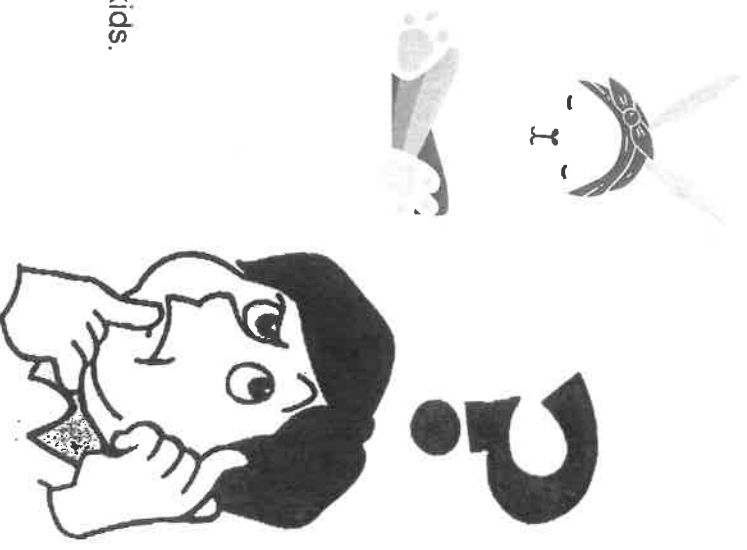

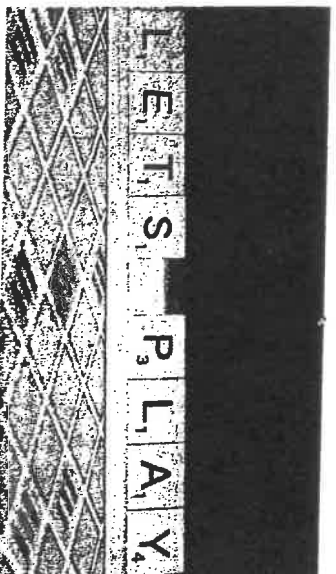

said "We have taken from Cavendish for years. Let's give the permanent people something back." Now we draw up our plans and

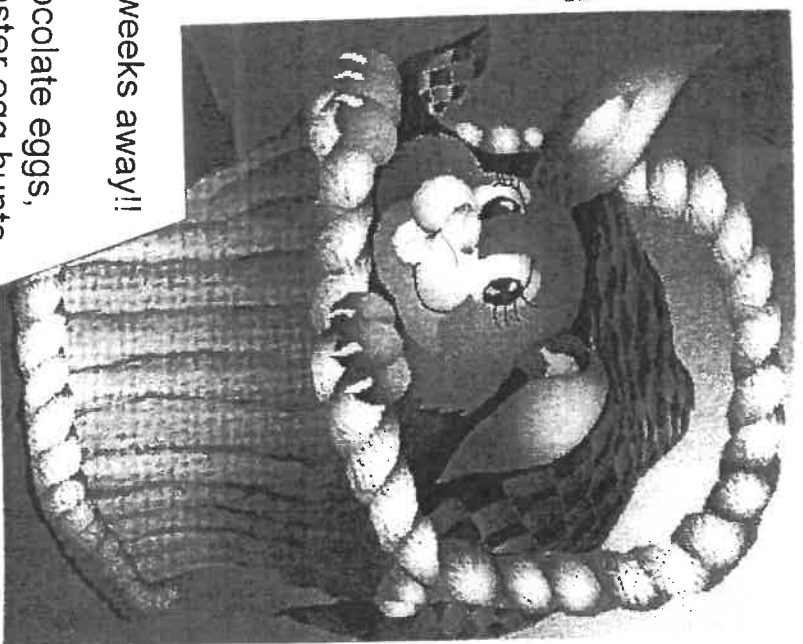
retired people it is charged out at minimum wage. We form a building committee of 6 men and 1 woman. Their average age is 67.

