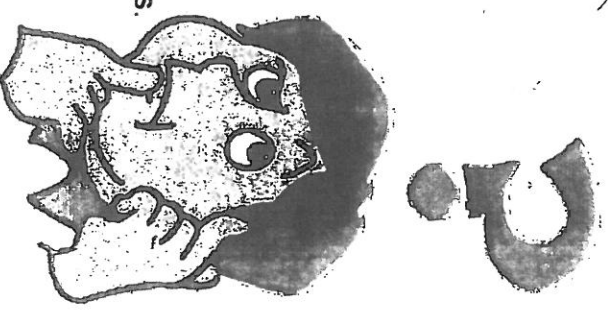

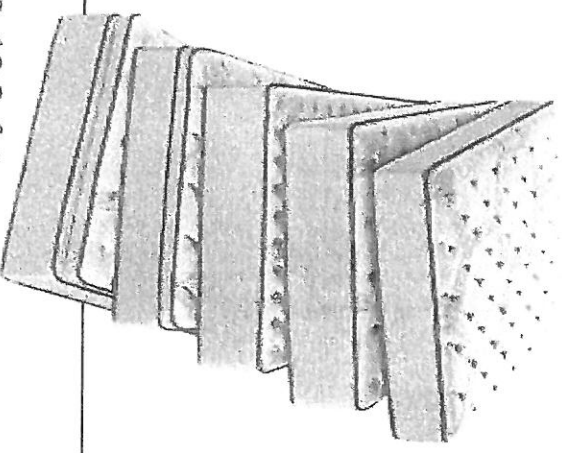

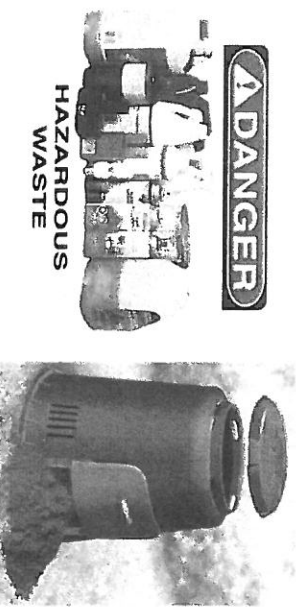

Make It Stop!

Advice for dealing
with nuisance alarms

Use the *hush* feature

Smoke alarms are available with a *pause* or *hush* button that can be used to temporarily silence the alarm. This is a convenient way to deal with nuisance alarms, such as those caused by burning toast or opening smoky ovens, without disabling the alarm. The hush button will silence the alarm for several minutes and then automatically reset itself. Smoke alarms with this feature discourage the dangerous practice of removing the battery or disconnecting the power source as a method of dealing with frequent nuisance alarms. When purchasing smoke alarms, look for alarms with a hush feature, especially if the alarm will be installed near a kitchen or bathroom.

It should be noted that many alarms with a hush feature will chirp intermittently while in hush mode. The chirping will stop once the alarm resets itself.

If smoke continues to build from a real fire while the alarm is in hush mode, the smoke will override the silence feature and the smoke alarm will resound.

Local Garden Centres

It would be a good idea to visit garden centres before too long and purchase your favourite plants as they are going to be pretty busy in the next few weeks.

Kelly's Buckhorn: One of the new kids on the block is "Quart Tropical Centres" used in the centre of large containers. Ruby Terminous, Bird of Paradise, Pink Diamond, and others. Ferns are a hit this year for sun and shade, Dipladenias, Cannas and Quart Hawaiian Nibiscus.

Griffins Greenhouses: Check out "Big Bang Spirea and Fire Light Hydrangea. Vikki suggests "Beez Kneez" supertunia, Spanish Lavender which is not a perennial but herbal as well and can be used for medicinal and aromatherapy benefits and "Actisol" a dehydrated hen palletized manure that will deter squirrels and rabbits from gardens and containers.

The Greenhouse on the River: They have decided to continue on this year after 33 years in the garden business. They have a large number of herbs and a begonia I just had to have, The Waterfall Encanto Orange. It will add a lot of colour. Then there is a new Celosia called "Lizard Leaf" which will be interesting to try.

