



Burn Permits are required - you must have a permit for ANY open air burning. Fire Permits are available on line through the Municipality of Trent Lakes web site or phone 705-738-3800 extension #301 or 1-800-374-4009 Extension #301.

### **It Happened in April.....**

- 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1975....After more than two years of construction, the final piece of the CN Tower – the steel broadcasting antenna – is bolted into place by helicopter. Built at a cost of \$52 million, the tower opened to the public on June 26<sup>th</sup>, 1976.
- 7<sup>th</sup>, 1851 ....Publisher and cartoonist John Wilson Bengough is born in Toronto. At the age of twenty-two, he published the first issue of Grip – a satirical magazine best known for its biting political cartoons, including an immortal one of John A. Macdonald.
- 11<sup>th</sup>, 2000....Environment Minister David Anderson introduces legislation in the House of Commons aimed at protecting Canada's endangered wildlife. The Species at Risk Act listed 233 species at risk of extinction or in need of "special concern", including the northern leopard frog, the burrowing owl, and the bowhead whale. The goal of the legislation was not only to protect existing wildlife and environments but also to recover threatened habitats.
- 22<sup>nd</sup>, 1980....The federal government announces that Canada will join the United States in boycotting the Moscow Olympics over the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. With more than sixty nations observing the boycott, the Olympics became almost a one-nation show.
- 29<sup>th</sup>, 1903....Eighty-two million tonnes of rock crash down the eastern slope of Turtle Mountain, burying a mine entrance and parts of the town of Frank, Northwest Territories (now Alberta). The Frank Slide swept across approximately 1.6 kilometres, engulfing roads, homes, and farms. While twenty -three men, women and children were rescued from the rubble more than ninety people were killed in what is still the country's deadliest rockslide.

# Municipality of Trent Lakes Resumes Free Well Water Sample Drop-off Program April 5 for County Residents

## *Spring Melt Brings Higher Risk for Bacterial Contamination*



Peterborough Public Health (PPH) and the Municipality of Trent Lakes have made it easier for county residents to have their well water tested by offering free well water sample drop offs from spring to fall. This well water testing service is available at no charge to all permanent and seasonal residents in the Municipality of Trent Lakes through a program with PPH.

Beginning Tuesday, April 5, 2022, water samples can be dropped off at the Administrative Office located at 760 County Road 36 in the upper floor main entrance lobby – just in time for the change in season and the return of seasonal residents.

“With the snow melt and spring runoff, this is a good time of year to test your water as there is a higher risk of contamination,” said Chris Eaton, Public Health Inspector. “This is relevant to both drilled and dug wells, but is especially important for dug wells, as they are shallower and more susceptible to contamination. We are happy to partner with the Municipality of Trent Lakes to make it easier for residents to monitor their water quality.”

Empty sample bottles can be picked up from the Administrative Office Monday to Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Filled sample bottles can then be dropped off Tuesdays and Thursdays between 8:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. and are couriered to the Public Health Lab in Peterborough for testing.

Samples must be collected within 24 hours of drop off at the Administrative Office to ensure they reach the lab and are processed in a timely manner. Residents are encouraged to carefully read the sampling and collection instructions included with each kit. Filled sample bottles should be placed in the water sample fridge located in the lobby.

Drop off schedules may change for statutory holidays. For example, samples will not be accepted on Thursday, April 14 due to the Easter long weekend.

Water samples can also be dropped off at the following locations:

- **Havelock-Belmont-Methuen Township Office**, 1 Ottawa Street, Havelock, from Monday through Thursday between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.
- **Township of North Kawartha Municipal Office**, 280 Burleigh Street, Apsley, Tuesdays and Thursdays between 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.
- **Peterborough Public Health**, 185 King Street, Peterborough, between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon on Fridays.
- **Public Health Ontario Laboratory** at 99 Hospital Drive between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

Well water samples are tested for two types of bacterial contamination: total coliforms and *E. coli*. Total coliforms indicate the presence of general contamination such as surface runoff. *E. coli* indicates the water has been contaminated with fecal material which may contain disease-causing microorganisms. Anyone can become ill if they consume contaminated water, but the young, elderly, and immuno-compromised individuals are at a higher risk.

Residents will receive water quality results by mail or can call Public Health Ontario's Interactive Voice Response at 1-877-723-3426. If you have questions about your test results, you can call the PPH Safe Water Program at 705-743-1000, ext. 232, for more information.





