## Gardening Tips

- Start summer-flowering bulbs like dahlias, gladioli, and lilies in pots indoors for planting out in a few months when the frosts are past
- It's time to plant first early potatoes. For the best results leave them in a cool, bright, frost-free place for a few weeks to produce shoooots, then plant them in grow bags or vegetable beds.
- If you need to move deciduous shrubs and trees, do it this month before they start growing again in spring.
- Sow tomato and chilli pepper seeds indoors on a sunny windowsill or in a greenhouse.
- Dig compost or well-rotted farmyard manure into vegetable beds to boost nutrient levels ready for the year's crops.
- Deadhead daffodils and other spring bulbs as they fade, but leave the foliage to die back.







They need to eat a lot more ahead of a storm. Lots of feeding deer could mean bad weather is approaching.







# Transport Canada Now Charges \$24 for Recreational Boat Licence

As of Dec 31, 2025, Transport Canada has made several updates to the Pleasure Craft Licence (PCL).

Beginning this year pleasure craft licences must be renewed every five years – and current lifetime licences will be gradually replaced with PCLs that must be renewed every five years. Beginning in 2028 wind-powered pleasure craft over six metres in length will also be required to hold a PCL.

Boaters will have to pay a \$24 service fee whenever they apply for – renew – transfer or replace their pleasure craft licence.

The following changes have taken effect as of December 31, 2025:

- new and renewed pleasure craft licences will only be valid for five years
- current lifetime licences will be gradually replaced with licences that must be renewed every five years.
- a \$24 service fee will apply to issuing, renewing, transferring, or replacing a Pleasure Craft Licence. This fee will be updated annually for inflation
- licence holders must now update their information within 30 days of a change in their name or address, instead of the previous 90 days.
- Applications for a Pleasure Craft Licence (PCL) payment of the new service fee, and requests for fee exemptions for those exercising section 35 treaty rights can be completed through Transport Canada's [website](#).

The Pleasure Craft Licence (PCL) is a unique identification number for recreational boats that have one or more engines whose combined power is at least 10 horsepower– similar to a car's license plate.

## Registered is different than licenced

According to the Transport Canada website, your pleasure craft *doesn't* need a licence if it is Registered in Canada. It needs to be registered if you:

- want a name for your pleasure craft
- need to register a marine mortgage with Transport Canada
- If you travel outside of Canada, most countries require your pleasure craft to be registered



You may be fined \$250 if your pleasure craft doesn't have a valid licence.





## Parents/Guardians Urged to Update Immunization Records to Avoid School Suspensions

### *Steps to Check, Update, or Book Your Child's Immunizations*

**(February 11, 2026)** – Lakelands Public Health is notifying parents and guardians of students in Grades 2 and 11 about the requirement to submit or update immunization records, as mandated by provincial legislation.

Under the Immunization of School Pupils Act (ISPA), students must have current immunization records or a valid exemption on file with their local health unit. Lakelands Public Health is actively collecting this information from Grades 2 and 11 families to support compliance. Students in these grades without up-to-date records may face school suspension starting March 31, 2026. Parents and guardians are encouraged to submit records to Lakelands Public Health promptly to avoid any disruption to their child's education.

#### Key Dates

- **March 9, 2026:** Suspension notices will be sent to schools for delivery to students to take home in their backpack.
- **March 31, 2026:** Suspensions start for any students who remain non-compliant under the ISPA.

"It's important for parents and guardians to report their child's immunization updates directly to Lakelands Public Health," said Marianne Rock, Manager, Vaccine and Preventable Diseases, from Lakelands Public Health. "Immunization information is not automatically shared by healthcare providers, so it is the responsibility of parents and guardians to ensure Lakelands Public Health is informed of any updates."

#### How to Check, Update, or Book Immunizations

Parents and guardians can check immunization records, submit updates or a valid exemption, or book an immunization appointment using the options below. Please note that immunization records are not automatically shared with Public Health by healthcare providers.

- **Check or Update Online**  
Access your child's immunization record through Immunization Connect Ontario (ICON) or submit updates using the Online Immunization Portal. Visit [LakelandsPH.ca/immunization](https://LakelandsPH.ca/immunization) to select the appropriate portal for your area.
- **Book an Immunization**  
Lakelands Public Health offers immunization clinics for individuals without a local healthcare provider. Clinics are available by appointment only. Visit [LakelandsPH.ca/immunization](https://LakelandsPH.ca/immunization) to view clinic dates, times, and locations.
- **Submit an Exemption**  
Visit [LakelandsPH.ca/Exemption](https://LakelandsPH.ca/Exemption) to learn more about exemptions and the process for completion. Once submitted, a nurse will review the exemption and follow-up with you.
- **Call for Assistance**  
Parents and guardians can contact Lakelands Public Health by calling 1-866-888-4577 for support with checking or updating immunization records.