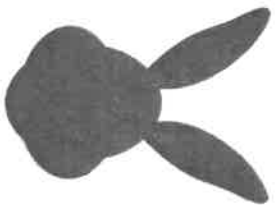

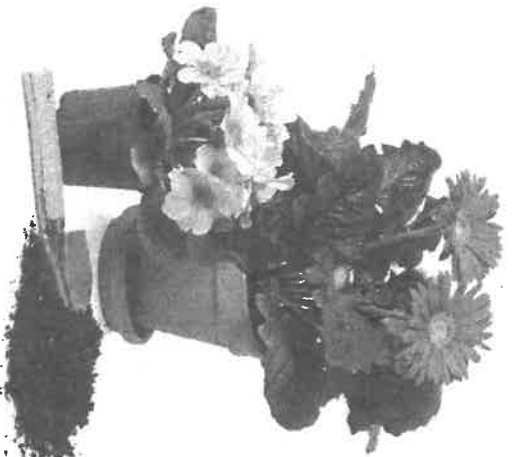

Recipe of the Month

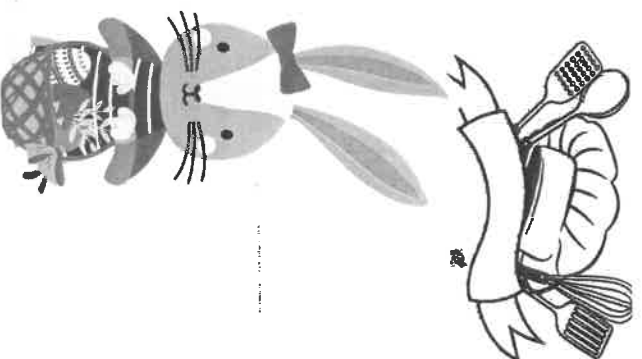
FANTASTIC FUDGE BROWNIES

1 cup butter
2 cups sugar
4 heaping Tbsp cocoa
4 eggs, beaten
1 cup flour
1 cup chopped walnuts
1 tsp vanilla

Icing:
2 cups icing sugar
2 Tbsp butter
2 Tbsp cocoa
2 Tbsp boiling water
2 Tbsp vanilla

Cream sugar, cocoa and butter together. Add beaten eggs and vanilla. Add flour and fold in walnuts. Bake in greased 9x13 inch pan at 335°F for 40 to 50 minutes. The top will appear to be underdone (falls in middle), but don't overbake. They should be moist and chewy.

Icing: Beat ingredients together with electric mixer. Add icing immediately after removing from oven so it will melt and glaze.



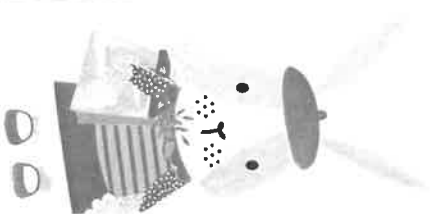
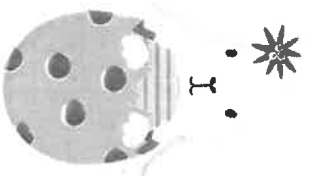

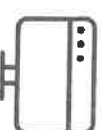




What to do if your home is flooded?

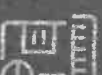

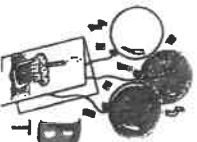

Smoke-Free Enforcement at Local Arenas

Residents Reminded No Smoking or Vaping on Rec Centre Property

Under the Smoke-Free Ontario Act (SFOA), it is illegal to smoke or vape on the property or within 20 metres of all community recreation facilities, such as arenas, in Ontario. While this law has been unchanged since 2018, community members often benefit from periodic reminders. In January, Peterborough Public Health (PPH) shared a letter with all municipal recreation managers to be sent to all facilities' user groups regarding SFOA legislation and resources.

Additionally, over the past four weeks, Tobacco Enforcement Officers (TEOs) from PPH have visited 14 community recreation facilities within the region. In that time, TEOs have engaged in 40 educational conversations and given 22 warnings. As part of a progressive enforcement campaign, the TEOs will be escalating to issuing tickets immediately. So far, one ticket has been issued for smoking at a local arena this year. Under the SFOA, the fine for a first offence of smoking or vaping on arena property is \$305. TEOs have observed that while overall compliance remains high, there has been an increase in the number of people vaping instead of smoking cigarettes compared to previous years. It's important for the public to understand that both smoking and vaping are prohibited.

