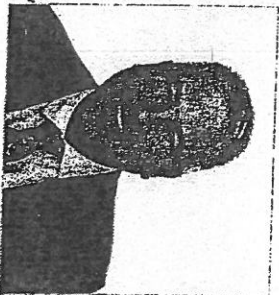
June25th, 1942 – Playwright and novelist Michel Tremblay is born in Montreal.

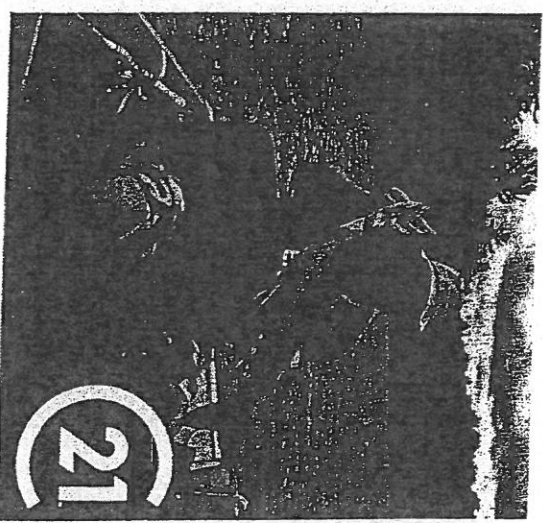

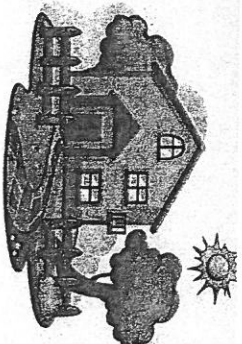

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- Brown sugar gone hard? Place in a container with a slice of apple and close tightly – leave a few days and it will soften. If you need it sooner sprinkle it with water and set it in the oven for 10 minutes at 200°F or 20 seconds in the microwave.
- Has your honey formed a white crust? Place the jar in boiling water – leave the lid off. It will go back to the original texture. You can also liquefy honey in a microwave.
- Take the wrinkles out of a table cloth by tossing it in the dryer with a damp towel; set the machine on the air cycle. Take the cloth out as soon as the machine stops and put it on your table.
- Wrap dining table leaves in an old sheet or blanket before tucking them under a bed or in the closet. This will prevent them from getting scratched.
- Speed up the drying time of a small load by adding a dry bath towel. It will absorb some of the moisture and shorten the drying time.
- The best time to weed your garden is right after it rains.
- To eliminate weeds growing in sidewalks, paths and gravel driveways drench them with white vinegar. This not only kills the weeds but leaves the soils so acidic that regrowth is stunted as well.
- Rubbing alcohol sprayed from a bottle makes an excellent window cleaner, especially in the cold weather as it does not freeze and evaporated quickly.
- When cleaning your windows wipe the outside of each pane vertically and the inside horizontally (or vice versa) This makes it easy to tell which side any streaks might be one.
- Sticking zippers will slide easily if rubbed with lead from an ordinary pencil. The pencil's graphite acts as a lubricant.