These efforts are supported by local school boards, including Kawartha Pine Ridge District School Board (KPRDSB), Trillium Lakelands District School Board (TLDSB), Conseil scolaire catholique MonAvenir, and the Peterborough, Victoria, Northumberland, and Clarington Catholic District School Board (PVMCCDSB).



## Things you might not have known about this month...

### Snowmobiling

- No ice is 100% safe. A minimum of 6 inches of clear hard ice is needed to support a snowmobile. Always check with local operators before heading out.
- Squalls and fog can get you lost, so carry a compass or GPS whenever you head out.
- If you're planning to snowmobile on ice, always wear a flotation suit, carry a throw rope, and never ride alone.

### Ice Fishing

- Make sure you have at least 4 inches of ice before you venture out on foot.
- Currents and disturbances can degrade ice, so avoid ice over flowing water, near creek outlets/inlets, dams, and water intakes.

- Carry a pair of ice picks, and wear a flotation suit. Both could be lifesavers.

### Cross-Country Skiing/Snowshoeing

- Always carry a map, a cell phone or a GPS.
- Make sure your ice is safe. Probe with your pole first and go around if you're unsure.
- Know your limitations, and don't push yourself so hard that you can't make it back.


### Tips for kids



## It's a Part of Our History

**\*\* Between the years of 1885 to 1912 the following places and things not only existed in the immediate areas of Bottle/Sucker Lakes but they were indeed a very functional part of the logging industry which took place here.**

### **The Alligator ....**

The Alligator was a steam driven, double paddle-wheeled boat, used mainly to move logs and log booms on the lakes. The boats had a crew of four --- log man, a captain, a deckhand and an engineer. The Alligator came complete with sleigh like runners on its flat bottom. This unique feature along with its own steam powered winch enabled the boat to actually winch itself from one lake, over dry land to the next lake. Back in the early days of logging, an alligator actually made it's way across Catchacoma Lake, up past the dam via logs laid down and pinned to the rocks, up Bottle Creek into Bottle lake around the bend, and up over the incline to Sucker Lake. The boat used the north side of the portage trail, to climb up around the hill and launch itself in Sucker Lake.

## “Old Age Ain’t for Sissies”

This quote is frequently attributed to Bette Davis, although it seems probable that she actually just popularized it. If you want to know more about the history of the saying, check out Wikipedia. If you neither know nor care who Bette Davis was, you may find my rant today of no interest. Or at least not yet.

This is not the article I had intended for this month. In fact, I have so many good stories on the go that I failed to finish any of them, at least partly because my life in old age keeps interfering with my living that life to my satisfaction.

Actually, I’m not sure that all my issues have to do with my age, though it is a helpful excuse. Some result from my resistance to being captured and held hostage by Big Tech. For example, when social media started to pop up like mushrooms after a rainy day, I decided I didn’t need it. When LinkedIn sought my friendship I was no longer in business so I said no.

Then came My Space, Facebook, Twitter (now X), Instagram, TikTok and so on. I felt (and feel) that if you can’t phone, email or text me, or see me in person, so be it. No one can have everything in life and I’m willing to live with that kind of restriction. That said, I have heard of situations where some official organizations think it is sufficient to communicate important information via social media – I believe that, during the 2020 Portapique (NS) tragedy, the RCMP used Twitter to notify potential victims. I can only hope that if I am ever in a similar situation, someone among my friends and neighbours will think to send me a heads up. In the meantime, I do not lack for contact with more than enough interesting and helpful people and organizations. But I am finding that just keeping up with the requirements of daily living has acquired extremely time-consuming and, to my mind, totally unnecessary extra steps, usually electronic ones that are supposedly there to help me and protect my privacy.

Balderdash! Anything we do electronically completely threatens our privacy. I am safer than most as I use open source hardware and software almost exclusively.

So, the short story is that I highly value both my time and my privacy. But does using an online “portal” protect either? (The word portal it makes me feel like a character in **Dr Who**.) I keep reading that it will improve my experience. So far, that has never happened, doubtless because I have never been able to enter a portal and, instead, always enter exasperation. My propane provider has a portal, which I failed to get into the first time and have since totally ignored.