Horlings Garden Centre: Samantha and Doug have purchased Horlings and took over on April 26th. They are continuing on with most of the favourite annuals, perennials, trees and shrubs. Have a look at the indoor tropical which have become quite popular this year, the Cannas, dahlias and hanging baskets. They are excited about taking over Horlings. Drop in and have a look.

COUNCIL UPDATE

Highlights of Trent Lakes Council Decisions: Jan - Mar 2020



COUNCIL DECISIONS

- Defer a decision on regulating Short Term Rentals until September 2021. Allow for more fulsome public consultation once the pandemic situation is under control.
- Award the full budget allowance for community grants (0.5% of prior year tax levy) of \$52,000 to ten not-for-profit community organizations. Support the contributions made by volunteers to improve the quality of life for our residents.
- Engage Peterborough Public Health to conduct discretionary septic inspections in 2021, for the sixth consecutive year. 300 sites will be selected, and owners notified.
- Engage a consultant to assess the feasibility and cost of upgrading the Buckhorn Sports Pad, in its current location, to provide a more reliable ice surface. Options to be explored include maintenance of natural ice, addition of a refrigeration unit, and synthetic ice.
- Hold a mattress collection day in September 2021 at the Bobcaygeon waste transfer site. Disposal fee is tentatively set at \$20 per mattress.
- Request additional information from Dewdney Mountain Farms as requirement for deeming their quarry application complete.
- Explore the feasibility of installing a dock in Buckhorn for future resident and tourism opportunities.
- Approve funding for enhancements to the Ode Naang Park in Buckhorn – Gazebo, Kawartha chair, Garden, Bike and Kayak racks, Bike repair station, new Buckhorn sign.

UNDER REVIEW BY STAFF

- Possible changes to 2022 waste transfer site hours to better protect the safety of attendants and the public.
- Voting methods to be offered for the 2022 Municipal election.
- A viable mechanism for by-law enforcement and issuance and prosecution of parking tickets on both County and Municipal roads.

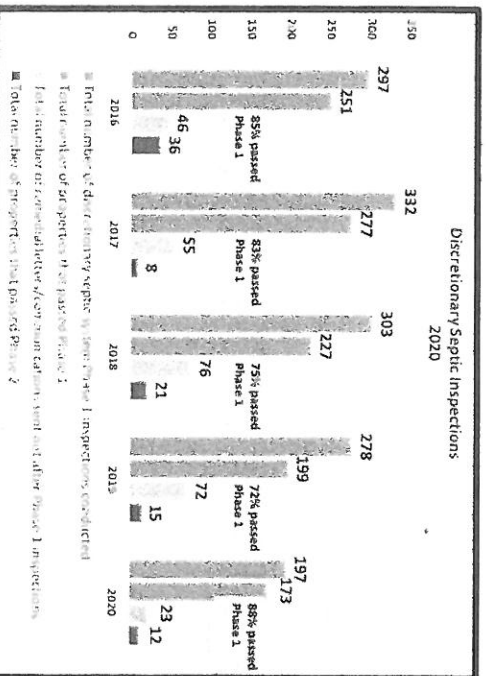
DISCRETIONARY SEPTIC INSPECTIONS

Trent Lakes has implemented discretionary septic system inspections since 2016.

WHY??

In addition to maintaining a natural shoreline, the most important action you can take to protect the water quality of your lake or river, is to properly use and maintain your septic system.

300 + properties are inspected per year. To date, failures after the first and second inspections have averaged 20% and 13% respectively. Clearly the program is working to find and fix deficiencies.

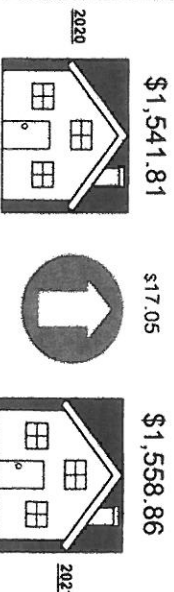


2020 was a different year, impacted by COVID. 301 properties in the Cavendish area were selected for inspection. 59 were exempt (built within the last 10 years) and 45 were deferred to 2021. As a result, only 197 properties were inspected. 88% passed the first inspection; another 6% passed the second. 11 properties are still in follow up. Inspectors prescribe corrective actions for any deficiencies that may jeopardize the sewage system, and follow up to ensure compliance.

