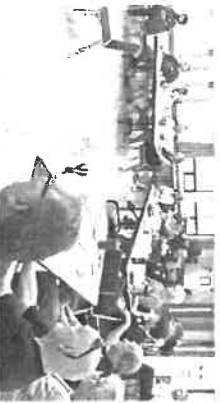
Halloween Registry

Share the Road Charette Summary

Sponsored by Municipality of Trent Lakes in partnership with the Cavendish Community Rate Payers Association and Citizens for Alternative Transportation in Trent Lakes.

On Saturday, July 5, 2025, the Cavendish Community Centre buzzed with ideas about how to make our roads safer for people and nature. Thirty enthusiastic people came together for a Share the Road Charette.



A charette is a *collaborative workshop* where stakeholders come together to *generate ideas* and *solutions* for a specific design challenge. It emphasizes *open communication* and *creativity*, allowing participants to *explore* various perspectives and approaches. We were guided by our facilitator to work together to come up with ideas to make our roads safe for people and wildlife.

Inspirational Ideas : Karen Shearer described other communities' share the road strategies

- Complete streets where design changes make roads friendly for multiple users (e.g. passenger vehicles, cyclists, walkers and people with special mobility needs)
- Traffic calming measures (e.g. speed bumps, raised crosswalks, narrowing roads)
- Attention grabbers (e.g. painting on roads, creative signs, pop up posters)
- Landmarks and signs to give a sense of making progress (e.g. 3 km until ice cream).



What do we like about our roads

- Nature - trees, wildlife spotting, views
- Community vibe
- Paved or tarred and chipped



What don't we like about our roads?

- Gravel dust
- People (including contractors) who drive too fast/ not courteous and don't know how to drive on gravel
- Visitors who are lost

Why are these items important to us?

- Safety of people and wildlife
- Health & wellbeing – feel safe to be active
- Social connections
- Unsafe corners, narrow sections
- Don't feel safe walking or cycling
- Off leash dogs
- Dead animals hit by cars/trucks
- Volume of traffic



What share the road change ideas do we have? What's easiest to work on?

Individual Behaviour

- Be a good role model – drive safely (be courteous, follow the speed limit, adjust driving for the conditions), walk facing traffic and wear bright clothes, and when cycling follow the rules of the road.
- Describe share the road to visitors to our homes/cottages.
- Trim trees and bushes on our properties to improve visibility.

Community influence/control

- Use existing communications channels (e.g. CCRAI newsletter and meetings, Cavendish Community Centre Website, posters, handouts & displays) to promote road safety by drivers, walkers and cyclists.
- Municipality of Trent Lakes influence/control

- Share community areas of concern and ideas for road design and maintenance, signage and communication with short-term accommodation operators

****An important point to keep in mind is that successful road safety changes happen when there are collaborations between the Municipality, citizens and police services.**

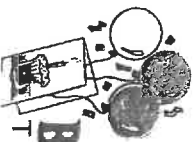

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THERE ARE MANY FACTORS THAT MAY IMPACT YOUR PROPERTY'S RISK TO WILDFIRE

Check out the *Firesmart Begins at Home Guide* for an in-depth look at how you can build wildfire resiliency.

IMMEDIATE ZONE

0m to 1.5m

- The Immediate Zone extends 1.5m around your home and decks, and should be fire-resistant. Start with these proactive steps to prevent wind-blown embers from igniting your home:
- Choose non-combustible materials when constructing or renovating your home.
 - Remove all vegetation and cover the soil with fire-resistant materials like gravel or concrete.
 - Avoid planting woody shrubs or trees. If any are present, prune and maintain them regularly.

Manage the Intermediate Zone to minimize fire risks to your home. Here are actions to enhance safety:

INTERMEDIATE ZONE

1.5m to 10m

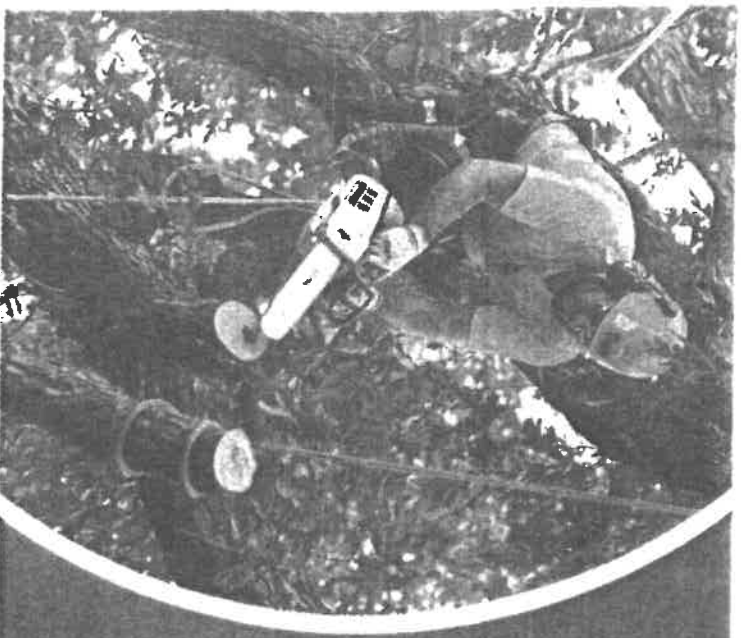
- Plant fire-resistant vegetation and select non-combustible landscaping materials.
- Avoid incorporating any woody debris, including mulch.
- Keep firewood, construction materials, furniture, decorative items, and tools out of this zone.
- Move trailers and sheds to the Extended Zone, or store firewood in fire-resistant buildings.
- Use fire-resistant ground cover like gravel within a 1.5m radius around trailers and sheds.

The goal in the Extended Zone is not to eliminate fire, but to reduce its intensity. If your property extends into this zone, a few important steps you can take include:

EXTENDED ZONE

10m to 30m

- Selectively remove evergreen trees to maintain a 3m gap between crowns.
- Remove all branches to a height of 2m from the ground.
- Regularly remove fallen branches, dry grass, and needles to eliminate surface fuels.
- If your property exceeds 30m, keep applying these guidelines. Coordinate with neighbours and consult forest experts for special cases like steep slopes.

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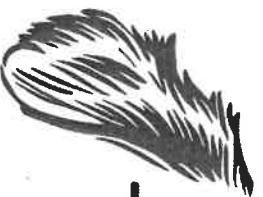

What does 911 in Cavendish Mean to You?

Have you ever called 911 up here? I have – but, while that was due to a few heart-pounding moments for me, it wasn't a big thing. More than 20 years ago I had brought my mother up just for a day trip. As we walked around outside, my mother made a familiar move – she pushed her walker too far ahead and then fell over trying to reach for it. I knew I wouldn't be able to get her up myself with no walls or furniture to help with the process. However, as the 911 system had been fairly recently implemented, I knew what to do. I made the call and within minutes 3 or 4 cheerful, able-bodied volunteer firefighters turned up, popped her back up onto her feet, ensured that she was not hurt and that her hands were firmly gripping her walker and then departed smiling and waving.

Not all calls to 911 in Cavendish are that straightforward and brief. Some require a response from an ambulance or the OPP, but most also involve our firefighters, either as the primary responders or to help manage the emergency. In 2024, our 11 volunteer firefighters (6 women, 5 men) were the primary responders on 71 occasions. Before you start thinking that doesn't sound like much, be aware that they also respond to significantly more calls in support of other Trent Lakes or neighbouring fire halls or services. For example, on Carnival Day alone this year Cavendish was called out 5 times to support other responding services, and in 2024 Trent Lakes' 58 firefighters answered a total of 556 calls.

Like many of you, I am related to 1 of our Cavendish firefighters and good friends with several others. And, also like many of you, I value the "community" nature of our life here – I find it even more special to have friends and neighbours who will drop whatever they are doing – carpentry, playing cards, office job, sleeping – and race out the door to provide us with the highest standard of emergency help.

Of the 71 responses in Cavendish in 2024, 45 (64%) were for medical issues; 7 (10%) were to motor vehicle accidents and 6 (8%) ended up being false alarms. Fires and potentially hazardous fire situations accounted for 8 (11%) others. Given our unusual weather this year (e.g., ice storm, long droughts), the 2025 stats may have a very different breakdown.

All our volunteers are trained, practised and eventually certified in handling all the activities they may be expected to carry out. Last year they undertook 5,033 hours of training as well as providing 261 hours of public education. At this time, 93% of firefighters in Trent Lakes are certified in all the activities they are likely to have to perform. In this, we compare very favourably with the other fire services around the province, including the large, full-time, urban departments. To some extent this level of expertise has been achieved and will be maintained because of the high value Steve Brockbank, our current Trent Lakes Fire Chief, places on professionalism in the service.

