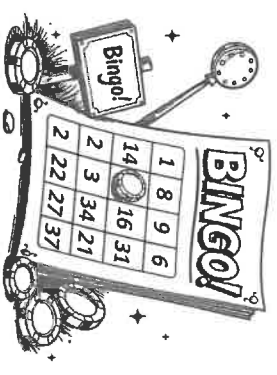

It's a Part of Our History

A Tragedy Enacted at Bottle Creek
One Man drowned and Several Others Narrowly Escape

One of the young Switzer breaks through the Ice of Lake Ketchecum and sinks to a watery grave.

A drowning accident is reported from the Bottle Creek Government Camp in Cavendish township and by the particulars which have been obtained, it appears that a number of others had a very narrow escape.

A correspondant, in a letter dated March 20th, says:

Three young men by the name of Switzer were coming from Ketchecum Lake to visit the Government Camp, when one of the brothers, by the name of Harry, went through the ice at the mouth of the Bottle Creek. His brothers tried to save him, when he also went through.

The remaining brother skreiked for help, when some of the government men who were out in the woods, hearing the call for aid, rushed for the lake with boards and ropes, but the treacherous ice gave way and in a moment four of them were struggling in the icy water, getting in and out three or four times, but failing to reach the poor fellows to whose aid they were going.

One had disappeared before the government men heard the call for help. The other got out and the rescue party had enough to do to save themselves, which they would not have done but for the great presence of mind and the noble and determined efforts of all, among whom Mr. Miller deserves special mention. He fought to the last to save a comrade from Peterborough by the name of Wallace who had got in and could not get out until Miller tied a rope around his body and then with the assistance of several of the men, pulled him along on the ice to shore nearly exhausted. They took him to the camp as quickly as possible, and after rubbing his benumbed limbs and giving him hot drinks brought him to. After a thorough warming he was not much the worse, but for some cuts caused by drawing him over the ice.

If any person ever deserved a medal it is Miller, whi is a Lindsay man.

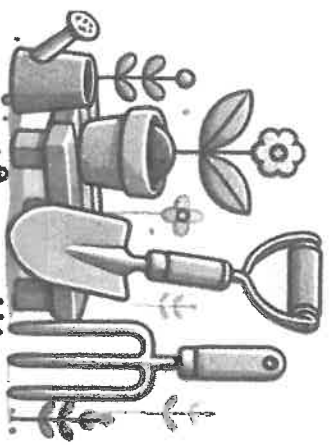

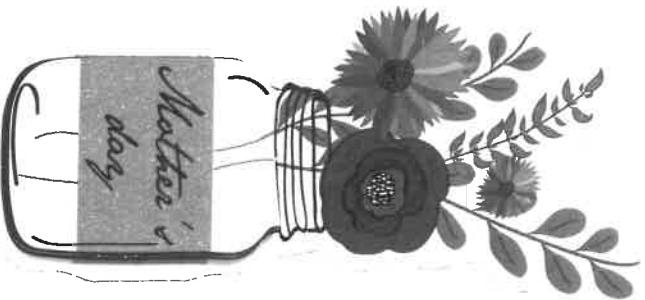

What is intimate partner abuse/violence?

Intimate partner abuse/violence involves the use of physical, psychological or sexual force, actual or threatened, in an intimate relationship.

An intimate relationship is one between partners and can include current and former dating partners, common-law partners and married spouses.

Some examples of abusive behaviour that may result in criminal charges include:

- Assault (grabbing, pushing, hitting, punching, slapping, kicking, choking, or biting an intimate partner)
- Sexual activity with an intimate partner that is unwanted/forced
- Threats to harm an intimate partner, their family members or others, including pets
- Damage to an intimate partner's personal property; and
- Criminal harassment or stalking an intimate partner

Intimate partner abuse also often involves coercive control, emotional and psychological abuse (e.g., name calling, controlling an intimate partner's movements, isolating an intimate partner, and exhibiting extreme jealousy) and/or exerting economic control over an intimate partner (e.g., controlling an intimate partner's access to money or preventing them from pursuing financial independence).

