a hush feature.



### HOME FIRE ESCAPE PLANNING—When the smoke alarm sounds, everyone must know what to do and where to go. Make a plan!

- Know **two ways out** of every room, if possible. The first way out would be the door, while the second way could be a window that can be exited safely. All escape routes must be accessible and free of clutter.
- Leave the building as quickly as possible. **Never re-enter a burning building.**
- Call **9-1-1** from outside the building using a cell phone or a neighbour's phone.