### COUNCIL UPDATE

Highlights of Trent Lakes Council Meetings  
through **MARCH 2022**

#### COUNCIL DECISIONS

- Amend Waste Disposal fees for bulky items, mixed loads, etc.
- **Approve 2022 Municipal Budget** – SEE page 2
- Maintain current remuneration pay for next term of Council. A consultant confirmed that the base level of remuneration is aligned to or better than 12 comparable municipalities
- Provide all municipally owned buildings with Waste Cards for use at transfer sites, and continue existing waste pick up arrangements
- Support Fire chief letter of opposition to the onerous Proposed Mandatory Certification Regulations for Fire Emergency Services and to the short 30 day period of consultation
- **Approve Short Term Rental Recommendations for a 3 year phased plan**
- **Receive staff report on the Draft County Official Plan and prepare feedback**
- Approve Zoning Bylaw Amendments for Oak Orchards development and lift Interim Control Bylaw
- Receive "clean and unqualified" Audit Report of 2021 Municipal finances

#### ➤ Draft County Official Plan review

The new County Official Plan (O.P.) will replace individual Municipal Official Plans in Peterborough County, by containing policies that are general and consistent across the County while including a "Local Component" specific to each Municipality. Official Plans provide direction and guidance on how land will be used and provide policy to ensure that future development will meet the needs of the community, while at the same time implementing relevant Provincial legislation. The Draft will be open for public input through early April, and can be accessed at: <https://www.ptbocounty.ca/en/growing/new-county-op.aspx>

#### ➤ Short Term Rentals (STRs)

Council has adopted the recommendations of a Working Group to implement a phased Plan for managing the issues that arise from STRs. Extensive public input was received on the issue, with very polarized and strong opinions. The Plan addresses the largest concerns of most residents, while providing a roadmap that can be adequately resourced and successfully implemented and enforced. The underlying objectives for the Plan were and are:

- Give property owners the option to utilize their properties as STRs to help offset taxes and costs, and support the need for additional accommodation options in Trent Lakes
- Minimize public safety risks and the noise, garbage and parking problems that can be associated with short term rentals
- Develop a solution that is self-funding and does not increase the tax rate

#### **2022**

The focus will be on education and awareness, monitoring and reporting, and enforcement.

#### **2023**

New initiatives will include a comprehensive Nuisance Bylaw, an Administrative Penalties System, and possible changes to bylaw enforcement.

#### **2024**

Council will revisit the implementation of a Short Term Rental licensing program.



## **Peterborough Public Health Investigating Local Flock with Cases of Avian Flu**

### *Risk to Human Health is Low*

Peterborough Public Health (PPH) is currently investigating a confirmed report of avian influenza (H5N1) discovered in a local flock located in Selwyn Township. This is the fifth confirmed report of avian influenza on an Ontario farm over the past few weeks.

"The risk to human health remains low and we are not aware of any local human cases at this time," said Dr. Thomas Piggott, Medical Officer of Health. "The virus does not easily cross from birds to humans, and the current strain is listed as being of 'lower than normal' concern for spreading to humans."

Dr. Piggott stated PPH is working closely with provincial and federal partners, including the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) and the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) on the investigation.

In March 2022, HPAI H5N1 virus was detected in Ontario in wild and commercial poultry. Its spread has been primarily attributed to the migration of infected waterfowl.

Avian influenza is a viral disease that affects mostly domestic poultry and wild birds such as geese, ducks, and shore birds. Wild birds, especially waterfowl, are a natural reservoir for mild strains of avian influenza. The highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) strain H5N1 is known to kill both wild birds and commercial poultry.

Residents should not touch a wild bird, including waterfowl, that is sick, injured or dead. Report any sick or dead birds (including waterfowl), to the Ontario Regional Centre of the Canadian Wildlife Health Cooperative at (866) 673-4781.

Those with backyard chickens or other domestic birds can get more information related to prevention and detection of disease in backyard flocks and pet birds that is available [here](#) or by calling the CFIA at 226-217-8022.

Transmission of avian influenza to people from the consumption of undercooked eggs or poultry is unlikely. As a general practice, food safety measures should always be practiced when handling poultry and egg products such as washing hands before and after food handling, keeping products separate to prevent cross-contamination, cleaning and sanitizing all surfaces and fully cooking poultry products.

# Peterborough Public Health Pilots Local COVID-19 Community Risk Index

*Current Status is “High” as Wastewater Signals Reach Same Levels as January’s Omicron Surge*



Peterborough Public Health released a beta-version of its new online COVID-19 Community Risk Index today to help residents protect themselves and others when local transmission levels are high.

“Our goal with the COVID-19 Community Risk Index is to make our community’s virus transmission status as transparent as possible by integrating several indicators into one easy-to-understand five-point scale,” explained Dr. Thomas Piggott, Medical Officer of Health. “Each level corresponds to specific public health guidance both for the general population, and for those residents who are at high-risk of serious health outcomes if they get infected.”