MUNICIPAL BUDGET NEWS

The 2021 Trent Lakes Budget is \$14.4 million. Grants, Fees and Reserves will fund 30% of expenditures. The remaining 70% (\$10.1 million) will be funded through Municipal taxes. The year over year tax levy increase is **1.40%** Residential taxpayers will pay \$388.67 for every \$100,000 of assessed value.

Average assessed value for single family detached, single family detached on water and seasonal dwelling on water provided by MPAC in 2021 is \$401,045.60 (up from \$389,224.97 in 2020). Above total does not include County and Education amounts.

Reminder: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, MPAC has postponed the 2020 Assessment Update. Property assessments for 2021 will continue to be based on the fully phased-in January 1, 2016 current values. This means your property assessment for the 2021 property tax year will be the same as the 2020 tax year, unless there have been changes to your property.

Municipality of Trent Lakes Resumes Free Well Water Sample Drop-off Program April 6 for County Residents

Spring Melt Brings Higher Risk for Bacterial Contamination

Peterborough Public Health (PPH) and the Municipality of Trent Lakes have made it simple for county residents to have their well water tested by offering free well water sample drop offs throughout the summer months.

Beginning Tuesday, April 6, 2021, water samples can be dropped off at the Administrative Office located at 760 County Road 36 in the upper floor main entrance lobby – just in time for the change in season to warmer weather and the increased health risks to families.

“With the snow melt and spring runoff, this is a good time of year to test your water as there is a higher risk of contamination,” said Chris Eaton, Public Health Inspector. “This is relevant to both drilled and dug wells, but is especially important for dug wells, as they are shallower and more susceptible to contamination. We are happy to partner with the Municipality of Trent Lakes to make it easier for residents to monitor their water quality.”

Water sample bottles can be picked up from the Administrative Office Monday to Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Samples can then be dropped off Tuesdays and Thursdays between 8:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. and are couriered to the Public Health Ontario for testing.

Water sample bottles are free and available at the Municipality of Trent Lakes Administrative Office. Samples are time sensitive, so residents are encouraged to carefully read the instructions included with each kit. Completed samples should be placed in the water sample fridge located beside the Building & Planning reception desk.

Water samples can also be dropped off at the following locations:

- **Havelock-Belmont-Methuen Township Office**, 1 Ottawa Street, Havelock, from Monday through Thursday between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.
- **Township of North Kawartha Municipal Office**, 280 Burleigh Street, Apsley, Tuesdays and Thursdays between 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.
- **Peterborough Public Health**, 185 King Street, Peterborough, between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon on Fridays.
- **Public Health Ontario Laboratory** at 99 Hospital Drive between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

This well water testing service is available at no charge to all residents and cottagers in the Municipality of Trent Lakes through a program with PPH.

Well water samples are tested for two types of bacterial contamination: total coliforms and *E. coli*. The presence of *E. coli* indicates the water has been contaminated with fecal material, which can contain disease-causing microbes. Coliforms are organisms can cause severe gastrointestinal illness. Anyone can become ill if they consume contaminated water, but the young, elderly, and immuno-compromised are at a higher risk.

Residents will receive water quality results by mail or you can call Public Health Ontario's Interactive Voice Response at 1-877-723-3426. If you have questions about your test results, you can call the PPH Safe Water Program at 705-743-1000, ext. 232, for a free consultation.

What's Dave Up To? Just Eden in Trent Lakes

You remember Dave. He used to work at our Cavendish Waste Transfer Station. You probably know that he can now be found at the Buckhorn transfer location. But you may not know that he has professional skills that have nothing to do with managing our recycling and garbage appropriately and keeping unruly campers, cottagers and bears in line. Dave has been developing heirloom vegetables, herbs, fruits and flowers into a business that might interest you. It certainly interests me.

