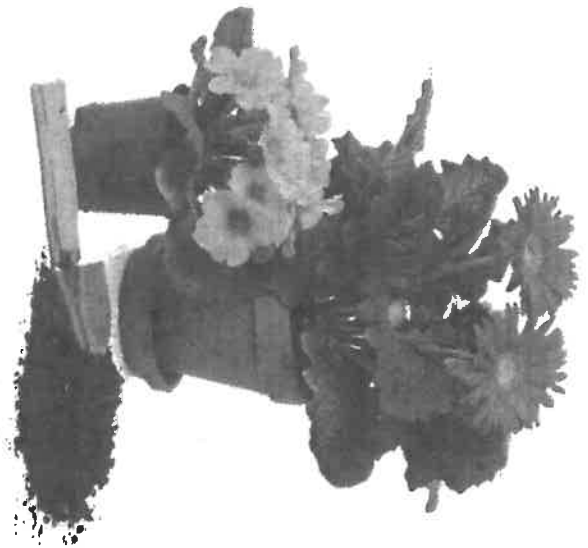

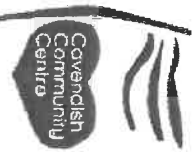

## Recipe of the Month



### CRISPY BAKED BARBECUED CHICKEN

- |                           |                                 |
|---------------------------|---------------------------------|
| 1/2 cup fine bread crumbs | 1/4 tsp celery seed             |
| 1 tsp brown sugar         | 1/8 tsp cayenne (or more)       |
| 1 tsp chili powder        | 2 1/2 lb broiler fryer chicken, |
| 1/2 tsp garlic powder     | cut up                          |
| 1/4 tsp dry mustard       | 1/4 cup margarine               |

Combine bread crumbs, sugar and spices. Season chicken with salt and pepper. Brush each piece with melted margarine and roll in the bread crumb mixture. Arrange in pan, not touching each other, and sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Bake uncovered in 375° F oven for 50 minutes or until tender. Do not turn. Makes 6 servings.

# It's a Part of Our History

## Seniors were the driving force behind new community centre

CATCHACOMA — Galway-Cavendish Reeve Bill Barnes says the new Cavendish Community Centre just south of here will encourage community activities in the area.

"It will certainly be a central focus of social activity up there," Barnes said this week.

"I think it's tremendous — it will be a real meeting and gathering spot for all ages."

Senior citizens were the driving force which built the centre using mainly volunteer labor.

But young people, too, pitched in by doing such things as installing drywall in a high ceiling area on the upper floor of the facility.

And cottagers and their associations have helped with things like cash donations for the project which includes a baseball diamond.

"All of our activities up to now have taken place in the (neighbouring) firehall garage," said Lloyd Bowen, 66, a member of the volunteer building committee.

"For any activities there, we had to move the fire truck outside."

The new community centre, serving Cavendish Township, is on Highway 507, about 15 kilometres north of Highway 36 and just south of Beaver Lake Road.

"We needed some other place to meet, other than a garage," Bowen said. "We had to have a (proper) meeting hall."

Total cost of the project — including construction and furnishings — is estimated at \$325,000.

Of that, \$150,000 comes from a Wintario grant.

The balance — \$175,000 — comes from the local community with Galway-Cavendish Township kicking in \$50,000. Cavendish Culture and Recreation Sub-Committee contributing \$30,000 from the proceeds of a variety of fund-raisers such as dances, auctions and bake sales; donated labor worth \$80,000; and the short-fall of \$35,000 which is to be covered by a mortgage.

Ownership of the building was turned over to the township by the culture and recreation sub-committee last Saturday at the grand opening of the building.

That was followed by a dance. "We have built not only a building, but I think we are building a community, too," Bowen said.

The project has brought the town-

ship together, he said, to create something that will benefit many people.

The fire hall's use as a fire hall and also as a make-shift community centre saw it used for such things as a church, library, dancing spot, and a meeting location for cottage associations.