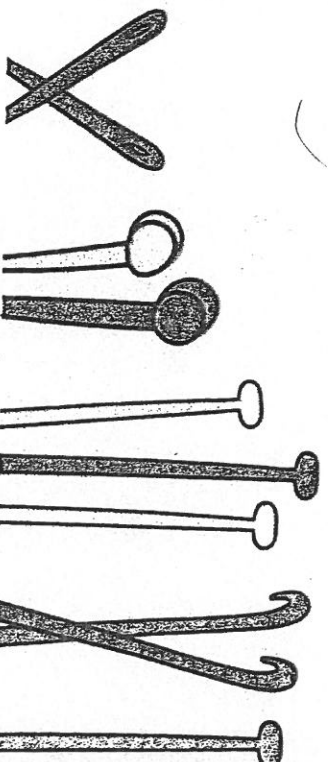

Seasonal Bulky Plastic Recycling Program

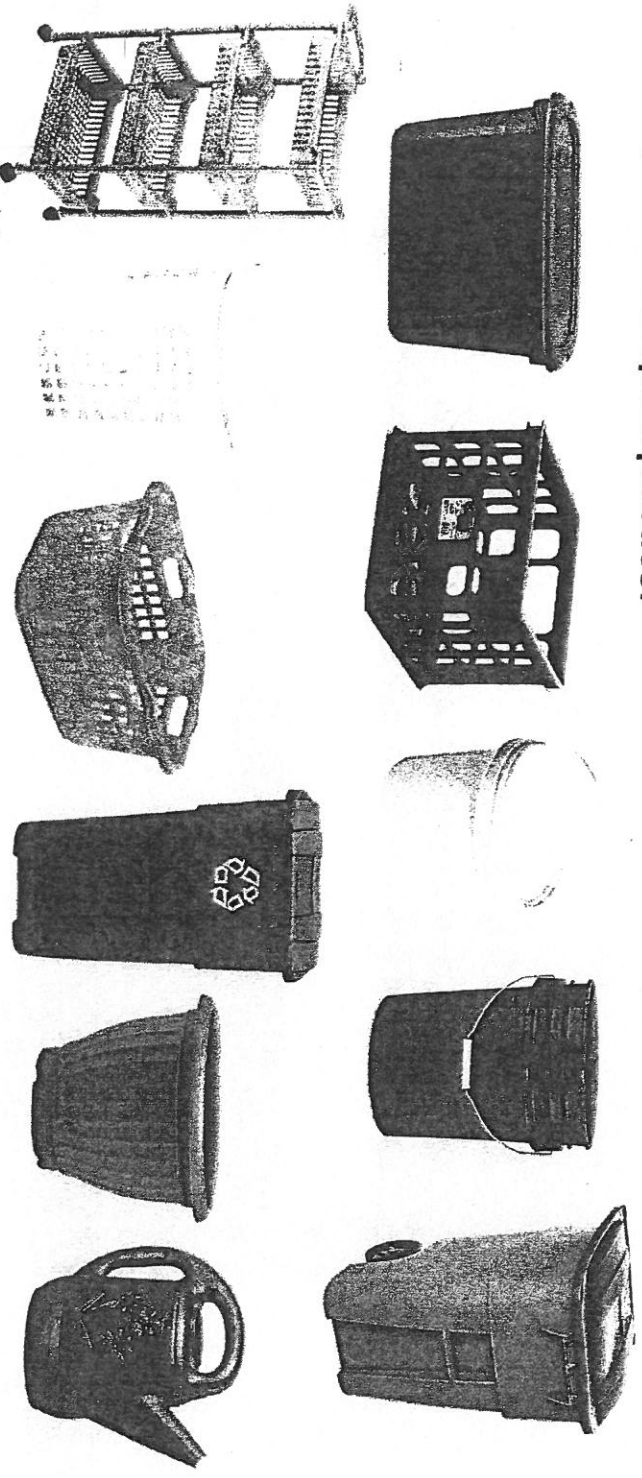
The following plastic items are accepted for recycling:

All coloured plastic containers with HDPE (SPI Code #2), Polypropylene (SPI Code #5) or LDPE (SPI Code #4). The item must be greater than 10 liters or 10 kilograms capacity (2.5 gallon) and up to and including a 95-gallon recycling bin.