Smoke- and vape-free spaces offer many benefits to individuals and the community. The vast majority (about 90%) of Ontarians do not smoke, yet secondhand smoke or vapour can put everyone at risk. Secondhand vapour contains several heavy metals and ultrafine particles that are dangerous to inhale, and there is no safe level of exposure to second-hand smoke or vapour. Smoke- and vape-free spaces also support social norms to prevent smoking and vaping; youth, are particularly susceptible to thinking of smoking as "normal", acceptable behaviour when they are exposed to it often and in various settings. Among those who do smoke, nearly half report wanting to quit; smoke-free spaces have been shown to help people with their quit attempts.

Ontario Health Units take a progressive enforcement approach to the SFOA, starting with warnings and then progressing to charges if the behaviour is not corrected. In 2024, one charge and 24 warnings were issued for violations under the SFOA at beaches, parks, and the hospital property. Residents can report smoking or vaping violations by calling 705-743-1000 or online at www.peterboroughpublichealth.ca/report-secondhand-smoke-vapour.

Egg-cup chick

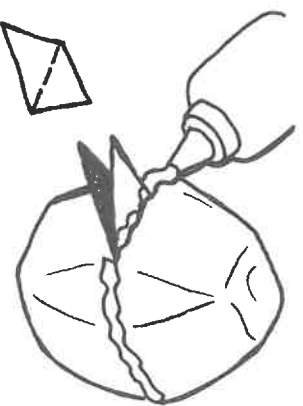

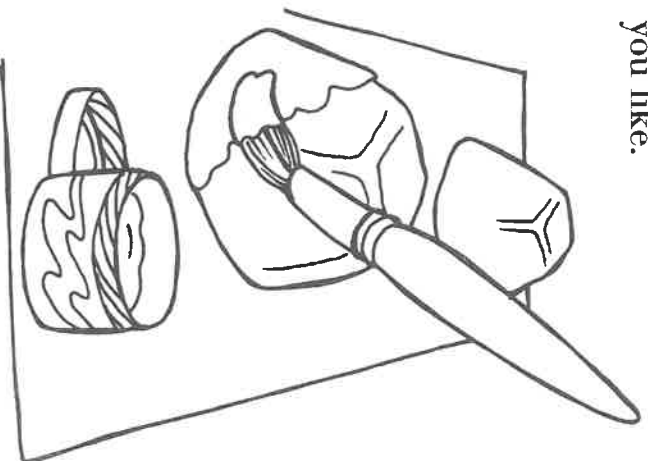
1. Cut two egg cups out of the carton. Trim them so they are smooth and straight all around.

The OPP Visits the Buckhorn Library

What Happened

As promised last month, the Peterborough Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) came to the Buckhorn Library in early March. The impressive officers (Inspector Chris Galeazza, Staff Sergeant Angie Kerr and Constable Dan Gay) who visited were delightful – sociable, informative, amusing, always compassionate, and always responsible and professional. They told us much about their current approaches to handling the matters that turn up on their doorsteps. A statement we heard often that afternoon was that “you can’t arrest your way out of ...” many, many common situations.

Of course, I was there to ask about the problem of blindingly bright car headlights. The short answer is that, apparently, the light systems on newer vehicles are within accepted legal limits, although most people I talk to also find them blinding. Our only option is to lobby political officials to change the laws. One of these days I will have to find out exactly what level of government is responsible – probably a night I am sitting at home because I can no longer see to drive after dark.

Aside from my question, the 3 officers addressed queries about intimate partner violence; use of tasers; fraud; alcoholism and drug addiction; speeding and other challenges on the 507; and community policing contacts. I am planning articles on several of these topics in upcoming newsletters.

What’s Next?

The OPP will be back in a few months to talk much more about fraud and how we can reduce our chances to being scammed. I’m sure you know people who have been scammed through the Internet or by a highly convincing telephone call. I was very tempted by the offer of a free CAA roadside emergency kit – it appeared to have everything you could reasonably expect for nothing, except an evaluation of my last interaction with CAA. Oh, and \$2.99 for delivery. At that point I figured that the \$2.99 wasn’t worth the paperwork so it must be my credit card information that was the real cost. Exciting News about The Catchacoma (Old-growth Hemlock) Forest and Curve Lake

You may remember that last summer I mentioned public hikes in the Catchacoma Old-growth Hemlock Forest. To help preserve this forest, our local enthusiasts (the Catchacoma Forest Stewardship Committee [CFSC]) continue to organize hikes, once again with the assistance of Katie Krelove from the Wilderness Committee. A hike on February 1 this year involved about 20 hardy souls, including quite a contingent from Peterborough (and Ruby the dog). And, any minute now (April 12, rain date April 13; 12-3 pm) there will be another celebratory hike, with representatives from Curve Lake. What will we be celebrating?