"It's like I moved out of the slums and into a mansion," said Louise Jackson, 64, referring to the new building. "I think this will make this a tighter-knit community."

As a helper at the library which until now has been run out of the firehall, Jackson will now find herself in more spacious accommodation when the library reopens in the new building.

The new building also means a wider range of activities — such as craft and exercise programs, darts, table tennis, snooker and shuffle board — can be added to the more limited recreational events that were possible in the firehall.

Events in the community centre will include church services, bingo, card parties and dances.

Cavendish has about 220 permanent residents, a figure that swells by about 10 times when seasonal residents arrive in the summer.

Construction on the building started about 14 months ago.

Lloyd Bowen said a survey sent to Cavendish property owners had a return rate of 53 per cent of which about 90 per cent supported the proposal to build the centre.

Some who opposed the project now support it, he said.

About 40 people — including permanent residents and cottagers — donated their time to help build the facility.

The building committee — which did much of the work and has an average age of 67 — is comprised of Bowen, Jack Clarke, John Jackson, Ernie Lockwood, Oliver Lloyd, Jack Reynolds and Evelyn Robertson.

John Jackson estimated construction of the building alone — not counting furnishings — would have been about \$450,000 if volunteer labor had not been used.

Some of those who helped build it have a construction background.

But others are retired from occupations including accounting, engineering and truck driving.

"It's just fantastic what these

people have been able to do," Lloyd Bowen said.

Women helping with the project have installed insulation, painted, and kept the construction site clean.

Some things were contracted out to contractors: drilling of a well, installation of the septic system, pouring of the concrete floor, taping of the drywall and some ceiling work, installation of the main electrical pannel (but not of the rest of the wiring) and the above-ground block work.

Bowen said one of the most difficult jobs was putting the steel roof on.

The sheets making up the roof — 58 of them — are 26 feet long and required 85 screws each to fasten into place.

Some of the contracting and supplies were provided at discounted prices.

With two storeys, the new building has about four times as much space as the firehall.

The new building is 70 feet by 40 feet.

The upper level has a main hall seating 140 people, a main kitchen and washrooms.

On the lower level, about 60 people can be seated in the main meeting room. The library room and a small kitchen are on that floor, plus two storage rooms and washrooms. Both floors are accessible by wheelchair.

Decorative block and steel siding are on the outside of the building.

The baseball diamond in the future might be used as an emergency landing spot for helicopters transporting injured people.

"The fire chief is delighted we are leaving," joked Bowen's wife, Helen, 68.

