

Food Safety Tips

- Watch your expiry dates.
- Choose fresh fruits and vegetables with unbroken skins.
- Wash all fruit and vegetables in soapy water. Even organic produce can be contaminated with parasites!
- Shop for cold and frozen foods last, pack them together in a cooler bag.
- Thaw frozen foods in the refrigerator.
- Refrigerate leftovers immediately.
- Wash hands thoroughly with soap before preparing food, after handling raw food and before handling cooked food.
- Wash cutting boards in the dishwasher or in hot soapy water. Keep separate cutting boards for meat and poultry from the one used for vegetables.
- Use a meat thermometer to ensure all meats are cooked to 165 F or higher (180F for poultry).
- Avoid raw and very rare meats.
- Avoid fruits, vegetables and cheese that show signs of mould.

It's a Part of Our History

There are still lots of tell tale signs of the extensive roads and bridges which were built in order to get the prime timber out. It was during the early

1950's that these men were actually cutting trees and driving their equipment within a few hundred feet of the cottages on Bottle Lake.

Loggers were back again in the Cavendish Woods during the early 1970's, difference being this time they stayed outside the park boundaries and were much more selective in their harvesting. This return visit was concentrated mostly to the east-south-east of Sucker Lake and was quite possibly the last time logging of any description would be allowed to take place within and around the Park boundaries.

Common Terms Used by those Early Loggers ...

Cant hook ---- This tool was used to manually move logs around in the woods. This particular tool became a part of each and every man in the woods. The cant hook consisted of a 3 to 4 foot handle with a large metal part circle band attached to it. The circles end which were pointed and sharp enough to stick into a log, was called the bill. The end of the handle also had a steel tooth called the snibby. It too could be used to control the logs.

Shanty Boys ----- They were the men and boys who lived in the shanties located close to where the lumbering was going on. They were a hardy breed who dominated the economy for a hundred years. They first used double bit axes to fall trees, then cross-cut saws and finally the motor driven chain saws.

Widow Makers ----- dead branches on standing timber which the wind brought down. While in the woods, loggers were always in danger of these dead branches crashing down on them.

Barber-Chair ----- frozen timber which sometimes split upwards from the saw cut, 15 to 20 feet. In the event of a tree Barber-Chairing, the tree could fall anywhere but where it was expected to ----- Many a poor lad will never again say his name because his last tree fell in a direction opposite to its notching.

Peavey ----- It was a hand tool, which looked very similar to the Cant Hook. The difference being, it had a steel pointed end. It was used for manually moving logs over a great distance.



Valentine's Day

Valentines Day is a holiday that celebrates romantic love and is celebrated on February 14th. The day is widely celebrated by people who are in love including couples that are married or just dating. Children celebrate the day as well with card of friendship and candy. Couples generally celebrate the day with gifts and going out to dinner. Traditional gifts include cards, flowers and chocolates.

Fun Fact:

- the first Valentine's Day card to be mass produced was made by entrepreneur Esther Howland in the United States in 1847.
- around 190 million cards are sent out this day making it the second most popular holiday to send cards after Christmas.
- If you include cards given at school and handmade cards, the number is estimated to be nearly 1 billion that are exchanged yearly with teachers receiving more than any other profession.
- Around 85% of cards are purchased by women.
- Men purchase 73% of flowers sold on this day.
- around 36 million heart shaped boxes of chocolates will be given as gifts on Valentine's Day.
- Millions of pet owners will buy gifts for their pets on this day.
- During the Middle Ages, girls would eat strange foods to help them have dreams where they would dream of their future husband.










1. Lay out a clean tablecloth.







How Can We Restore Our Dark Skies?

You may remember that I was pretty freaked out to learn that the outdoor light pollution at my cottage was “yellow-bright suburban,” the 4th highest of 5 possible levels. At night, just outside my cottage with no lights on and no nearby neighbours with lights on (507 Express December 2025). I also mentioned that this was not the worst finding in our area and I promised to tell you more on that subject. Here it comes.