Who knew? Not me. However, my life-long friend Mary, whose family has been cottaging on Sandy Lake since 1948, told me last year that she got all her garden plants from Dave. That's when I decided I had to step up my gardening for this year.

I can't remember whether I told you last year that I had bought radishes, onions, tomatoes and green peppers in Toronto to grow. Eventually I moved them up to the cottage, where I generously shared the harvest with the chipmunks. At least, I did until I started spritzing soapy water on them regularly. I also had to do that on my herbs (parsley, sage and thyme) because something else (probably a deer) munched all the tops of the long stems of parsley (a chipmunk would have eaten the short ones). This year I plan to start spritzing on day 1!

This week I visited Dave's small market garden in Trent Lakes. I had no idea that so much could be done with so little space, not to mention with relatively little infrastructure. For Dave specializes in choosing plants that are suitable for the soil and lighting conditions of each area of his lot. He also combines plants and mulches to take advantage of how they support each other and can replenish the soil, and he encourages plants that attract pollinators. What's more, his output has become so plentiful that he doesn't need to protect it from the small garden raiders that plagued me last year. While a raccoon did manage to score a huge tomato, that just revealed another one behind it that weighed 2 1/4 lb and measured more than 6 inches around. On the other hand, he does protect young trees from voles and his fish (see below) from bears.

Dave's greenhouse (appropriately shaded by a green tarp on one side) is heated, cooled, lit and otherwise powered by solar energy. It includes a self-contained aquaponics system that fertilizes seedlings, grows plants and then returns clean water to the fish. Powered, of course, year-round, by the sun. And, by the way, he has made his own impressive-looking platforms to use solar heat to produce extremely cost-effective warm water (they look like the systems used for underfloor heating).

If you fancy buying some young vegetable or herb plants from Dave this spring or some of his produce in summer, you can contact him at forestechoes@yahoo.com. Call as soon as possible to make sure he can meet your needs. What is he selling? More than I can begin to list here, but here's a start:

- 40 varieties of tomatoes and 5 of cucumbers, as well as about 2 dozen kinds of peppers
- onions (always a favourite with me), chives, rhubarb, lettuces, kales, chard and other leafy greens, and
- basil, thyme, dill, oregano, mint, horseradish, sage, chamomile and other herbs.

And stay tuned for, in the future, there will be fruit – lots of varieties of apples, pears and plums are already being grown, also 4 kinds of grapes (!), raspberries (including yellow ones!), blackberries, chums (cherry-plums), cherries, blueberries, strawberries, some exotics, and on and on.

Later in the season, Dave will probably be available (for a modest fee) to:

- advise you on how you too can create your own edible natural masterpiece, or
- give you your own tour of his amazing operation, where you can see a living salad bar, note future fruit crops developing and enjoy an outdoor museum of beautiful and edible mushrooms.

Even better, with either option, you will hear how Dave combines the knowledge he has gained by talking to old-timers, reading many books and (no doubt) learning from previous mistakes to

I left with dreams of shopping any summer day I want for the most delicious salads, veggies and herbs in raised beds in my own garden – perhaps later on, even berries and other fruits. And sometimes fantasizing about a greenhouse to keep out the chipmunks and deer and ... time to wake up, Carla!

Recipe of the Month

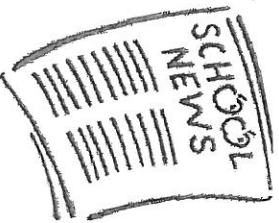
Garbage Can Dinner



Cavendish Youth Group

Most important requirement is the camp fire to cook on!
Roast of Beef, Chicken or whatever meat you want to cook.
Potatoes
Vegetables of your choice (anything works)
Salt
Pepper
Water
Spices (your choice, whatever you would normally put with your meat)
One aluminum garbage can with lid

It is very important that you use one new clean aluminum garbage can with lid.
Place roast or chicken in the can and add your potatoes and vegetables, (Corn on the cob, beans, carrots, onion, mushrooms, salt & pepper and spices. Add water to the can and place garbage can with lid on the fire and let it cook for 1 to 1 ½ hours depending on how hot your fire is. Not a lot of water is needed when cooking as the garbage can works like a pressure cooker or slow cooker.