Dr. Piggott noted this information will be of particular importance to people at higher risk of severe COVID who are needing evidence to make risk base decisions in this challenging time.

The COVID-19 Community Risk Index incorporates data such as wastewater surveillance signals, number of hospitalizations and deaths, percentage positivity of PCR tests and community-reported rapid-antigen tests (through Peterborough Public Health’s [online survey](#)), and the local case incidence rate per 100,000. The Index provides a risk level for each data point based on current values, which is then used to inform the overall risk level for the community. The Index will be updated weekly each Wednesday by 4 p.m. The Index can be found at [www.peterboroughpublichealth.ca/covid-risk-index](http://www.peterboroughpublichealth.ca/covid-risk-index) and residents are encouraged to check it regularly in the same way they check a weather forecast.

Dr. Piggott said he is concerned that current COVID-19 Community Risk is “high” according to the Index. This is being driven by the community’s “very high” PCR testing positivity rate and “high” wastewater surveillance values that are equivalent to the levels seen during January’s Omicron surge.

“This sixth wave we are starting into, like the fifth omicron wave, will disproportionately impact those who are more vulnerable in our communities: people still unvaccinated, elderly, medically-at-risk, and immunocompromised,” he said. “Their protection depends on all of us taking simple actions to decrease transmission as noted.”

Peterborough Public Health recommends the following guidance for local residents:

- get vaccinated with every dose you are eligible to receive – three doses for most residents, four doses for those who are immunocompromised;
- continue to mask up indoors and around others with a respirator, e.g. N95 or KN95 (especially if you’re at high-risk);
- stay home if sick, even if mildly - your mild symptoms could be deadly to someone you pass it along to;
- use rapid antigen tests and continue to report both positive and negative to PPH using our confidential online reporting survey: [chknkt.com/RAT21](http://chknkt.com/RAT21).
- get tested and treated if you’re eligible, if in doubt whether you are eligible seek PCR testing to confirm. Many people do not realize that they are eligible for newly available lifesaving treatments;

“Each of our decisions to decrease transmission today will impact the context of the pandemic in our community tomorrow,” Dr. Piggott said. “I am closely watching the concerning evolving context, considering actions to reimpose requirements as I am responsible to do under the provincial legislation, and readying to take any measures needed to protect our community and those more vulnerable in it.”

Peterborough Public Health is one of the first health units in Ontario to produce a local COVID-19 Community Risk Index. Dr. Piggott noted the Index is still in its pilot phase and wants to hear from residents how useful this tool is for them as we all learn to live with COVID-19 while the pandemic continues. Residents are encouraged to complete the online survey that can be found on the same webpage as the Index itself, or by clicking on [this link](#).

The COVID-19 Community Risk Index will continue being refined in the coming weeks, including through the addition of granular data in a ‘business intelligence dashboard’, and will ultimately replace the Local COVID-19 Tracker. Peterborough Public Health developed the Index as a way to provide residents with more useful information on the local COVID-19 situation as the availability of certain indicators has changed (e.g. better access to wastewater surveillance data, less access to accurate case numbers, etc.). This builds on other types of risk indices designed to help residents make informed decisions on their own health, such as the Air Quality Health Index. Variables and weighting within the index will continue to evolve with the changing context of the pandemic. The Index is designed to help individuals make personal decisions about COVID-19 protective measures.

# COVID-19 Vaccine Fourth Doses Are Available for Immunocompromised Residents

## *Check Eligibility Before Attending a COVID-19 Vaccine Clinic*

Peterborough Public Health (PPH) would like to remind residents who are immunocompromised or on immunosuppressive medication that they are eligible for a fourth dose of the COVID-19 vaccine.

Residents who are immunocompromised due to a health condition or medication side effect are at an increased risk for moderate to severe symptoms due to COVID-19 infection.


“The COVID-19 vaccine is still the best defence against moderate to severe symptoms due a COVID-19 infection,” said Dr. Thomas Piggott, Medical Officer of Health for Peterborough Public Health. “Some residents who are immunocompromised or on immunosuppressive medication are eligible to receive four doses of the COVID-19 vaccine. Residents who are immunocompromised due to health condition or medication may experience a reduced immune response to the COVID-19 vaccine. Therefore, an additional dose is recommended to enhance the immune response and provide better protection against COVID-19.”