This includes:

- Clean lastic Pails/Buckets
- Crates
- Clean Plastic Drums
- Storage Containers
- Empty Garbage Cans
- Recycling Bins
- Totes/Bins
- Laundry Baskets
- Large Flowerpots (Less than 5% dirt)
- Plastic Watering Cans (No metal)

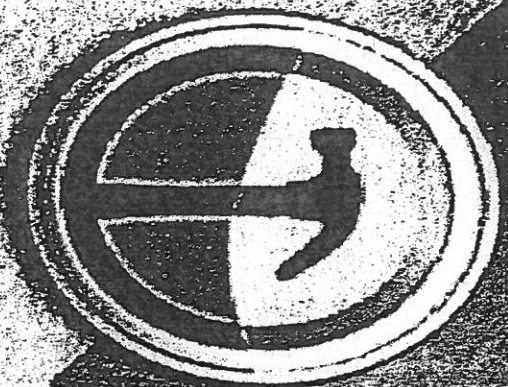

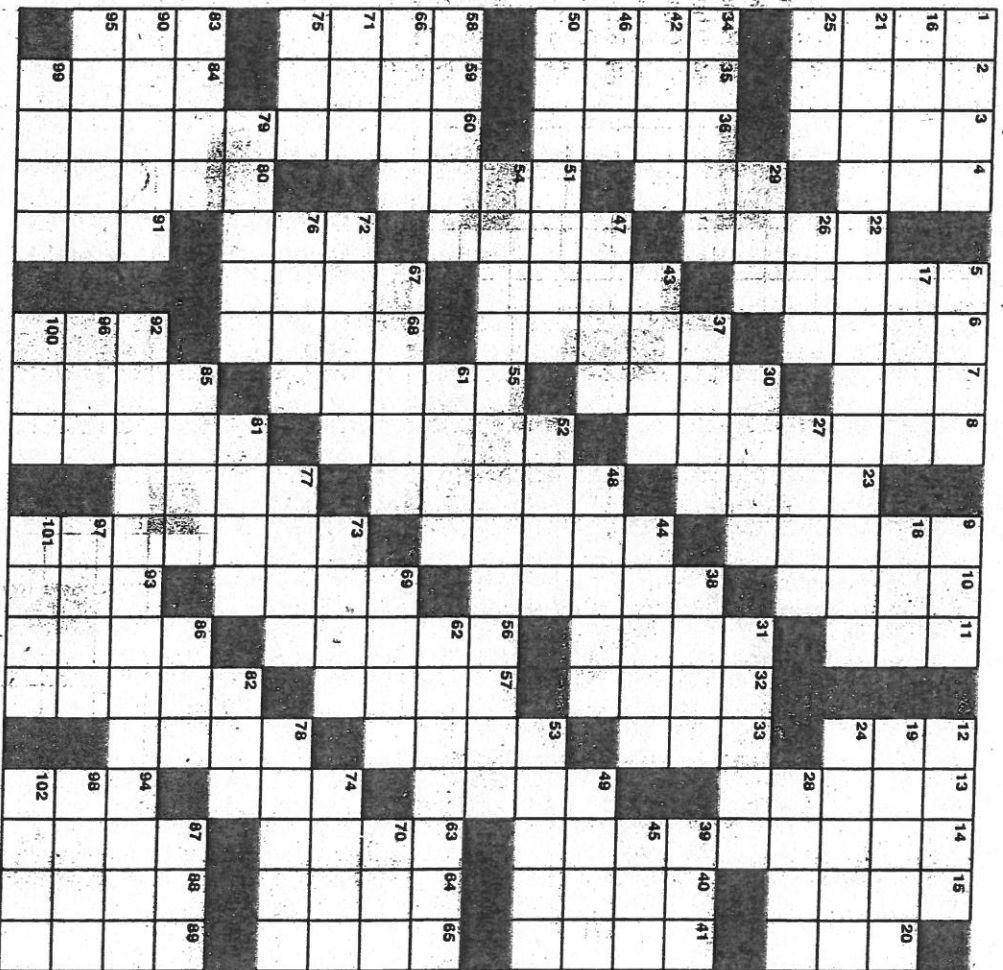

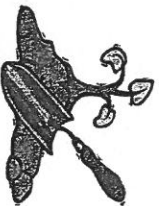
STRAWBERRY SUPPER

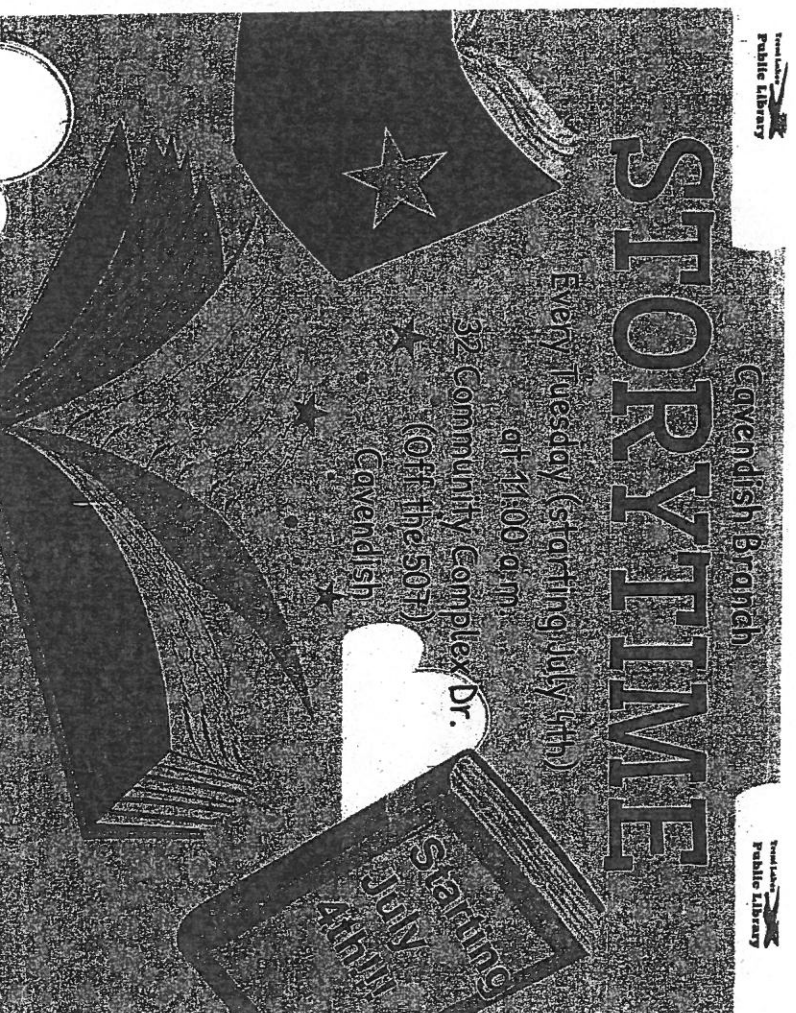
Gardening Tips

Ways to get rid of your weeds organically:

- Pour boiling water on them.
- Spray them with vinegar
- Add mulch to your soil so that seeds don't blow in
- Use a hoe to loosen the soil around them and then pull them out
- Let your chicken eat them
- Eat them. Some weeds are edible like dandelions

What you should be doing in your Vegetable Garden this month:

- One to two inches will reduce water loss by up to 70 % and cut weeding by up to 90%
- Water your garden and pay close attention to sign of wilting leaves. Water deeply at the root.
- Fertilize by adding plenty of compost and think about using green manures
- Around Father's day stake the tomatoes by tying them. Getting them off the ground will double your crop and staking them helps to increase the air circulation preventing damp leaves and fungal issues.
- Weed – weed- weed. They rob the soil of moisture and nutrients that would benefit your plants and take up space that your vegetables need to mature.





GARDENERS | Action Plan

When native species thrive in your garden, bees, birds and butterflies can blossom too. Be selective with what you plant in your garden and learn how to keep invaders away.

1. GARDEN RESPONSIBLY

Choose native or non-invasive plants for your garden to avoid introducing or spreading invasive species. Avoid relocating plants from your home to your cottage garden and vice versa.

2. KNOW YOUR ENEMY

Learn how to identify and manage invasive plants. The best techniques and timing to remove them will vary depending on the species. [Learn ways you can manage invasive species](#).