Please remember:

- Abuse is not your fault, even though your abuser may say it is.
- You are not responsible for the actions of others, including your partner.
- Marriage does not entitle your partner to abuse you nor does it shield your abuser from the law.
- Every person has the right to safety and a life free from violence.
- The police have a responsibility to assist with preventing further violence.

Personal Safety Plan

The OPP has created the following Personal Safety Plan to provide practical, easy-to-use guidance for individuals experiencing intimate partner violence and those supporting them. It outlines concrete steps to enhance personal safety during a crisis, when preparing to leave, and after separation, while also highlighting available legal rights, community resources, and supports. The goal is to offer a structured, accessible tool that helps people plan for their safety, understand their options, and connect with services that can assist them during a difficult and potentially dangerous time.

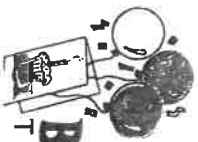

All presentations are free and open to the public.

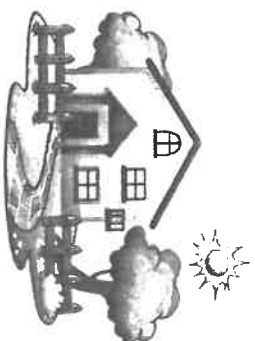

It's still slippery outside and too much snow to do yard work so it's a great time to clean and purge. HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- Have a small hole in your window screen - just enough for the bugs to come in? Add a swipe of clear nail polish and it'll be as good as new in minutes.

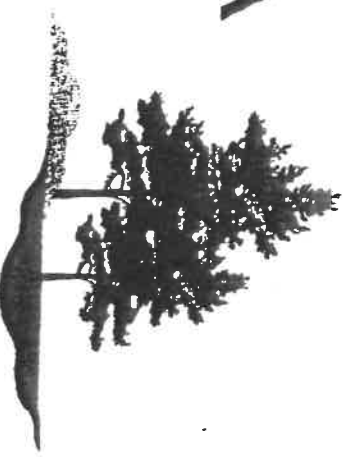
COUNTRYSIDE CHICKEN BAKE

| 1 cup uncooked rice | 1/8 tsp pepper |
| 3/4 cup chopped onions | 3/4 cup mayonnaise |
| 1/2 tsp salt | 10 3/4 oz can condensed cream of mushroom soup |
| 1 1/4 cups water | 3 chicken breasts, split and skinned |
| 1 cup sliced celery | |
| 2 tsp parsley flakes | |

Place rice in a greased 8x12 inch baking dish. Cover with combined vegetables and seasonings. Combine soup and mayonnaise; mix well. Gradually add water to soup mixture until well blended. Pour 1/2 of soup mixture over vegetables. Top with chicken and remaining soup mixture. Bake at 350° F for 1 hour or until chicken is tender and rice is cooked.

If desired, sprinkle with paprika.

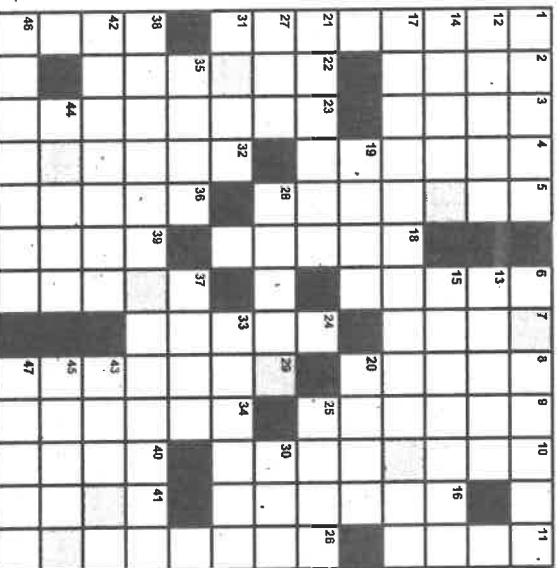

Residents Invited to Shape Future of Public Health at Local Town Halls

Input gathered during the town halls will help guide planning and future initiatives.