As CFSC member Peter Currier notes, “The forest in its totality is a unique organism with interconnections at root and ground levels that are intricate and unknowable – natural relationships that have taken more than a century to form an ecological community. To honour the forest, both Water and Fire ceremonies by Curve Lake elders are planned for this special event.”

The CFSC website (<https://catchacomaforest.org/news-page>) reports that it “is grateful to have the support of Curve Lake First Nation Chief and Council in our efforts to secure protected status for Catchacoma Forest, located within Treaty 20 territory and the traditional homelands of the Michi Saagig Anishnaabeg.

“In December 2024 Chief Keith Knott sent a letter to provincial authorities expressing support for the CFSC proposal to designate Catchacoma Forest as a protected area under the Protected Parks and Conservation Reserves Act (PPCRA).”

It happened this Month....

April 4th, 1885 – Film director Allan Dwan is born in Toronto. He began his career making silent westerns in Hollywood. In 1922, he directed Douglas Fairbanks in Robin Hood.

April 9th, 1917 – On Easter Monday, four Canadian divisions and one British brigade capture Vimy Ridge, near Arras, France. Though they suffered more than 10,000 casualties, including 3,598 dead, it was a brilliant victory for members of the Canadian Corps.

April 12th, 1960 – Hockey Night in Canada sportscaster Ron MacLean was born.

April 14th, 1945 –troops of the First Canadian Army liberate Arnhem, Holland, after two days of fighting.

April 20th, 1973 – the telecommunications satellite Anik A-2 is launched from Cape Canaveral, Florida. With its launch, Canada became the first country in the world to employ geostationary satellites for domestic communications.

April 21st, 1965 – Hockey Hall of Famer Ed Belfour was born.

April 27th, 1967 – Expo 67 opens in Montreal. It was the highlight of Canada's centennial celebrations, with sixty-two countries participating, along with thousands of private exhibitors and sponsors.

April 28th, 1827 – first black Victoria Cross winner William Hall was born.

April 29th, 1967 – Hockey player Curtis Joseph was born.

April 30th, 1905 – Human rights advocate John Peters Humphrey is born in Hampton, New Brunswick. The first director of the United Nation's Division of Human Rights, he was the principle drafter of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which was adopted in 1948.

Burn Permits are required - you must have a permit for ANY open air burning. Fire Permits are available on line through the Municipality of Trent Lakes web site or phone 705-738-3800 extension #301 or 1-800-374-4009 Extension #301.

Renewals for Existing CDCP Clients

Starting in March 2025, the Government of Canada will begin its annual reassessment of the eligibility of individuals currently covered under the plan to confirm that they continue to meet all eligibility requirements. Canadians already covered under the CDCP will be required to renew their application for the next benefit year by submitting a renewal application.

Current clients who have filed their 2024 tax return and received their Notice of Assessment from the Canada Revenue Agency will be able to renew their CDCP dental coverage through one of the following channels:

- Renewal streamlined application, available online on Canada.ca
- Renewal application, available through My Service Canada Account (MSCA)
- Interactive Response System (not available for applications with dependent(s))
- By phone, with a call centre officer
- In Person

To avoid a gap in coverage, applications for renewals must be submitted by **June 1, 2025**. If a client fails to submit their application to renew or no longer meets the eligibility requirements, their coverage will end on **June 30, 2025**.

To be eligible for the CDCP, individuals need to:

- Be a Canadian resident for tax purposes.
- Have filed their taxes for the previous year;
- Have an adjusted family net income of less than \$90,000 per year; and,
- Not have access to private or employer/pension sponsored dental coverage.

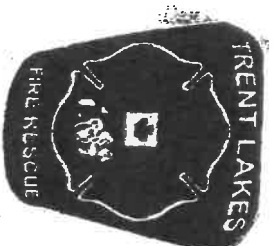

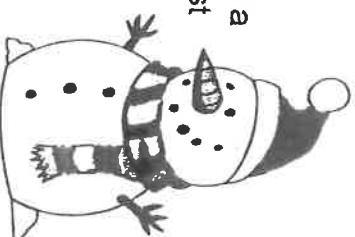

 - A Public Washroom Location and Maintenance Strategy has been developed. **NOTE:** 10 public washrooms are available seasonally.