3. ROOT OUT INVADERS CAREFULLY

Put your uprooted invaders into a black garbage bag and leave it in the sun for at least five days. This will make sure that no invaders have a chance to sprout and grow in new areas.

4. DISPOSE OF INVASIVE PLANTS CAREFULLY

Dispose of yard waste through your local municipality. Do not dump yard waste in nearby natural areas as this can smother natural vegetation and spread invasive plants.

5. KEEP INVADERS OUT OF THE COMPOST

Never put invasive plants in your backyard compost. Even when uprooted, invasive plants can spread seeds or grow roots in your compost pile. Some invasive plants can regenerate from fragments as small as 2 centimeters.

6. DON'T FORGET ABOUT THE POND

Invasive plants can sneak into and out of your water gardens. Never dump unwanted plants and fish into local waterways.

7. KNOW THE RULES

It is illegal to import, deposit, release, breed/grow, buy, sell, lease or trade a [regulated invasive plant species](#). Never buy or plant these species. You should remove and destroy them if they are in your garden.

8. KEEP AN EYE OUT

Inspect your property and shoreline for any sign of invasion. To find out what species may be in your area, visit [eddmaps.org/ontario](#).

9. REPORT ALL INVADERS

Call the [Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters' Invading Species Hotline at 1-800-563-7711](#) to report an invasive species sighting or download the [EDDMAPS Ontario](#) app to report an invader on the spot.

10. STOP THE INVASION

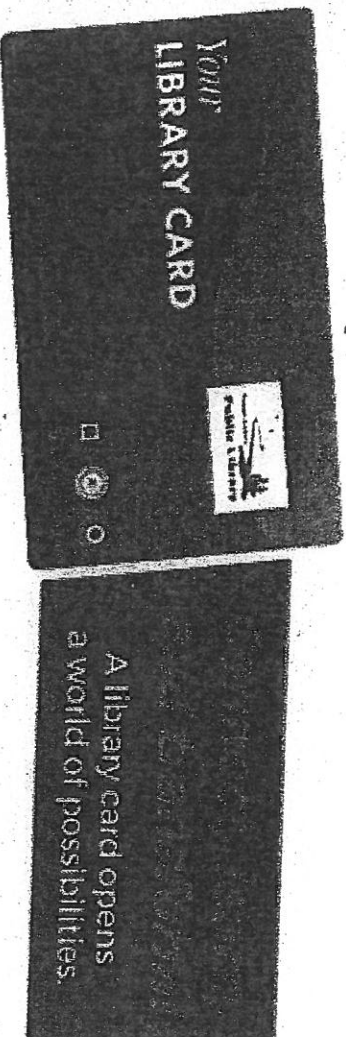

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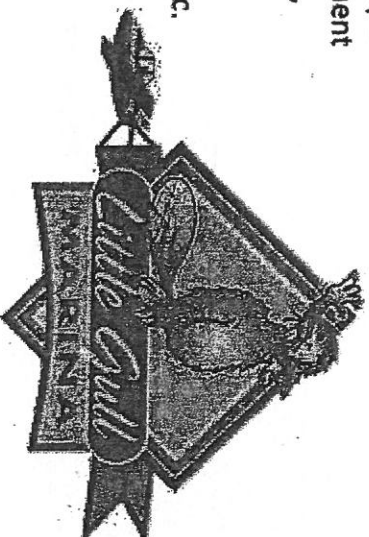

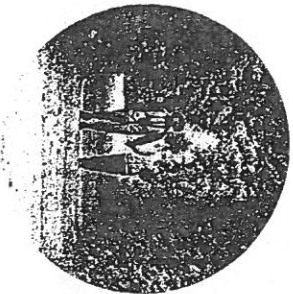

HIKERS | Action Plan

Think about the threat of invasive species when planning your next hike. Learn what you can do to make sure your love of nature doesn't accidentally harm the trails you visit.