Of course, we had a fire hall in Cavendish before the 911 system. Since the provincial Fire Marshal mandated all Ontario townships to form fire depots or establish fire prevention education programs in 1975, our municipality has actively pursued appropriate fire prevention and response services. But, as Ken Warren, Cavendish District Fire Chief, happily reports, it is now a lot easier to find the emergency when a 911 address is provided. Which reminds me, to help you ensure that responders can find you if you ever need them:

- post your 911 address somewhere so that everyone in your home can see it – in an emergency, a guest or a child or even you may be challenged to recite the correct address; and if you have water access, make sure you can describe the location clearly enough for the fire boat to find you
- ensure that any land-based access route is as clear as possible whenever you are in residence – most emergency vehicles are quite large and not easy to manoeuvre in tight quarters, and
- when calling 911, be sure to give the extent and nature of the problem as accurately as possible.

Before You Ask- Yes, You Can Volunteer!

The fire department is always looking for volunteers. Any adult is potentially qualified, although the infirmity of sedentary aging may tend to disqualify some of us. As you can see, much training is provided; there is also clear supervision; furthermore, each firefighter receives an amazing range of expensive professional protective equipment; and finally, volunteers are paid for hours worked and spent in training.

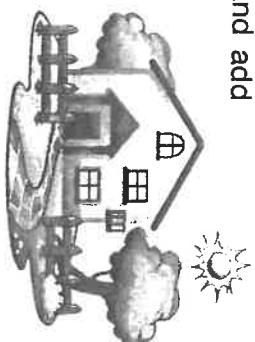
Recipe of the Month

CHILI SAUCE

6 qt peeled ripe tomatoes
2 cups chopped celery
4 cups chopped onions
1/2 cup salt
4 cups white sugar

2 cups vinegar
1 oz mustard seed
2 medium green peppers, finely
chopped

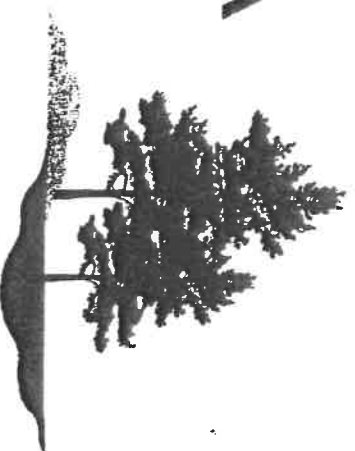
Mix the first 4 ingredients together and let stand overnight. The next morning, drain well. Mix the remaining ingredients together and add drained mixture. Cook for 15 minutes. Seal in sterilized bottles.



HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- Synthetic wine corks are great for sealing opened tubes of caulking.
- A dab of glow-in-the-dark paint means no more feeling for the light switch in the dark
- Slip PVC pipes over the handles of our pruning shears and tape them in place to extend your reach and clip high branches without a ladder
- Dust catcher – before drilling or cutting into a wall, tape a bag below the work zone and it will catch the falling dust.
- Coat your face and arms with lotion before painting and the splatters will wash off effortlessly.
- Touch-up without cleanup. No need to mess up a brush to fix a wall wound. Use an old washcloth, dip in the paint and throw it away when you're done. A washcloth leaves the same textures as a paint roller, so your repair will blend nicely.
- A pinch of mounting putty (that sticky stuff used to hang posters) prevents picture tilt without harming walls.
- Adhesive backed hook and loop strips (velcro) let you stick remote controls under an end table. They'll always be handy when you need them and won't clutter up tabletops.
- A hair dryer softens the adhesive under tape or bumper stickers and makes them easy to pull off.

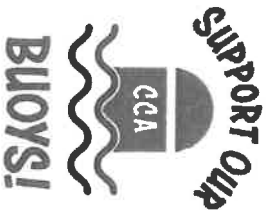


"The 507 Express Cookbook"

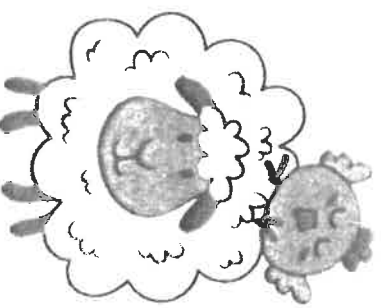

ABANDONED DOCKS INITIATIVE

Your dock has hosted more than its share of afternoon cocktails, launched a million cannon ballers and water-skiers, and rocked friends to sleep for sunburnt naps. It's time to upgrade to something new. But how to say good-bye?