Travelling to Seasonal Residences Carries Serious COVID-19 Risks

Short-Term Rentals Not Permitted During Stay-at-Home Order

Peterborough Public Health recognizes that seasonal residents are an important part of our community and contribute significantly to our economy, social activities and cultural mosaic. It is important, however, that everyone remembers that travelling to secondary properties during the Stay-at-Home order carries a risk of spreading COVID-19.

“COVID-19 only spreads when people move, so while we are all under a province-wide Stay-at-Home order, this is not the time to visit the cottage,” said Dr. Rosana Salvaterra, Medical Officer of Health. “We all want to curb the third wave as quickly as possible, and our community is just starting to see the number of new cases trending downwards. Avoiding all nonessential travel and ride shares within and between Ontario regions is absolutely critical these next few weeks to help us gain control of the provincial outbreak.”

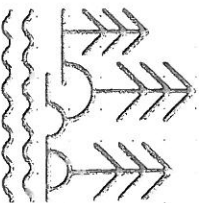
Visits to a secondary residence is only permitted for the purposes of performing emergency services and must be less than 24 hours in duration. Cottage owners who wish to relocate to their secondary residence must plan to self-isolate for the first 14 days in order to comply with the [Stay-at-Home Order](#). Updated guidance for seasonal property owners is available at www.peterboroughpublichealth.ca or by clicking [here](#).

“Just as everyone is being asked to take a ‘Team Ontario’ approach to the reallocation of vaccines to hotspot areas for the next three weeks, I am asking all residents to follow suit by not travelling to their seasonal properties while the Stay-at-Home order is in effect,” said Dr. Salvaterra. She added that staying home even applies to those who have received their first dose of COVID-19 vaccine, as all public health measures must still be followed. “Seasonal homes lend themselves to socialization, and this circuit-breaker will fail if we don’t stay in our primary residence and stick closer to home for our outdoor exercise.”

Dr. Salvaterra also reminded residents and operators of short-term rentals (e.g., cottage, cabin, etc.) that these are not permitted during the provincial shutdown and Stay-at-Home order. This reminder follows a recent incident where a local Air B&B host rented their property to a group from outside the region that resulted in five positive cases and 25 high-risk contacts back in the group’s home public health unit. This example serves as a strong reminder that indoor gatherings with people who are not from the same household pose serious risks and greatly increase the likelihood of spreading COVID-19. Indoor gatherings with those from different households are currently prohibited.

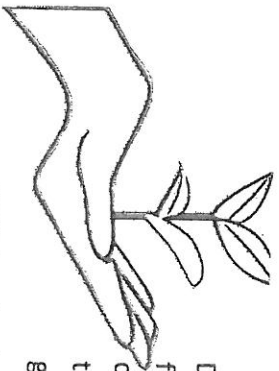

Carol's Corner



Dandelions: What is the first yellow plant you see in the spring along ditches, and sides of roads? The farmers do not like them. A sure sign of spring is the low, easy to miss yellow flower that provides colour at the beginning of April. It is the food source at this time to the early awakening bees; a transplant from Eurasia about a century ago; grows in clays, silts, sands, fertile and infertile grounds and grows about 8" high. It is also a member of the aster family. What is it? COLTSFOOT!

Fiddleheads: Are coiled ferns that are only edible before they open. They are foraged in the spring and seen in grocery stores until the early part of the summer, but they are best eaten in the beginning of the season. Fiddleheads are mainly eaten one way: sautéed with butter.

Nasturtium: A new annual is the Baby Rose Nasturtium. It has deep pink blooms that pop from dark green foliage. Unlike some nasturtiums, it grows in a tidy mounding habit. Its shape and the peppery flavour of its flowers and leaves make it a great fit for herb gardens. Watch for hummingbirds flying around this bright annual. Pollinators like bees and butterflies also are attracted to the flowers. It does require full sun.