Our Cavendish Community Centre, (CCC), like all Trent Lakes municipal facilities, is a regrettable source of unnecessary night sky pollution. I think we can do better and we should do better. I think the municipality should lead our community in this important matter. And I’m pretty sure that it can be done without costing a lot of money. That said, I think it would definitely be worth investing in improving the darkness of our night skies.

Nearly 20 years ago, I really got a (pleasant) shock spending a couple of nights in a very old adobe house in rural northern New Mexico. It had a window high above the head of my bed. The stars were so bright at 4 am that I could have read my book by their light alone. Even then I knew that our skies here in Cavendish were nowhere near dark enough to show that many stars. And, today, I also realize that they probably never will be again – given our different levels of humidity and the flatness of the terrain (<https://astrobackyard.com/seeing-conditions/>), possibly they never were quite that spectacular.

So what is our CCC’s story? The Environmental Advisory Committee of Trent Lakes submitted the report of its DarkSky Subcommittee to Council in October 2025. Staff is still assessing the implications for Council. But, in the meantime, we can consider what the report says.

Using the same international Artificial Light at Night (ALAN) criteria that were applied at my cottage (is the light useful, targeted, low level, controlled and warm-coloured?), members of the subcommittee checked out all the municipal-owned facilities in Trent Lakes. Not surprisingly, none of them was perfect although there were also redeeming qualities. By the way, the report noted that “the use of lights for security is controversial” and “there is no conclusive evidence that lights increase or decrease security” (p 11, **Trent Lakes**

Municipal Artificial Lighting at Night Audit Report). Hmm, there’s an interesting observation.

As I am a member of the Cavendish Culture and Recreation Committee that is responsible for the Cavendish Community Centre (CCC), here I am concerned particularly about examples from our own centre. Most significant seems to be 2 cases of redundant lighting (2 lights “in exactly the same place”) (p 16). Well, perhaps not “*exactly*” but one on top of another, both apparently lighting the same area.

One example of this is above our upstairs kitchen door (pp 17-18). One “warm” light is placed immediately over the door; above that, a bright LED light spills out unnecessarily over the entire wing of the building. Only the warm light is useful, necessary and darksky friendly.

The other example of “light trespass” involving double lighting at CCC results from the poorly-directed LED light mounted above the upper floor and intended to light the entrance to the Library. Instead, it creates “significant skyglow” (p 18). The lower light alone does the job.

The report praised the use of controlled lighting at our sports facilities, where the lights are switched off when the area is not in use. It did, however, mention that using motion sensors would be an improvement (p 20). It also praised the CCC for using 1 amber light (the only example of the preferred warm (amber or red) lighting its research found in Trent Lakes.

Unfortunately, it did identify a huge problem surrounding the CCC – “**skyglow can be seen from 5 km away ...; in spite of the forested area surrounding the facility** Here the report is referring to lighting surrounding the CCC, but not actually part of it (i.e., “a streetlight, 3 parking lot flood lights, an unshielded light at the entrance to the sand storage”) as well as the building’s lights themselves (pp 21-22). I feel that we can encourage Council to address these issues at the same time as rectifying our building concerns.

And, hey, my cottage is less than 5 km from the CCC. Maybe this is the source of my unwanted and alarming “yellow-bright suburban” ambient light!

Are you planning on having a open air burn in Trent Lakes. If so you must have a burn permit. A burn permit is free and is valid until December 31st of the year you obtained it. You can obtain your burn permit by clicking the following:

About Fire Bans

Fire Bans ([#collapse_e667f533-8389-42cf-819c-f0281de78b19_1](https://form.trentlakes.ca/Fire-Department/2026-Open-Air-Burn-Permit))

A total fire ban means no open air fires. During a total fire ban you cannot light, maintain or use a fire in the open, or carry out any activity in the open that causes or is likely to cause a fire. No outdoor fires of any kind.

This ban includes bonfires, charcoal BBQ's, outdoor candles and lanterns, Tiki torches, chimeneas, burning brush or leaves, all outdoor solid fuel burning appliances, fireworks etc. Certified propane and natural gas appliances such as fire tables or barbecues that are TSSA approved are allowed.