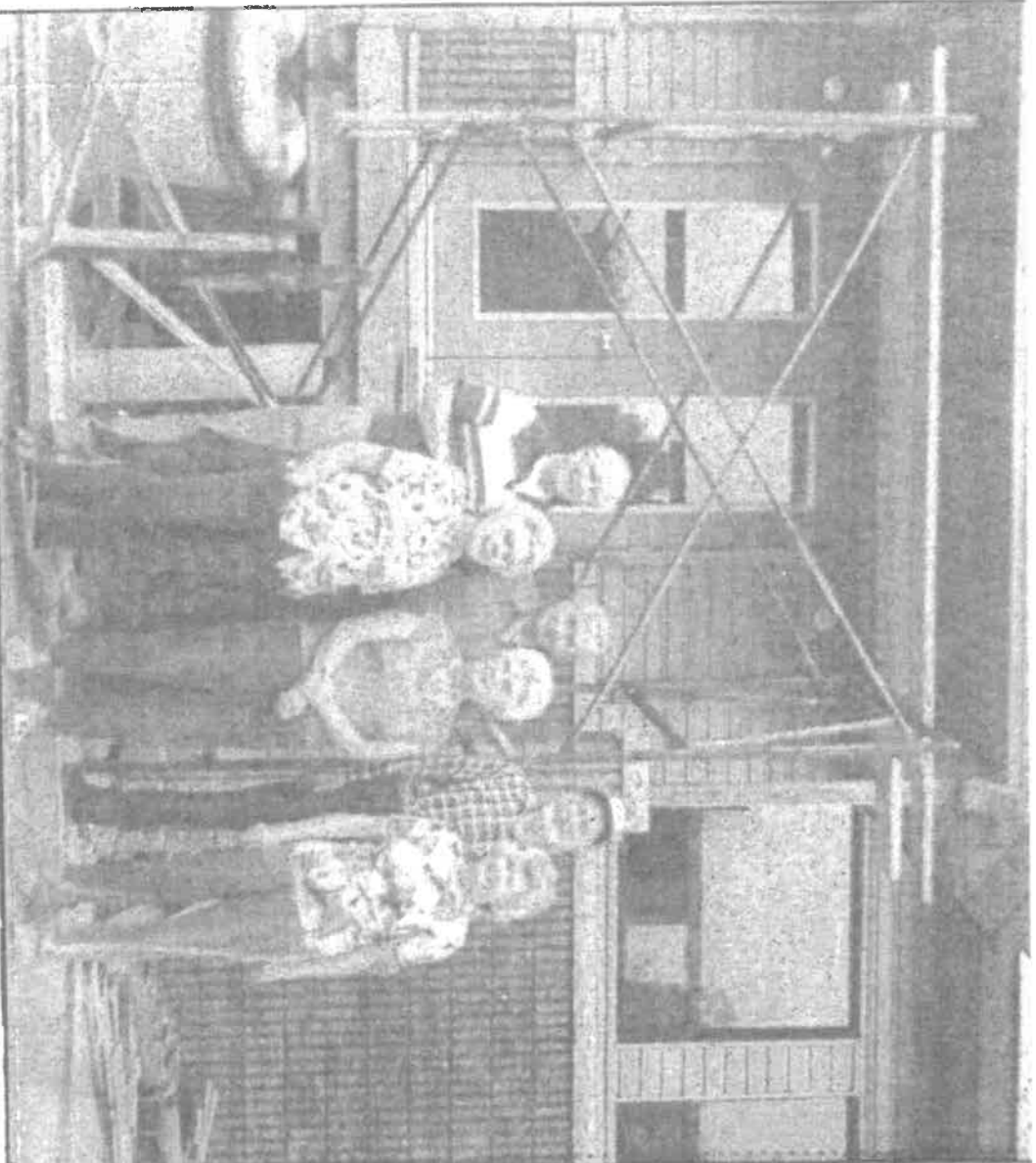

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# Candles

Candles can be a serious fire hazard if not used properly. There are a number of things you can do to reduce the health and safety risks when burning candles.

- Use flameless candles whenever possible.
- Extinguish all candles before going to bed or leaving the room. Never leave burning candles unattended.
- Do not extinguish a candle with water. Snuff it instead.
- Do not burn candles on or near anything that can catch fire (like curtains, bedding, combustible decorations, and clothing).
- Keep candles out of the reach of children and pets.
- Place burning candles somewhere they cannot be knocked over.
- Cut candle wicks short to prevent high flames.
- Use sturdy candle holders that won't easily tip over.
- Avoid placing lit candles on flammable surfaces.

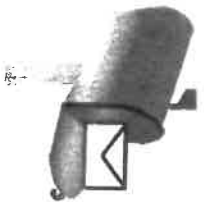

Dear Editor

In regards to the bright headlights, it isn't always about how bright they are, but also about how they are "aimed" or positioned.

I have done some investigating, as my wife's SUV has those pesky lights and we sometimes get flashed, as if our high beams are on. The issue seems to be that auto-makers have gotten lazy. For example, headlights in most older vehicles are actually adjustable. You can point the beam left, right, up or down, to get good illumination of the road without blinding people. When I took my wife's SUV into the dealer and asked them to adjust the lights, they informed me that new cars no longer come with adjustments.

So, apparently, some dummies at the design stage have now set the headlights aiming far too high. (This seems to have happened mainly in imports, but is also in some local brands.) If you are in a vehicle that is lower than a newer SUV, you are going to be blinded.