Now is the time to think about planting seeds directly into the soil. Get the grandchildren interested in seed germination and plant growth. Push a bean into a pot and watch it grow.

Your spring garden and pollinators: Wait for the temperature to be between 10 & 15 degrees C to tidy up and tread on your garden. The native pollinators that are sheltering under leaf litter and covered spaces would not like you to expose them to stress. As well, the soil, which can be very delicate, tends to be pretty wet at that time of year and we do not want to compact it making it difficult for roots and water to find their way into the soil.

One third of what we eat receives insect pollination. Pollinated foods have added vitamins. There are 800 species of bees in Canada with 400 of them here in Ontario. Butterflies, moths, wasps, beetles and ants pollinate as well. Bees like to nest in old 6" stems. Leave stems uncut over the winter and into the spring. Make sure old logs and rocks are placed in your garden for the native pollinators.

Bumblebees:

Queen: This bee will come out from wintering looking for a nest site to start a new colony. She is large and flies low in zig-zags and stops to explore crevices. Bumblebees are good pollinators of tomatoes. Honeybees use the sun to navigate. Bumblebees use landmarks on the ground to navigate. Squash bees are ground nesting and specialize in pollinating guess what? Squash. They tend to be early morning dawn pollinators. If you are a late riser, you just might miss them. Wild bees are apt to be found in the bare ground.

Helping the earth to be greener:

Mulching: Using dyed wood chips for mulching tends to cause an absence of earth worms. The wood chips are sometimes recycled from treated or contaminated materials.

Leaves: Keep the nutrients in your yard. Mow over the leaves and use them to mulch beds. Add them to your compost bin and help the kitchen scraps to break down.

Native plants: They are harder and need less water and fertilizer once they get established and, as well, are useful to the backyard birds.

Organic fertilizers: You need to carefully follow the label instructions and forgo any additives.

Plastic: It is not green to use plastic pots and then dump them in the garbage after planting. Try buying your plants in biodegradable pots.

Nature: Mulching in place saves labour, feeds plants and conserves soil moisture. Let nature do its job by mulching with leaves, straw and pulling weeds.

Mealworms: Help to attract new bird species to the bird feeder. Mealworms, alive or dead, are actually beetle larvae and help birds get their sustenance in order to survive harsh winter conditions and thrive through the breeding season. Try putting mealworms on a shallow Tupperware container (plastic is okay in this case) filled with 2" of dry oatmeal and drill a hole or two in the lid. Birds like apple and carrot slices and potato wedges. Select a slick shallow cup so the larvae can't climb out.

One of my Myrtle Beach friends from New Hampshire sent me an email saying how much she enjoyed our 507 and during the Covid 19 was especially glad to receive it. I guess you might say our 507 is international.