(March 25, 2026) – Lakelands Public Health is inviting residents across the region to share their ideas, concerns, and priorities for the future of community health as Lakelands Public Health launches a series of Community Town Halls.

The sessions are designed to create an open forum where community members can discuss the health issues that matter most to them and help inform future public health priorities.

“Public health affects nearly every aspect of our daily lives,” said Dr. Thomas Piggott, Medical Officer of Health and Chief Executive Officer with Lakelands Public Health. “We want to hear directly from residents about what challenges they’re seeing in their communities and what supports would make the biggest difference.”

Each Community Town Hall will include a brief overview of Lakelands Public Health services, followed by interactive discussions with staff and opportunities for participants to provide feedback. Attendees will also be invited to complete a short survey to further share their perspectives and contribute ideas about how to strengthen local health programs and services. Input gathered during the town halls will help guide planning and future initiatives.

The sessions are open to residents, community organizations, healthcare providers, and anyone interested in improving health and wellbeing in the community.

“These conversations are an important part of ensuring public health services reflect the evolving needs of the people we serve,” added Dr. Thomas Piggott, Medical Officer of Health and Chief Executive Officer with Lakelands Public Health. “Community voices are essential in shaping what comes next as we build Lakelands Public Health for generations to come.”

Gardening Tips



Plant seed outdoors

April/May before last frost as soon as soil can be worked

When native species thrive in your garden, bees, birds and butterflies can blossom too. Be selective with what you plant in your garden and learn how to keep invaders away.

1. GARDEN RESPONSIBLY

Choose native or non-invasive plants for your garden to avoid introducing or spreading invasive species. Avoid relocating plants from your home to your cottage garden and vice versa.

Find recommended garden species for Northern and Southern Ontario in the [Grow Me Instead](#) guides.

2. KNOW YOUR ENEMY

Learn how to identify and manage invasive plants. The best techniques and timing to remove them will vary depending on the species. [Learn ways you can manage invasive species.](#)

3. ROOT OUT INVADERS CAREFULLY

Put your uprooted invaders into a black garbage bag and leave it in the sun for at least five days. This will make sure that no invaders have a chance to sprout and grow in new areas.

4. DISPOSE OF INVASIVE PLANTS CAREFULLY

Dispose of yard waste through your local municipality. Do not dump yard waste in nearby natural areas as this can smother natural vegetation and spread invasive plants.

5. KEEP INVADERS OUT OF THE COMPOST

Never put invasive plants in your backyard compost. Even when uprooted, invasive plants can spread seeds or grow roots in your compost pile. Some invasive plants can regenerate from fragments as small as 2 centimeters.

6. DON'T FORGET ABOUT THE POND

Invasive plants can sneak into and out of your water gardens. Never dump unwanted plants and fish into local waterways.

7. KNOW THE RULES

It is illegal to import, deposit, release, breed/grow, buy, sell, lease or trade a regulated invasive plant species. Never buy or plant these species. You should remove and destroy them if they are in your garden.

8. KEEP AN EYE OUT

Inspect your property and shoreline for any sign of invasion. To find out what species may be in your area, visit eddmaps.org/ontario.

9. REPORT ALL INVADERS

Call the **Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters' Invading Species Hotline at 1-800-563-7711** to report an invasive species sighting or download the [EDDMAPS Ontario](#) app to report an invader on the spot.

10. STOP THE INVASION

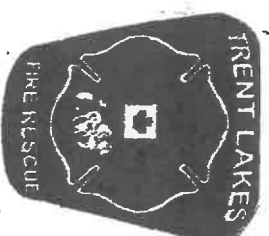
Apply for a Burn Permit

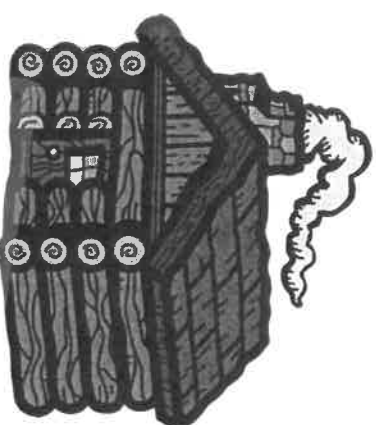


Opening the Cottage or Cabin

It's important to think about fire safety and prevention when you're opening up your cottage or cabin for the season. Consider the following tips to make sure you enjoy a safe and relaxing summer.