Fire bans can also occur in our municipality when an order is made under the Forest Fires Prevention Act to implement a Restricted Fire Zone (RFZ). These temporary measures are put in place to prevent human-caused fires when the fire hazard is extreme and/or when firefighting resources are limited.

During a Restricted Fire Zone (RFZ) please contact the Ministry of Natural Resources Conservation Officer Tips Line to report non-emergency open air burning complaints at 1-877-TIPS-MNR (1-877-847-7667).

Penalties as prescribed by the Provincial Offences Act. Once a Restricted Fire Zone is declared, it is **illegal to set a fire for any purpose** within the affected area unless specific conditions have been met. Failure to comply could result in: fine up to \$25,000, three months in jail, financial responsibility for any costs incurred in fighting a forest fire.

The Ontario Fire Code (https://www.e-laws.gov.on.ca/html/source/regs/english/2007/elaws_src_regs_r07213_e.htm) requires that all open-air burning must be approved by Fire Services. The Municipality of Trent Lakes By-law B2023-053 ([/media/tx5c12pc/b2023-053-fire-works-and-open-air-burning.pdf](https://media/tx5c12pc/b2023-053-fire-works-and-open-air-burning.pdf)) regulates open air fires and burn permits in our community.

You need a burn permit if you're having any open air fire including but not limited to bonfires, burn barrels, chimeneas, cooking fires, etc.. Please complete the Burn Permit Application. You can also apply by email (<mailto:fire@trentlakes.ca>) or give us a call at 705-738-3800 ext. 230 and someone will be happy to generate a permit over the phone.

Please include the following information with your application:

- Applicants name and address
- Address of the burn site
- Phone number
- Purpose of the permit (brush fire, campfire, special burn permit, etc)

If you're having a larger fire, you need to get special burn permission by calling the Fire Prevention Inspector at 705-738-3800 ext. 249 a minimum of 2 business days prior.

Burn permits last for the calendar year. You'll need to reapply annually.

Fees

There is currently no fee for Open Air Burn Permits.

When do I need a burn permit?

You need a burn permit for the following types of fires:

- Brush fires
- Campfires
- Burn barrels
- Chimeneas and outdoor open air fireplaces
- Special burn permit

You don't need a burn permit for:

- Certified propane and natural gas fire pits, fire tables, or barbecues that are TSSA approved.

Call before and after each burn

Each time you start a fire and put it out you must call 800-374-4009 ext. 301 or 705-738-3800 ext. 301. This helps our staff recognize if a fire is planned and we will also inform you if there is a burn ban in effect.

Fire rules and regulations

You must follow these fire rules and regulations:

- You can only have an open air fire between 6 p.m. and 8 a.m. from April 1 to October 31
- Fires must be 0.61 m (2 feet) wide by 0.61 m (2 feet) deep and 0.61 m (2 feet) tall
- The fire must be placed 7.6 m (25 feet) from any lot lines, buildings, structures, trees or combustible materials
- You must attend and watch the fire at all times
- You must have equipment available to put out the fire

Chinese New Year

The Chinese New Year celebrates the first day of the first month on the Chinese calendar. It is also called the Spring Festival and is the most important of the traditional Chinese holidays. This day is celebrated by all of China as well as Chinese people throughout the world. This celebration has taken place for thousands of years and the original story tells of a lion-like monster named Nian that terrorized Chinese villagers. One year, a wise monk advised the villagers to use loud noises along with red paper cutouts hung over their doors to scare Nian away. This woked and villagers were able to defeat Nian. The day that Nian was defeated became the start of the New Year. This year, the year of the snake, the Chinese New Year will be celebrated on Tuesday, February 17th.

The dragon represents prosperity, good fortune and good luck. Certain fruits and flowers are considered lucky such as tangerines, peach blossoms and kumquat trees. One popular greeting on this day is Kung Hei Fat Choy which means "We hope you get rich". Firecrackers are often set off on the fifth day of celebrations to gain the attention of the god of prosperity. It is also considered bad luck to use fire, a knife or a broom on the first day of the New Year.