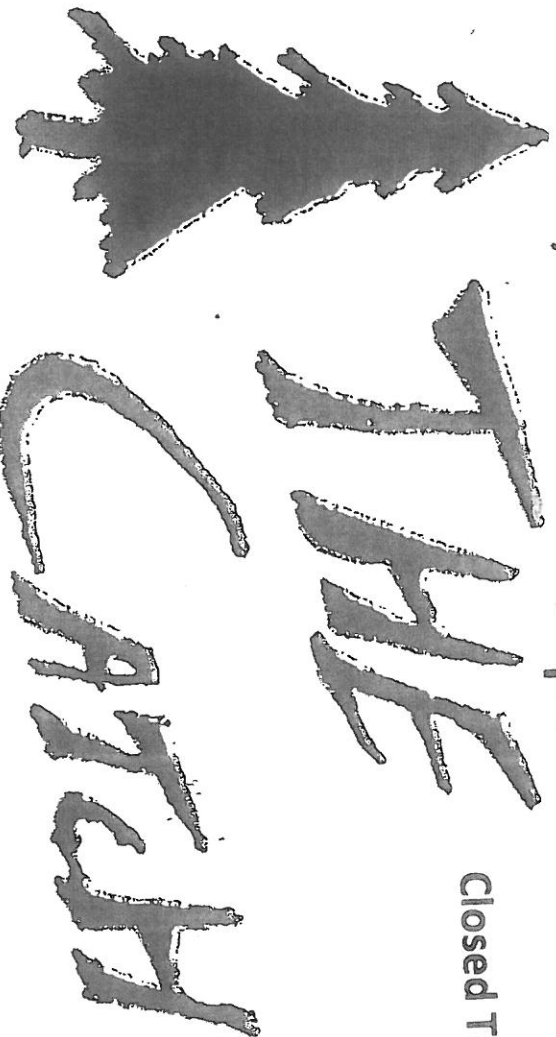

Have You Ever Wanted to be “On-Call” – Like You Are Really Needed? Here’s Your Opportunity

I always worked in an office. It was in a hospital for many years, but I was there only 9-5, Monday to Friday, unlike the front-line heroes who worked shifts, weekends and often “on-call.” While I’m not complaining about my less challenging lifestyle, sometimes it would have been nice to feel that some situation needed *my* expertise, urgently! It never happened, of course. But now I have a chance!

I can become an “on-call nest sitter.” So can you!

It’s not so much “my expertise” that will be needed as a little time and patience, and probably a lot of bug spray. But it will bring the rush of a call to action on short notice – an adventure. After our all-too-predictable, stay-at-home lifestyle of the past year or so, I’ll be heading out the door to offer help!

Where Did the Idea of Nest Sitters Come from?

The Land Between (TLB) started this new program to recruit volunteer nest sitters last year. Siena Smith, TLB’s conservation program coordinator who is coordinating all TLB’s staff field programs, recently explained the program to me. Her colleague Angela Vander Eyken will coordinate the volunteers. Prime nest-sitting season is late May to early July.

My Go Bag

So, I’ll need a “go bag.” What will be in it? Siena mentioned “a flashlight, charged cell phone, snack, water, appropriate clothes, a high-visibility vest and bug spray.” She also recommended “a chair” and “a pilon” so I guess my car will function as a permanent extension of my go bag. I will also need a small, light object that I am willing to part with – Siena mentioned a hat or an orphaned glove (more about that later).

In addition, you can take reading material and a portable radio (as long as you can use ear muffs or buds); you can even take a friend, but you won’t be able to talk a lot – Mama Turtle wants peace and quiet for her work. But think of the possibilities for meditation!

A supply of toilet paper might also be in order. After all, the egg-laying might take 6 hours or even more (it depends on many things, including how soon the sitter arrives after Mama Turtle gets started).

I didn’t have any pilons and all “non-essential” stores are about to close down again tonight, so today I walked down the street and bought 2 small, cute, bright orangy-red pilons for about \$25. I’m underways!

Why Do We Need Turtle Sitters Anyway?

We know that turtles “normally” have long lives, which should give them plenty of time to reproduce themselves. However, modern human life brings them many hazards – particularly traffic. In addition, many small animals (e.g., raccoons, skunks, foxes) present a particular threat while the turtle is laying her eggs. Therefore, your mission is to sit quietly about 10 metres away from Mama Turtle and protect her from potential road trauma (if she has decided to nest on the side of the road) and discourage predators.

It’s a little like babysitting, except there are no bottles to warm and deliver, no diapers to change, no crying to pacify, no need to cope with tantrums or a series of high-pitched “no!”s and no anxious parents to soothe. Of course, no financial reward either – but think of the adventure! What could be better?

Then What?

When your shift is over, you can ensure that Mama gets across the road if that is her goal. And also, be sure to place that small, light object on the nest so that TLB’s staff can find it. Then contact TLB.

Why do they need to find the nest? They will come as soon as possible to put a cage over the nest to protect it from those small predators. If the nest cannot safely be caged, TLB staff (under permits) will excavate it, take the eggs to their field office and incubate them until they hatch (August or September). Then they will release the hatchlings in the closest suitable wetland to where the nest was found. aff can find it. Then contact TLB.

Ready to Sign Up?