**People need to petition the government or pressure dealers so that any vehicles without adjustable headlights are banned from sale in Canada. Unfortunately, this may well be a losing battle :( Any takers?**

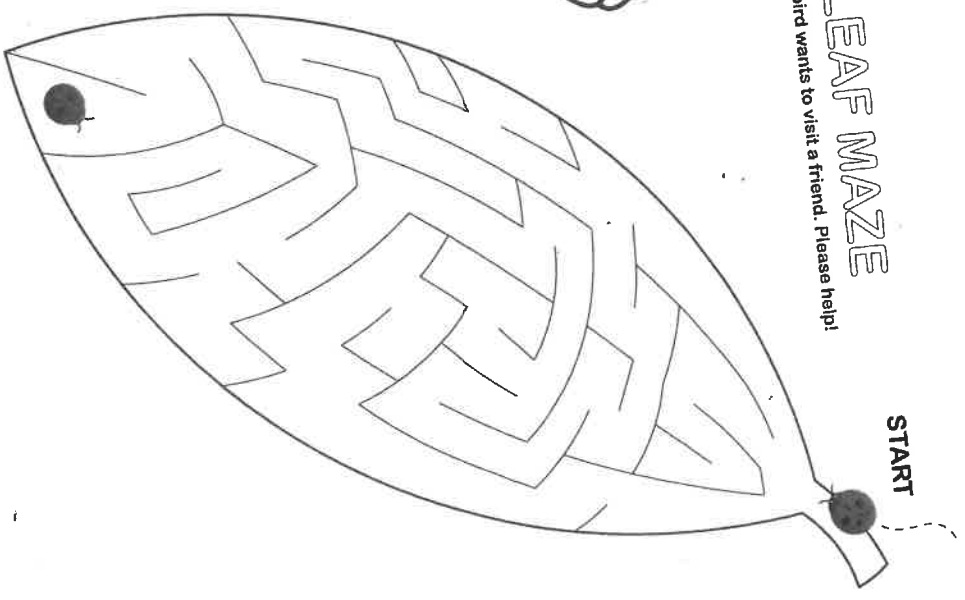

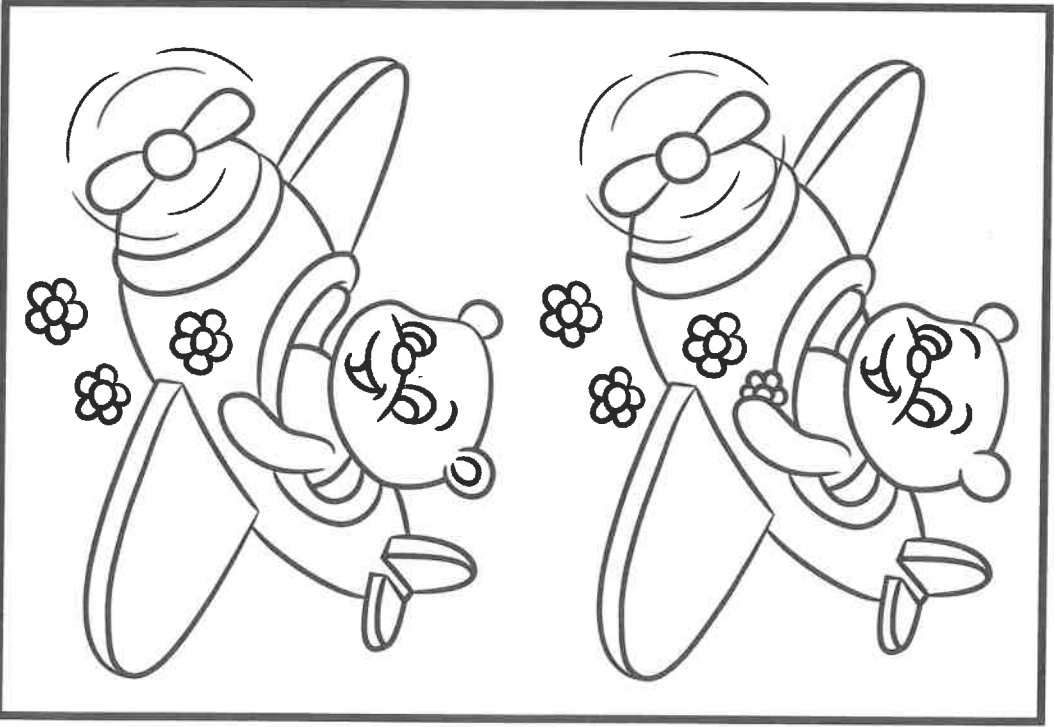
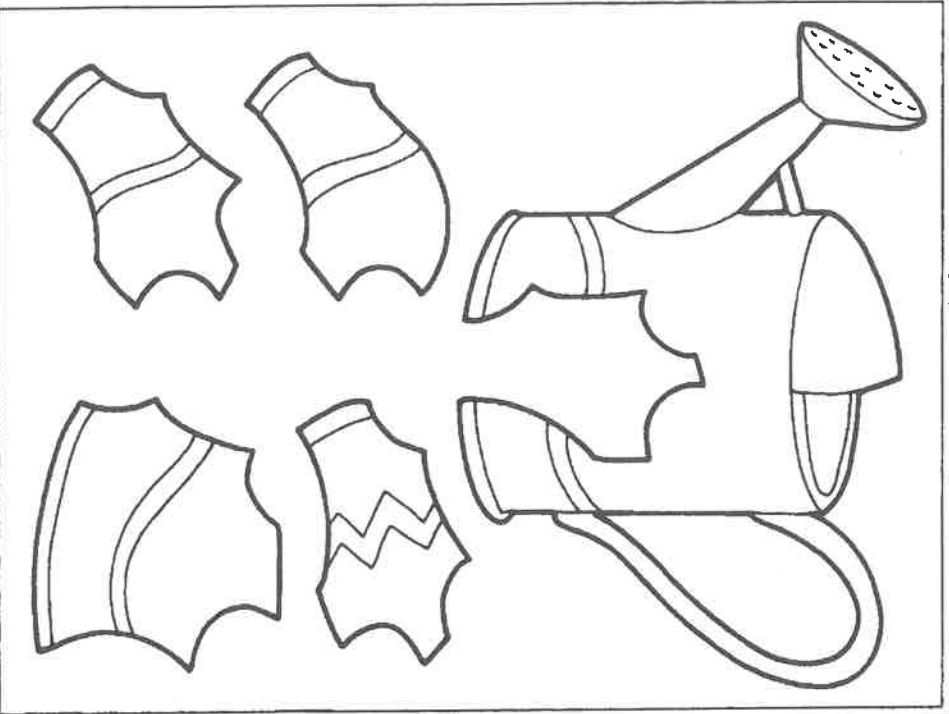

## It happened this Month.....

- May 1<sup>st</sup>, 1997 – The Red River reaches its peak in the worst flood in southern Manitoba since 1950.

## Cavendish Round-up

### When Will Someone Do Something about Highway 507? Well, Actually, This Summer!

I have been told that Highway 507 is the most deadly road in Peterborough County. I'm still trying to confirm that but I will get back to you.

Highway 507 often seems to be like the old joke about the weather – everyone complains about it but no one ever does anything about it. This summer though, some things are in the works (the road works – pun unintended).

You may remember that last year there was one of those speed sensors across the road near the Charlie Allen Road. The black cord we drove over was attached to a solar speed sign that records your speed and is supposed to show you what it is. Much of the time it just showed a flashing light, but it did actually record the speed. It revealed that the average speed in that 80-km area was 96 km! All of which tells me that every one of us who drives along that road can do something about the dangerous road – **stop speeding so much!**

#### **I can hear it now – ha, ha, as if that's going to happen.**

Fortunately, Peterborough County is also taking action this summer. 507 is a county road and, therefore, while our Trent Lakes Council is probably more concerned than any other level of government, it is the county that has to make the decision to do something. As it happens, our mayor and deputy mayor sit on County Council, and Harvey Councillor John Braybrook keeps an eye on road issues and, from time to time, makes a motion at Trent Lakes Council to update them with information to take to the County Council (e.g., July 16, 2024).