Power lines: Visually inspect the power lines leading to your cottage.

Look for any tree limbs that are too close. If any limbs are touching the lines or might break off onto the lines, prevent any danger by having them cut back. This should be done before turning on the service to your cottage.



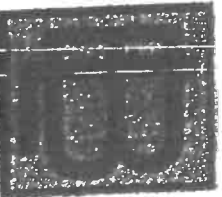
Propane appliances: Propane appliances that have been sitting for the entire winter can be hazardous if they are not maintained properly. Have them serviced by a qualified technician before using them.

Smoke alarms: Have a working smoke alarm outside any room designed for sleeping. Give yourself that early warning so you can escape safely. Always bring spare batteries to replace the old ones and replace any smoke alarms that experienced severe cold during the winter months.

Fire extinguishers

Response times for fire departments could be lengthy depending on the location of your cottage, so have a fire extinguisher there just in case. Big fires start small and can be extinguished before they destroy your cottage. Place extinguishers by the exit so that you have the option of leaving if the fire is growing too fast. If the fire is too big leave, let the professionals handle it. It is recommended to use a minimum 10lb ABC extinguisher for your cottage.

- Get rid of old newspapers, magazine and junk mail by recycling them. These items tend to pile up and can greatly contribute to the severity and spread of fire.
- Clean up and properly store paints, pool and yard chemicals.
- Check fuels containers for leaks and make sure they are properly stored.
- Remove leaves and trash from carports and garages: Combustible materials are dangerous if they are exposed to heated automobile components, especially under the vehicles.

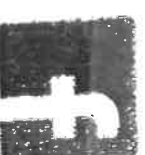

ABANDONED DOCKS INITIATIVE

Your dock has hosted more than its share of afternoon cocktails, launched a million cannon ballers and water-skiers, and rocked friends to sleep for sunburnt naps. It's time to upgrade to something new. But how to say good-bye?

Every year on our lake system, abandoned docks drift onto cottage properties or are dumped in back bays. Do the owners feel that "out of sight is out of mind", or that the dock will somehow revert back to nature? It's a simple "NO" on both counts. Dumping of docks on municipal, private, park, or crown land is not only illegal, but also poses environmental and navigational risks. And they are horrible eyesores.

Many older docks were constructed using unencapsulated foam floatation which has been banned in Ontario since 2021 (new construction or resale). These blue or pinkish foam bats break down into small pieces that litter the shoreline and cause untold damage to bird, wildlife and fish habitat and to lake health. Older docks may also have been treated with creosote or other wood preservatives that leach into the lake water once submerged. From a navigational standpoint, our fluctuating water levels can cause abandoned docks to break free and roam the lakes as serious boating hazards. This is especially noticeable this spring due to the high-water levels on our lake system from all the snowmelt and precipitation resulting in many docks floating about currently.

Any and all dumping – whether it's a dock, unloved paddleboat, deflated floaty, or even a beverage can tossed overboard is illegal. Fines range from \$300 to over \$10,000 depending on the item dumped and who is responsible for the land it lands on.

So – what to do? The Cavendish Community Ratepayers Association Inc. (CCRAI), are coordinating an abandoned dock initiative with the support of, and in collaboration with, all the local lake, cottage and road associations on the Catchacoma-Mississauga lake chain, the Municipality of Trent Lakes, Kawatha Highlands Signature Site Park, Curve Lake First Nations and the Ministries of the Environment, Conservation and Parks and Natural Resources. The goals of this initiative are to educate fellow cottagers on the proper disposal of unwanted docks, to conduct an initial shoreline cleanup of abandoned docks this spring and develop a plan to prevent future dumping.