To sign up as an “on-call turtle nest sitter,” just go to the TLB website (<https://www.thelandbetween.ca/>) and click on the Turtle Guardians option. You can define the area and time of day you are up for (e.g., days, evenings, whenever!). Then, any time TLC hears from someone who sees a turtle laying eggs in your area but can’t stay to nest-sit, they will call and invite you to take on the mission!

While you are at the website, you can also sign up for an online training session (mid-May to early June), take a turtle test to qualify as a Turtle Guardian, or even sign up for a cage-construction workshop. Enjoy!

Getting to the Lake... each and every nail, board and piece of glass for any of the camps and cottages which would be built on the shores of Bottle and Sucker Lakes would first be brought to a water access point on Catchacoma Lake. This was true for many of the other lakes as well. For those on Sucker and Bottle they would have to unload their boats at the Bottle Creek Dam, carry it over the dam and load a second boat above the dam. It never seemed to matter at the time how much extra work this actually was; you just did what had to be done to get your food and belongings to the cottage. Whether you came for a day, or a weekend, a week or a month you brought with you what you needed. If you forgot it, you did without.

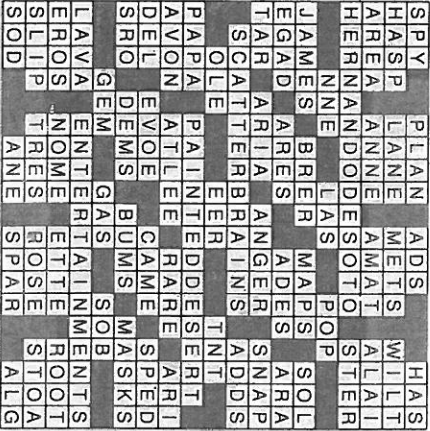
One such landing and perhaps one of the first on the lake was known as Cochrane's Landing. It was located on the west side of Catchacoma, to the north of the Beaver Lake Road. After several years they closed their business but by then there was Manley's in the north end of Catchacoma Lake, which is now known as Catchacoma Marina, Pearson's Landing which was at the south end of the same lake and no longer operating. As well there was Wager's also in the south end of Catchacoma Lake, later known as Catchacoma Landing and it also is no longer in operation. On Mississauga Lake there were two marinas as well, Little Gull Marina which we all know and Trappers Inn/Mississauga Landing which closed several years ago.

In 1981, the second bridge at the end of the Beaver Lake Road was built. The cottagers around Gold and Anstruther Lakes pooled their funds together and had continued the road making it so that they could drive to their cottages. This rough road was brought up to the township standards and therefore was maintained by the township. Shortly thereafter, cottagers on Beaver, McGinnis and Cavendish soon was the advantages of being able to drive to their properties and they too had a road built in 1983-84 which would later be taken over and maintained by the township as well.

Unpasteurized fruit or vegetable juices	E. coli, Salmonella, botulism	Children should drink only pasteurized juice products unless the fruit or vegetable is washed and the juice freshly squeezed immediately before it is served.
Eggs	Salmonella	Children should not eat raw or under-cooked eggs, unpasteurized powdered eggs or uncooked products containing raw eggs.
Raw or undercooked meat, poultry	Salmonella, E. coli, Listeria	Children should not eat raw or undercooked meat, poultry or meat products (including raw hot dogs).
Raw fish and shell fish	Viruses causing diarrhea, hepatitis, parasites	Children should not eat raw shellfish. Some experts caution against eating any raw fish.
Fresh fruits and vegetables	E. coli, viruses causing diarrhea, parasites, hepatitis	All fruits and vegetables should be washed before they are eaten.
Sprouts (alfalfa, mung bean)	Salmonella, E. coli hepatitis	Children should avoid eating raw or undercooked alfalfa, mung bean or other sprouts. Seeds sold for sprouting may contain germs.
Honey	Botulism	Children younger than one year of age should not eat honey.
Cream-filled pastry; potato, egg or other salad with creamy dressing	Staphylococcal food poisoning	These items should be eaten immediately after preparation or stored promptly in the refrigerator.