As I am writing this, I have received an electronic copy of the county's Road Safety Audit Report (2024). Wow! It is thorough and detailed (from Flynn's Corner to the Beaver Lake Road), well organized and comprehensive in its recommendations. Later this year I will write in more detail about its reflections and recommendations. In the meantime, suggestions for work this year include:

- regrading the shoulder at Tiedeman's corner so water (and ice) does not pool on the roadway
- improving the deteriorating road surfaces between Charlie Allen Road and Mississauga Dam Road
- improving the slope of the roadway and removing brush blocking motorists' sight lines at the Mississauga Dam Road, and
- possibly, providing road signs to improve "wayfinding" for northbound traffic approaching the Cavendish Community Centre entrance.

So, don't be surprised if you have to slow or stop for roadworks in any of these areas this summer. On the other hand, don't be surprised if these plans are delayed because of the devastation our ice storm created for the county's budget this year.

### Great News about Community Policing in Cavendish

You know that building nestled between the Cavendish Fire Hall and the Community Centre? You may never have been inside it – after all it has been closed and inaccessible for the last few years because, alas, wood structures don't last forever. However, the dangerous deck has now been removed and the building – named for Roy Lawson is about to reopen and be staffed starting next month.

How did this happen? Who was Roy Lawson? What happens there? All will be revealed in June. Actually, some of it is revealed elsewhere in this issue of the newsletter – look for the poster entitled **Community Report**(Volunteers Needed). Hey, this means you have an opportunity to become part of the resurrection of this service. Me too – the listed requirements do not actually exclude an old girl like me, and I find the more involved I am with our community, the more fun I have.

### Stay Tuned for the Old-growth Hemlock Forest Hike and Ceremonies

Sadly, the hike and ceremonies associated with the Old-growth Hemlock Forest announced for April 12 did not take place. At least not yet. Not really all that surprising, given the chaos in all our plans that was produced by the spring ice storm. By then, many people in Cavendish were still without Hydro and all the services and comforts (heat, coffee, charging!) that provides. Some had enough of a hike just to get to their cars or even out of their doors. No one was feeling the need of extra outdoor exercise that week.

And the forest itself did not escape damage. Not to mention the bridge over the creek that is incorporated into the hikes. That needs to be replaced. The storm also created havoc at Curve Lake, which has had the effect of delaying the visit of the elders to perform the much anticipated Water and Fire ceremonies.

## Stopping Substance Use Before It Starts – Local Youth Substance Use Prevention Initiative Introduced

*Local Agencies Collaborate to Bring the Icelandic Prevention Model Close to Home*

Stopping substance use before it starts is the aim of the new Peterborough Youth Substance Use Prevention (PYSUP) initiative. This week, 38 local community groups and leaders came together to learn about the new Peterborough Youth Substance Use Prevention (PYSUP) initiative. As a collaborative of local agencies, PYSUP aims to improve social environments where children live, learn, and play, to ultimately prevent or reduce substance use harm among youth.

To be successful, prevention of substance use must go beyond individual education. “To truly prevent youth from starting to use substances, our community needs to build a social environment where healthier choices are the easier, more accessible choices,” said Lora Keitel, Coordinator of the Peterborough Drug Strategy.

The initiative uses the Icelandic Prevention Model (IPM), a process first used in Iceland, wherein a community works together to improve social environments via supports and opportunities for youth, to prevent the initiation of substance use. Planet Youth, the organization who developed the program in Iceland, has since taken the IPM around the world, citing successes in more than 20 counties.