This is step 1 – education. **Options for properly disposing of an unwanted dock:**

- Many dock construction companies will include disposal of your old dock (for a fee).
- If your dock is still sea-worthy, advertise on Facebook Marketplace or other online groups. Note that most of our lakes have their own Facebook page, and the "507 North of Flynn's- Good Neighbours " page covers off an even wider area.
- Repurpose the wood and other components in building projects.
- Offer the wood to local ATV or snowmobile trail associations, or to local marinas.
- Dismantle and take the whole shebang to the transfer station.

Regardless of what you do, remember that disposal of **your** dock is **your** responsibility. Tying it up in a back bay is not an option.

The Municipality of Trent Lakes is graciously providing funding for this initiative and the community at large is most grateful to our Municipal Council and Staff for their support on this project.

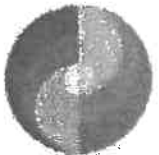
We come to these lakes for their natural beauty, clean water, and fantastic recreational opportunities. Let's do everything we can to work together to preserve that.

North Kawartha and Trent Lakes Well Water Sampling Program Resumes April 7
Spring melt brings higher risk for bacterial contamination in well water.

(March 30, 2026) – The well water sampling program resumes next Tuesday in the Township of North Kawartha and the Municipality of Trent Lakes. The program offers free sample collection kit pick-up and sample drop-off through these municipal offices.

Beginning Tuesday April 7, 2026, water samples can be dropped off at:

- **North Kawartha Municipal Office** located at 280 Burleigh Street, Apsley, ON, Tuesdays and Thursdays between 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. and,
- **Trent Lakes Municipal Office** located at 760 County Road 36, Trent Lakes, ON, Tuesday and Thursdays between 8:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.

Samples are then couriered to the Public Health Ontario Lab in Peterborough for testing. Empty sample bottles can be picked up at any time during regular business hours.

Well water testing is recommended at least twice per year, Spring and Fall. The samples are tested for two types of bacterial contamination: total coliforms and E. coli. Anyone can become ill if they consume contaminated water, but young people, older adults, and immuno-compromised individuals are at higher risk.

Samples must be dropped off at the municipal office within 24 hours of collection to ensure they reach the lab and are processed in a timely manner. Residents are encouraged to carefully read the sampling and collection instructions included with each kit. Filled sample bottles should be delivered to the front desk at the municipal office. Staff will then place it in a fridge until it is collected by the courier.

Water samples can also be dropped off at the following locations:


- **Havelock-Belmont-Methuen Township Office**, 1 Ottawa Street, Havelock, from Monday through Thursday between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.
- **Lakelands Public Health**, 185 King Street, Peterborough, between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon on Fridays.
- **Public Health Ontario Laboratory**, 99 Hospital Drive weekdays between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

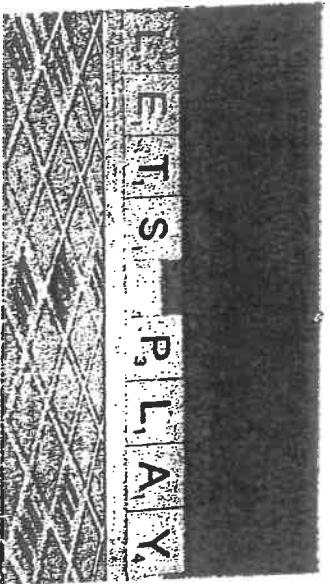

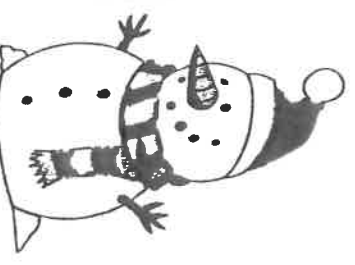

So, You Weren't Here During the 2025 Ice Storm? Have I Got A Story for You!

If you weren't here last year at the end of March and beginning of April, well, you missed it. What did you miss? Just the most devastating winter storm anyone around here can remember. The ice storm. *The* ice storm. Nothing I can tell you here will give you any idea of how much it affected our lives. But, I'm going to try!