1. STAY ON THE PATH

Stay on the paths designated for hiking in natural areas to avoid picking up invasive seeds on your shoes and spreading them.

2. CLEAN YOUR GEAR

Check all of your hiking gear at the end of your outing for plants and mud that might be carrying invasive plant seeds or fragments.

3. GROOM YOUR PET

Make sure your pets don't bring back an invader from the forest. Look over them at the end of the trail and wash or brush off any mud, seeds or plant parts. Stop invasive plants from hitching a ride and spreading to new areas..

4. REPORT ALL INVADERS

Call the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters' Invading Species Hotline at 1-800-563-7711 to report an invasive species sighting or download the EDDMaps Ontario app to report an invader on the spot.

5. STOP THE INVASION

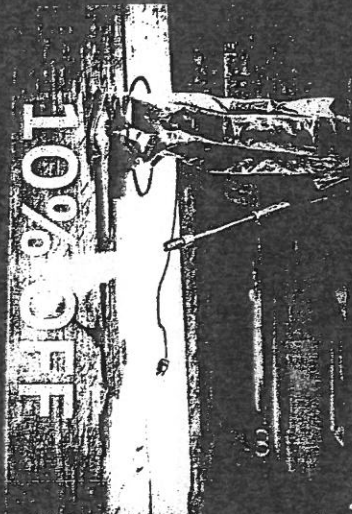

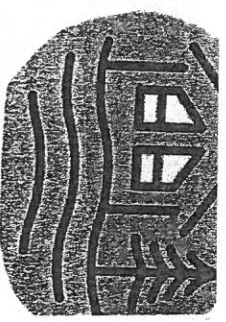

Bear Wise Tips and Tools

Most human-bear conflicts occur when bears are attracted by smells and rewarded with an easy meal. When bears pick up a scent with their keen noses, they will investigate it – even at your cottage. If bears are rewarded with feasts of bird food, garbage or pet food, they will return as long as the food source is available. It takes all cottagers working together to eliminate these attractants and to stop bear problems.

Whether you are closing the cottage for the season, or just between stays, you can take a few simple precautions to avoid problems with bears and other animals.

Here are some tips to help avoid these unwanted visitors:

- Fill bird feeders only through the winter months
- Keep your pets on a leash
- Store garbage in a bear-resistant container with a tight-fitting lid, secure shed or garage.
- Do not store garbage in plywood boxes, old freezers or vehicles
- Do not stockpile garbage – take it to an approved waste disposal site regularly
- If you have garbage pickup, only put garbage out on garbage day, not the night before.
- Keep meat scraps in the freezer until garbage day
- Remove grease and food residue from barbecue grills, including the grease trap, after each use.
- Do not use outdoor fridges or freezers, including beverage fridges, as these may attract bears to your property
- Do not put meat, fish or sweet food (including fruit) in your outdoor composter
- Pick all ripe fruit off trees, and remove vegetables and fallen fruit from the ground
- Never purposely feed bears (or other wildlife) or try to approach them
- Encourage your neighbour to be bear wise.

When leaving your cottage make sure to:

- Remove your garbage: take it home or drop it off at an approved waste disposal site on your way.
- Use a strong disinfectant to eliminate all odours from garbage and recycling containers and lids
- Never discard cooking grease outside; Place in a container with a lid, transfer it to a plastic bag and include it with other properly stored garbage
- Take our barbecue with you when you leave the cottage, or clean it and store it in a secure shed
- Do not leave any food or food scraps outdoors for pets or other wildlife
- When packing up, remember to remove all the food from the inside of your cottage. A box of pudding or fruit-flavoured dessert mix is all it takes to attract a bear.
- Do not leave scented products outside. Even no-food items like suntan lotion, insect repellent, soap, and candles attract bears.
- Close and lock all window and doors
- If you are away for an extended period of time, have someone you trust check in and look for signs of a bear visitor or break in
- If you rent your cottage, tell your tenants the importance of being Bear Wise.