Most recently, my insurance company interjected a portal between itself and me. It instructed me to create and enter a password, twice, to see the new package. Previously my broker has always emailed me the packages and then I can talk to them about what I want and don’t want. That’s a good, efficient experience in my mind, with plenty of security. Well, I followed the portal directions and made a password that sure seemed like it met all their requirements, entered it, copied and reentered it and pressed the button. The response was that the password was wrong and it didn’t meet their requirements anyway. And I can’t change it.

So, I phoned the broker, asked for them to send me the papers and tell the insurer to stop harassing me with increasingly anxious emails about the portal. The alarming emails continue but I have received the amended policy by Canada Post, twice! Now I guess I’d better go and see whether all the changes I asked for have been made and then write out and mail a cheque! (And discard the latest portal email.)

I’ll talk to you next month, with one or more of those much more interesting articles I didn’t finish this month. In the meantime, may *your* life be protected from time-wasting electronic bureaucracy!



## Heating safety

Stay safe while keeping warm. To prevent fires:

- ensure woodstoves, fireplaces and fireplace inserts are installed by a qualified technician according to the manufacturer's instructions
- have your heating system, vents and chimneys inspected and cleaned annually by a qualified service technician
- ensure all outside heating vents are not blocked
- let ashes from your woodstove or fireplace cool before emptying them into a metal container with a tight-fitting lid and keep the container outside
- always use a fire screen in front of a fireplace
- burn dry, well-seasoned wood in fireplaces and woodstoves to reduce the risk of excessive creosote build-up in chimneys
- keep space heaters at least one metre or three feet away from anything that can burn, including curtains, upholstery and clothing

In relation to heating and vehicle safety:

- replace worn or damaged electrical wires and connections on vehicles and extension cords and use the proper gauge extension cord for vehicle block heaters
- consider using approved timers for vehicle block heaters rather than leaving heaters on all night
- ensure that vehicles are not left running inside any garage or building











# Recipe of the Month

## BANANA BREAD


- |  |                              |

| 1 cup sugar                                      | 1/3 cup water                |
| 1/3 cup margarine or butter,<br>softened         | 1 2/3 cups all-purpose flour |
| 2 eggs   | 1 tsp baking soda            |
| 1 1/2 cups mashed ripe banana<br>(3 to 4 medium) | 1/2 tsp salt                 |
|  | 1/4 tsp baking powder        |
|  | 1/2 cup chopped nuts         |

Preheat oven to 350° F. Grease bottom only of an 8x4x2 or 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. Mix the sugar and margarine together in a 2 1/2 quart bowl. Stir in eggs until well blended. Add banana and water; beat 30 seconds. Stir in remaining ingredients, except nuts, until just moistened. Stir in nuts. Pour into pan. Bake until a wooden pick, inserted into the center, comes out clean, 1 1/4 hours for an 8 inch loaf pan and 55 to 60 minutes for a 9 inch loaf pan. Cool for 5 minutes. Loosen sides of loaf from pan and remove from pan; cool completely before slicing.

**Note:** Wrap and refrigerate no longer than 1 week.



## HOUSEHOLD HINTS



- If your white socks are getting dingy, place into a pot of water, add 2 pieces of lemon or a teaspoon of lemon juice and soak for about ten minutes. Then wash as you normally would.
- To save leftover wines, freeze them on ice cube trays. They can be used for any dish you would season with wine or can be also used in coolers.
- If red wine is spilled on a carpet, it can be cleaned with shaving cream, then sponged off with water. Club soda also works.
- Raisins won't stick to the food chopper if they are soaked in cold water for a short period of time.
- If you add a small pat of butter when cooking fruit for jame and jellies, you won't have any foam to skim off the top.
- If citrus fruits are warmed in the microwave or warm oven for a few minutes, they will yield more juice.
- Cook cranberries only until they pop - further cooking will make them bitter. Always use a teaspoon of butter to each pound of cranberries - it will eliminate overboiling and excess foam.
- Salt will make grapefruit taste sweeter.
- If you sprinkle lemons with water and refrigerate them in a plastic bag, they will last a month or more.
- To prevent soggy salads, place an inverted saucer in the bottom of the salad bowl. The excess liquid will drain off under the saucer and the salad stays fresh and crisp.