Fortunately, in Trent Lakes no one died or, as far as I am aware, was injured. In Bobcaygeon, a woman well known in the community and her dog did lose their lives as a consequence of the storm. And *everyone* was cold – unless you had a generator that came on automatically and did not run out of fuel. And, of course, even then, you might have lost part of your roof or a window or 2, or even had your generator stolen! Or perhaps you were warm and dry in your home or cottage but had so many trees across your driveway that you might as well have been living in the middle of a forest.

Everyone who was here has a story. Most of us who weren't here also have stories. I was invited to take refuge in my friend's very modern cottage with a generator on Sturgeon Lake. It wasn't normal life, but we were warmish, had some hot food and coffee, could charge our phones and started the process of finding help to remove her fallen trees. Until her carbon monoxide alarm told us the generator seemed to have evil intentions, and we had to evacuate in the middle of the night to our very cold, dark Bobcaygeon townhouses. The Cameron fire fighters who told us to leave said we were the 4th carbon monoxide call of their evening. Later in the week I discovered that my cottage driveway was full of downed birch trees and my kitchen door well protected from use by an oak branch and chunks of other trees not easily identified. No doubt, even if you missed the storm, your property had similar stories to tell when you found your way up here.

But, if you were here, you saw and felt what happens when a community pulls together to achieve a common goal, as Kaarina Luoma observed. (It reminds me of the barn-raising scene in the movie *Witness*.) Fire fighters immediately started doing wellness checks. The Emergency Management Team (the mayor, the fire chief and all municipal department heads) soon dispatched other municipal workers (e.g., Building Department and Parks and Recreation staff) to join them so that every residence in which people were believed to be present received a wellness check. (There was enough snow on the ground that if there were no foot prints or other human-made tracks, the hardy volunteers could safely assume that no one was there.) In the end, everyone they came across was in good health, had enough supplies to keep going and was able to stay warm and dig themselves out; but they were also pleased to know that someone had their back. Janice Hill reported, "I've never had that much help outside of Trent Lakes any other time I needed it." And remember, most of the helpers also had homes left cold, dark and cheerless by the storm.

Another major development was the opening of the Community Centre. There are no paid staff but Cavendish Culture and Recreation Committee chair Kathy Warren decided that the hall needed to be available for anyone looking for a temporary home, and she recruited volunteers to help her keep it open. As Lauren Hill put it, "During the ice storm, the Community Centre meant so much to my kids and me. It wasn't just a place to warm up – it brought people together and showed the kindness and strength of our community."

Between March 29 and April 7, each day between 5 and 130 people used the centre. That 130 day included Hydro workers who were happy to eat their lunch inside. But aside from them, the centre was used by about 285 people for 1 or more meals, as well as regularly scheduled meetings, and art-group, euchre and games-night events. (Jonathan Warren recalled there was even a 6-day-long game of *Risk*.) Each day, between 7 and 27 people had great fun bringing food from their disabled freezers and fridges and, as Kaarina told me, "Cooked up a storm for pot luck suppers."

Some people had such a good time that they kept coming back even after their own Hydro had come on. And a few pleaded to have the daily pot lucks continue indefinitely. In fact, last month quite a few of last year's temporary residents returned for a pot luck evening when they could reminisce about the camaraderie of last year.

Now it's warm and the trees are leafing out, and avoiding mosquitoes and ticks is more in our minds than worrying about falling icy branches. Therefore, (as volunteer fire fighter and library assistant Joanne O'Heron put it), it may be hard to appreciate just how much "a warm meal, charging a phone, or even sipping a hot drink means. Especially in the company of other ice-storm escapees." But it was truly priceless and I'm glad to know that next time Mother Nature has a temper tantrum, the Cavendish fire fighters and Community Centre and other Trent Lakes workers will be here to make it all a lot better.

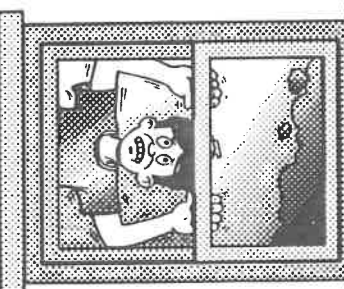