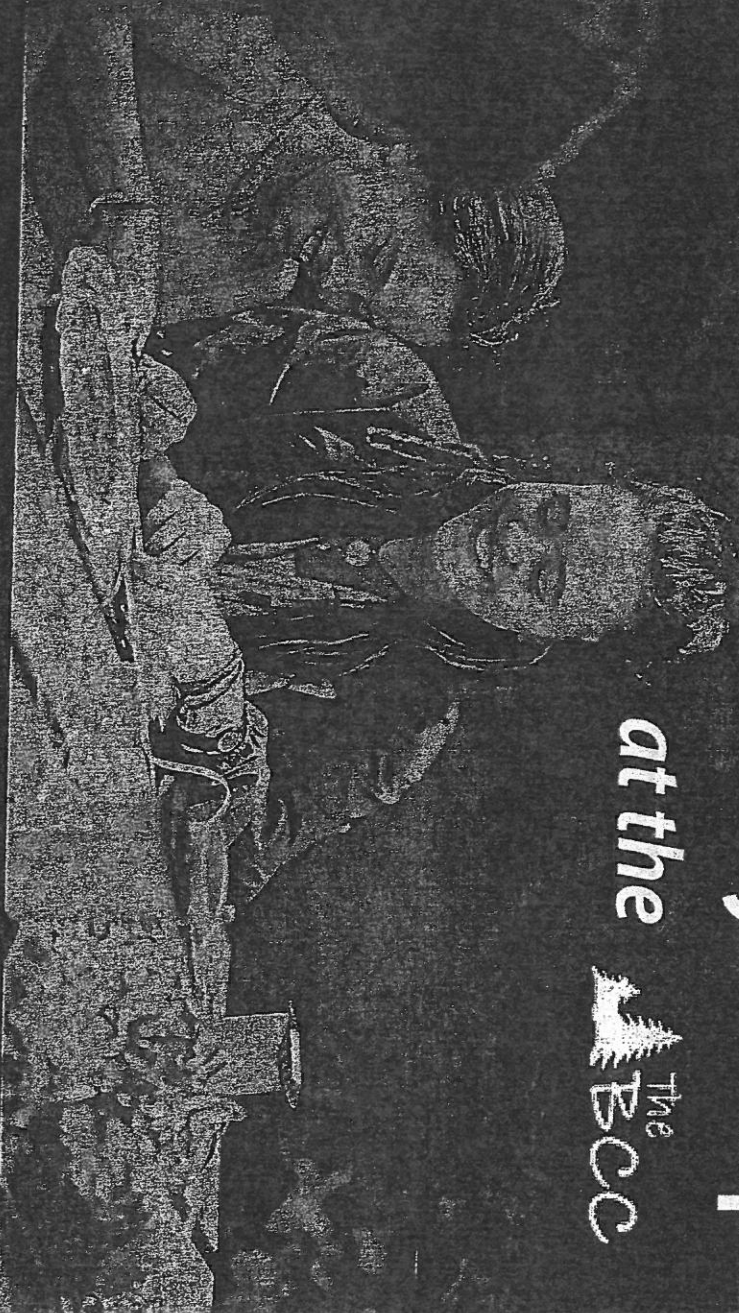


Weather predictions for this month.

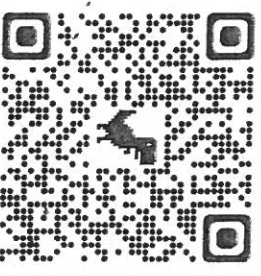

It's a Part of Our History

Pearson's Landing (cont.)

During the years that the Asling family owned Pearson's Landing they increased the docking area as well as adding gas pumps and a shop for repairing motors. A building was constructed to provide winter storage of boats for their customers, most of whom had water access only to their cottages. There was now dock slips for approximately 110 boats and the parking area was also increased to meet the need.