Things you might not have known about this month...

- February is the second month of the year and has 28 or 29 days. The 29th day is every 4 years during leap year.
- The birthstone for February is the Amethyst.
- The flower for the month is the primrose.
- The zodiac signs are aquarius and pisces
- February was added to the Roman calendar in 713 BC
- The length of the month changed over time and at one time it had as few as 23 days. When Julius Caesar remade the Roman calendar, the month was assigned 28 days during normal years and 29 days during leap years which occurred every four years.
- It is the shortest month of the year.
- The Welsh call February "Y mis bach" which means "little month".
- It is the third month of winter.
- The month is named for the Latin word februum which means purification.
- Together with January, it was the 1st of the months added to the Roman calendar.
- The Saxon term for the month, Sol-monath, means "cake month". This is because they offered cakes to the gods during this month.



HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- When cooking onions or cabbage, boil a small amount of vinegar in a pan to remove the odours.
- If you sprinkle salt into the water when you are washing vegetables, it will draw out insects.
- If you cook your vegetables with a small amount of milk, it will bring out more colour.
- When making pickles, cut off 1/4 inch from each end. The ends contain enzymes that may cause the pickles to soften.
- Pickle juice should be saved and used for making coleslaw, potato salad, etc.
- To revive limp asparagus, try placing them in a tall pot with ice water in the refrigerator for about 30 minutes.
- To ripen avocados quickly, place them in a wool sock and set in a dark place.
- Coffee grounds are an excellent fertilizer and a systemic pesticide that is non-toxic to humans and pets. Let them cool and sprinkle around your plants and windows.
- WD-40 removes cray from anything, as well as scuffs from ceramic and wood floors.
- Used dryer sheets are great for dusting

Groundhog Day

Groundhog Day is the day when we look to the groundhog to predict the weather for the next six weeks. It is believed that if the sun is shining when the groundhog comes out of his burrow, then the groundhog will go back into its burrow and we will have winter for six more weeks. However, if it is cloudy, then spring will come early that year.

At some point people began to look to the groundhog to make this prediction. The earliest reference is in a journal in 1841. In 1886 the Punxsutawney newspaper declared February 2nd as Groundhog Day and the tradition has spread ever since.

How accurate the predictions of the Groundhog are is up for debate but we will be hoping for a cloudy day on February 2nd.

Cold Warning Issued as Temperature Drops
Lakelands Public Health Urges Caution as Severe Cold Weather Approaches

These frigid conditions pose a serious health risk, particularly during the early morning and later evening hours when temperatures are typically at their lowest. Lakelands Public Health urges all residents to take precautions to protect themselves.

It is also important to recognize signs of cold-related illness. Frostbite may cause pale, numb, or hard skin, typically on fingers, toes, ears, and nose. Hypothermia symptoms include intense shivering, confusion, slurred speech, and difficulty walking; severe hypothermia is a medical emergency requiring immediate attention.

“Extreme cold weather is more than just uncomfortable, it can be dangerous, even life-threatening,” said Julie Bromley, Manager, Emergency Services & Healthy Environments with Lakelands Public Health. “People experiencing homelessness, older adults, young children, and individuals with chronic health conditions are especially at risk. We encourage everyone to stay informed, dress appropriately, and check on those who may need extra support.”

Those most at risk during extreme cold include:

- People experiencing homelessness or living without adequate heat
- Older adults
- Infants and young children
- Individuals with chronic respiratory, cardiac, or mental health conditions
- People taking certain medications or using substances that can affect body temperature, awareness, or circulation
- Individuals with mobility challenges or cognitive impairments
- Outdoor workers and winter sport enthusiasts

Residents are advised to limit outdoor exposure during the coldest periods and to take the following precautions to stay safe:

- Dress in multiple warm layers with a wind-resistant outer layer. Cover all exposed skin with hats, scarves, gloves or mittens, and warm socks.
Change out of wet clothing promptly to prevent heat loss.
- Ensure home heating systems are functioning properly and carbon monoxide detectors are working.
- Seek out community warming centres or other heated public spaces if needed.