**Attendees included:** Peterborough Drug Strategy; Peterborough Public Health; Kawartha Pine Ridge District School Board; Peterborough Victoria Northumberland and Clarington Catholic District School Board; YMCA; Peterborough Community Health Centre; Peterborough Police Services; CMHA Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge; PARN Rainbow Youth Program; Rotary Club of Peterborough; Community Foundations of Greater Peterborough; Trent Community Research Centre; John Howard Society Peterborough; and local community members impacted by substance use. Jon Sigfusson, Planet Youth’s Chairman of the Board, also spoke virtually from Iceland at the event.

Last year, Peterborough was one of seven Canadian communities to be awarded a Public Health Agency of Canada grant to support working with Planet Youth to adapt the IPM to the local context. PYSUP has been generously supported with donations from the Community Foundation of Greater Peterborough (\$10,000) and CMHA HKPR (\$25,000). CMHA HKPR has also pledged to donate funds from [Change the Cycle](#) in June.

“I strongly believe we owe it to young people to do all we can to address these challenges, to wrap our arms as a community around them to ensure they have the best start possible,” Dr. Thomas Piggott, Medical Officer of Health, said in his address. “But we also owe it to young people to listen to and empower their voices.”

The IPM is rooted in community engagement; all decisions will be led by community voices – including youth, schools, parents, and community groups. “The work underway in Nogojiwanong speaks to what’s possible when a community leads with a deep understanding of the value of long-term, data-driven prevention,” said Jon Sigfusson. “It is a privilege for Planet Youth to stand alongside a people so committed to shaping healthier environments for their young people. Through sustained local leadership, supported by shared knowledge and collaboration, communities can lay the foundation for meaningful and enduring change.”

# North Kawartha and Trent Lakes Well Water Sampling Program Resumes

## Spring Melt Brings Higher Risk for Contamination of Well Water

The well water sampling drop off program will resume for the 2025 season on Tuesday April 22<sup>nd</sup> in the Township of North Kawartha and the Municipality of Trent Lakes. The program offers free water sample collection kit pick-up and sample drop-off through these municipal offices.

Beginning Tuesday, April 22<sup>nd</sup>, water samples can be dropped off at:

- **North Kawartha Municipal Office** – 280 Burleigh Street, Apsley, ON
  - Tuesdays and Thursdays, 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.
- **Trent Lakes Municipal Office** – 760 County Road 36, Trent Lakes, ON
  - Tuesday and Thursdays, 8:30 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.

Samples are then couriered to the Public Health Ontario Lab in Peterborough for testing. Empty sample bottles can be picked up from these offices at any time during regular business hours. Samples must be dropped off at the municipal offices within 24 hours of collection to ensure they reach the lab and are processed in a timely manner. Residents are encouraged to carefully read the sampling and collection instructions included with each kit. Filled sample bottles should be delivered to the front desk at the municipal office. Staff will then place it in a fridge until it is collected by the courier.

Well water testing is recommended at least twice a year, in the Spring and Fall. Water samples are tested for two types of bacterial contamination: total coliforms and *E. coli*. Anyone can become ill if they consume contaminated water, but young people, older adults, and immunocompromised individuals are at higher risk.

Water samples can also be dropped off year-round at the following locations:

- **Havelock-Belmont-Methuen Township Office**, 1 Ottawa Street, Havelock
  - Monday to Thursday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- **Peterborough Public Health**, 185 King Street, Peterborough
  - Monday to Thursday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
  - Friday., 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon
- **Public Health Ontario Laboratory**, 99 Hospital Drive
  - Monday to Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Residents will receive water quality results by mail or can call Public Health Ontario's Interactive Voice Response at 1-877-723-3426. If you have questions about your test results, please call the PPH Safe Water Program at 705-743-1000, ext. 232, for more information.

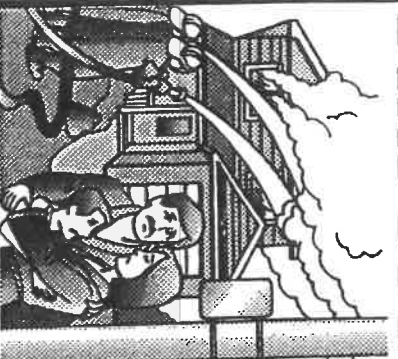