One of the popular events held every summer was the Catchacoma Regatta which was held for many years at Pearson's Landing. The long sandy beach was the perfect setting for the event. Hundreds of people would set up their lawn chairs to visit with their neighbours and watch the swimming, canoeing, sailing and boat races.

In 1970 Lil and Roy Asling sold the marina and moved to the highway and Bill and Audrey Judge were the owners of the Landing for the next five years. Judges sold the landing to the Kjaer brothers, Eric and Martin, who made a few changes to the property, before selling it to Marilyn and Gary Weitzel in 1976.

The Weitzel family operated the Landing for another decade when they stopped operating as Pearson's Landing. Marilyn and Gary severed two lots for their children and kept the lot with the house as their own. They had a home based office for their real estate business and enjoyed having their children and grandchildren close by.

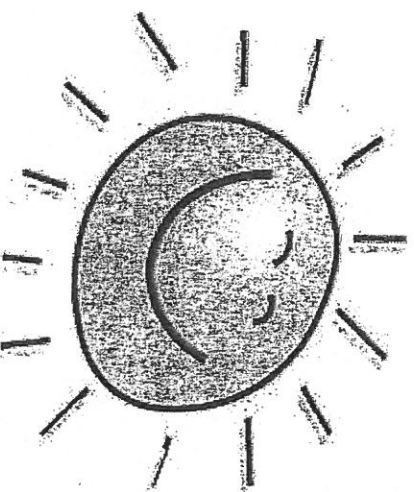

Summer Safety Tips

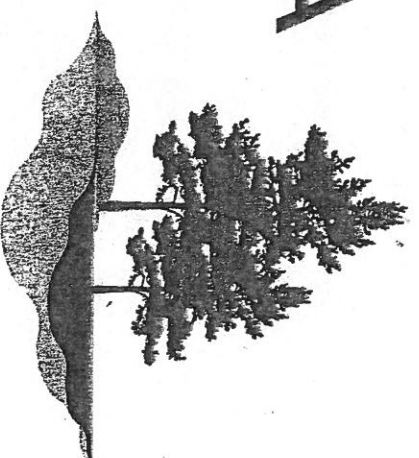


- Do not allow children to get near fireworks, stoves, or grills. Make sure that all flammable and combustible materials are out of their reach. Never allow them to play with matches, candles, or lighters.
- Bring a fire extinguisher or fire blanket to your outdoor trip. This way, you can easily extinguish fire before it grows out of hand. Fire accidents can happen anytime and it always pays to be prepared.
- Before you use a grill, check first the connection between the propane tank and fuel line to see if this is not blocked. See to it that you do not overfill the propane tank.
- Douse hot coals with plenty of water before disposing of them. Never put them inside plastic, paper or wooden trash bins or containers.
- During picnics or camping trips, avoid building campfires. If you do build one, make sure you keep it small and that you douse it with water to put it out completely. Never leave the camping area without putting out the campfire. Check with your local fire department, municipality or Ministry of Natural Resource to ensure there is not a fire ban in effect.
- Inspect fire equipment at home. Ensure your fire extinguisher is in top condition. If you see anything suspicious like a leak in the nozzle, have it repaired or checked by a professional immediately.
- Double check plugs and switches at home before you leave. If you are going on a trip or picnic at be sure that everything is unplugged and turned off before you leave the house.

- Formulate an escape route for the house or cottage. Practice fire drills regularly at least twice a year. Leave emergency numbers near the telephone.
- Use barbecue grills away from the house, from the tent, or from anything that can easily catch fire.
- When checking in at a hotel, B&B, motel or renting a seasonal property, do not forget to consider the fire safety of the place. Examine if there are fire exits, firefighting equipment, working smoke detectors and clear signage of the escape route.
- When using a lawnmower, never fuel it while it is still hot. Give it a few minutes to cool down.
- If outside and your clothes catch fire, use the STOP, DROP and ROLL method. Use a fire extinguisher to put out a small fire that is not yet spreading. Call the fire department immediately.