Every year on our lake system abandoned docks drift onto cottage properties or are dumped in back bays. Do the owners feel that "out of sight is out of mind", or that the dock will somehow revert back to nature? It's a simple "NO" on both counts. Dumping of docks on municipal, private, park, or crown land is not only illegal, but also poses environmental and navigational risks. And they are horrible eyesores.

Many older docks were constructed using unencapsulated foam floatation which has been banned in Ontario since 2021 (new construction or resale). These blue or pinkish foam bats break down into small pieces that litter the shoreline and cause untold damage to bird, wildlife and fish habitat and to lake health. Older docks may also have been treated with creosote or other wood preservatives that leach into the lake water once submerged. From a navigational standpoint, our fluctuating water levels can cause abandoned docks to break free and roam the lakes as serious boating hazards. This is especially noticeable this year due to the shoreline disruption following the March ice storm.

Any and all dumping – whether it's a dock, unloved paddleboat, deflated floaty, or even a beverage can tossed overboard is illegal. Fines range from \$300 to over \$10,000 depending on the item dumped and who is responsible for the land it lands on.

So – what to do? Under the leadership of the Cavendish Community Ratepayers Association Inc. (CCRAI), discussions are underway with concerned area cottagers, cottage associations, lake associations, the Municipality of Trent Lakes (waste management), Kawartha Highlands Signature Site Park and the Ministries of the Environment, Conservation and Parks and Natural Resources to come up with a plan - a plan to educate fellow cottagers on the proper disposal of unwanted docks, a plan to conduct an initial shoreline clean up (summer 2026), and a plan to prevent future dumping.

This is step 1 – education. These are some options for properly disposing of an unwanted dock:

- Many dock construction companies will include disposal of your old dock (for a fee).
- If your dock is still sea-worthy, advertise on Facebook Marketplace or other online groups. Note that most of our lakes have their own Facebook page, and the "507 North of Flyn's- Good Neighbours " page covers off an even wider area.
- Repurpose the wood and other components in building projects.
- Offer the wood to local ATV or snowmobile trail associations, or to local marinas.
- Dismantle and take the whole shebang to the transfer station.

Regardless of what you do, remember that disposal of **your** dock is **your** responsibility. Tying it up in a back bay is not an option.

We come to these lakes for their natural beauty, clean water, and fantastic recreational opportunities. Let's do everything we can to preserve that.

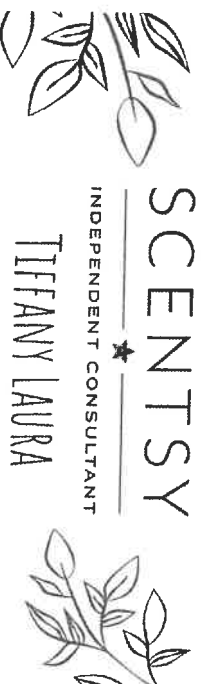

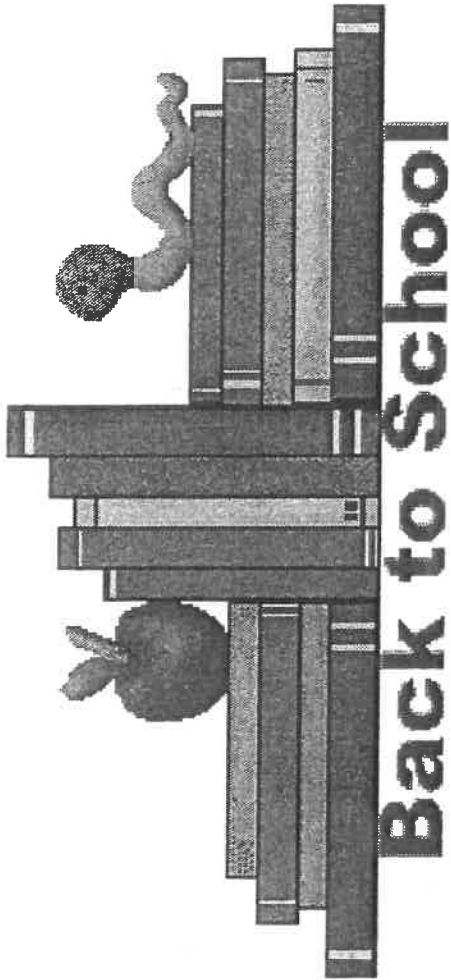