Dr. Piggott added, “Residents who fit into this category should speak with their healthcare provider to confirm their eligibility and receive a referral form before attending a COVID-19 vaccine clinic.” Residents who are eligible for a fourth dose can bring their referral form to receive a fourth dose at any [Peterborough Public Health COVID-19 vaccine clinic](#).

Residents who are on a medication that makes them eligible for a fourth dose are also able to bring their prescription or medication to the vaccine clinic to confirm eligibility.

Peterborough Public Health continues to monitor provincial and national guidance for the administration of COVID-19 vaccines. Communication will be provided if fourth dose eligibility expands in the future.

Residents are reminded that COVID-19 vaccine clinics are considered healthcare settings. All clients will still be required to wear a mask in COVID-19 vaccine clinics after March 21.



## HOUSEHOLD HINTS

1. Bathtub stains – light stains can be removed by simply rubbing with a cloth containing baking soda and water solution or rub stained area with a cut lemon. For darker stains – especially rust – rub with a paste of borax and lemon.
2. Toilet – clean the toilet with baking soda and a mild detergent.
3. Axes – Wrap an axe handle with fine wire for the first three inches back from the axe head and it will last many times longer before splitting.
4. Placing a piece of chalk in your jewellery box will help prevent tarnish.
5. Air freshener after cooking fish, cabbage, etc.? Simmer a little vinegar gently on the stove.
6. Bananas - to ripen, wrap in wet towel and place in paper bag.
7. Perfect gravy – try using potato flakes instead of flour for thickening.
8. Kettle scale – if hard water leaves a scale in your kettle – boil pure vinegar in your kettle, rinse well and sediments will dissolve or fall out in pieces. Put a marble in the kettle to help prevent build-up of deposit.
9. Bloodstains – make a paste of cornstarch and water. Let the paste sit on the stain while material in out in the sun or under a bright light. Brush off. Launder if necessary. Toothpaste rubbed into the stain with a toothbrush also works.
10. Hair loss – recent studies show good results in restoring hair growth using vitamin B complex and or zinc treatment.





# Recipe of the Month

## Shepherd's Pie

### Ingredients:

- Club House Shepherd's Pie seasoning
- Lean ground beef
- Sweet onion (sliced)
- Minced garlic
- Mixed frozen vegetables
- Sweet potatoes 2-3 big
- White or yellow potatoes 4 – 6 medium
- Sour cream
- Salt & pepper

I ignore most of the directions on the Club House packet – this is my recipe. You can manage to make both layers at the same time... (Sometimes haha)

### Bottom Layer:

1. Add sliced onion, minced garlic, salt and pepper to frying pan. Cook on medium heat until onion starts to wilt.
2. Add beef ...cook through...then add the frozen vegetables.
3. Let cook all together until vegetables are tender....drain liquid.
4. Mix seasoning packed according to directions
5. Add sauce mix to pan ...coat everything and simmer until sauce thickens.
6. Spread into casserole dish.

### Top Layer:

1. Peel al potatoes – cube sweet potatoes smaller than the others because they take longer to cook.
2. Add cubed potatoes to salted water. Boil until tender.
3. Drain and mash.
4. Add 2-3 tablespoons of sour cream (depending on amount of potatoes) Mash again to mix together.
5. Spread potatoes over beef in dish.

Cook according to temperature and time on seasoning packet. You might want to put on top of cookie sheet in case sauce bubbles over. We like to broil for a few minutes to crisp up the top just before we serve. Enjoy!

## The Way We Were – According to Maclean's

About a year ago a friend told me that *Maclean's* magazine's archive of all its stories is available to the public (<https://archive.macleans.ca/>). It includes every issue since the periodical began in 1905 as *The Business Magazine*. Well, as a historian I simply couldn't resist looking at some old articles. I decided to pick the month in which I was born – just what was everyone talking about in those days?

I could hardly believe what I found. Most of the titles suggested that the stories could have been written this year. For example, there was "How I Went Bust" by a man who had started his own business, had early success and expanded in the first 9 months, apparently over-expanded, and then went broke. That could certainly happen to just about anyone in this day and age.

Then there was a longish article about the prime minister – not one named Trudeau, of course, but William Lyon Mackenzie King; at that time he had already been prime minister for nearly 7,000 days (now there's a difference). That came to 19 years. Not all in a row, but these days there seems to be no possibility of anyone ever being a party leader for anything like half that long.

"Did Hitler Lose the War" talked about the deliberate wartime killing of our fellow humans at about 900 concentration camps; it went on to consider what what should happen next related to Germany. It also speculated that it may not be crystal clear who had won this terrible war: after all, many fewer Germans had died during the war than Allies, and war-ravaged Britain was pouring money into Germany to help rebuild it. Figuring out how to act at the end of a war and who (if anyone) actually wins wars are puzzles we still face all too often.

Given that WWII had just ended, it is hardly surprising that there was a second item about it in the mix. (After all, these days, it is almost impossible to find news stories about anything other than the current war in Europe.) The second story was about rumours of a stash of weapons. In this case, perhaps not weapons of mass destruction (although there were hints that a death ray had been under development), but a massive collection of "ammunition dumps, factories, offices – even a spare palace" hidden in the mountains at the heart of Honshu Island. Apparently, a "last stand" had been expected. Of course, that was cancelled after the controversial dropping of the 2 atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. This is the first I have ever heard of such plans. I'm glad that last stand didn't occur; however, I'm at least as sorry it took dropping atomic bombs on civilians to avert it. As always, war is a lose-lose proposition.

"School for Citizens" talked about night classes for new residents in Canada – and, believe it or not, the first example given was a Ukrainian man! Of course, we are much further ahead now with programs to help integrate the New Canadians in our society (current programs include English as a second language, Indigenous people in Canada, Black history in North America, managing your solid waste, getting a permanent resident card, preparing for life and work in Canada, understanding climate change, and protecting ourselves from fraud). But we are all aware that more resources will probably always be needed: for example, perhaps most urgent at this point is making it possible for professionals trained abroad to practise their skills here.

There was even a "Post Mortem on a Flop" and that flop was a Dominion-provincial conference. Although they are now referred to as federal-provincial events, flops are still common enough. The article refers to "left-wing" and "right-wing" Liberals; these days we hear about "red" and "blue" Liberals and Conservatives. There was a controversial tax-agreement deal that was accepted by some but not all provinces; the author (known only as The Man with a Notebook) commented that "if seven provinces make a deal, the other two can't afford to stay out..." Although we now have 10 provinces and 3 territories, as I said, some things never change, only these days it's child care proposals and, as I write 1 province is still staying out.

Then there was "Horse Opera" (slang for westerns). As such movies and television shows rarely grace our screens now, this is not a term in common use. And the "hero" of the piece was an actor of whom I had never heard. Growing up when I did I was familiar with Roy Rogers and Dale Evans (I even saw them at the Canadian National Exhibition once), Annie Oakley, the Cartwright clan from the Ponderosa, even Paladin (Have Gun Will Travel), the Cisco Kid and so on. But actor Bill Elliott was completely unknown to me, so I nearly decided to exclude this obvious PR item from my list of familiar-type stories. Then it dawned on me – there are still many such puff pieces in all our magazines today, and they pretty well all feature celebrities who are completely unknown to me. Once again, some things don't change!

Sometimes we think we live in a strange new world, in circumstances never experienced in Western civilization before. Having just reviewed the 2 issues of Maclean's magazine published the month of my birth all those years ago, I'm forced to re-evaluate that conclusion. Why don't you take a look at what Canadians were reading about when you were born and see what you think?



Happy Easter!

Good Friday is the Friday before Easter Sunday and it is a federal statutory holiday across Canada. That's the easy part to figure out. It's a little more complicated to determine the day that Easter Sunday is celebrated. It is the first Sunday after the first full moon in spring (after March 21<sup>st</sup>) which can occur as early as March 22 or as late as April 25<sup>th</sup>. This year is will be on the 17<sup>th</sup> of April. Good Friday marks the death of Jesus Christ according to the Christian religion and to many makes Easter more important than Christmas as it is proof that Jesus is the son of God because he came back from the dead.

Easter, like Christmas, has become highly commercialized with tons of chocolate sold in the form of eggs and bunnies. The Easter Bunny brings a basket full of goodies to children for Easter, and some of these are hidden so that the children can enjoy and egg hunt.

There are several traditions for this time of year. Egg painting is very popular and easy to do. Egg paint kids can be purchased in store but you can also dye hard boiled eggs using a jar of beet juice. To give eggs extra shine you can rub them with fat – bacon fat is perfect for this. Try it – you will be surprised at how well this works.

A unique Easter tradition in Hungary is the sprinkling of women with perfume or cologne on Easter Sunday. Men and older boys get up early in the morning and visit girls and women in their families and sometimes even walk from house to house to visit strangers in the neighborhood and sprinkle scented water (Parfume) on their heads. According to tradition this keeps women beautiful until next Easter. They usually recite a “Sprinkling poem” and ask for permission to sprinkle the ladies. Some fun-loving, brave men use a bucket of cold water instead of perfume. In return for the sprinkling women will give them hand painted eggs, home-made cake, a shot of liquor and even in some cases money.






