It's a Part of Our History

Wagar's Point / Catchacoma Landing Con't

Gary Faulkner bought Wagar's Point in 1977 and he kept the business for several years, changing its name to Catchacoma Landing. In the late 1980's he sold the Landing to Ontario Land surveyor, T.S. Fluke. It changed hands several times after that and while it was owned by Grant Garrod and his wife the marina burned to the ground once again.

Up until 1992, the buildings surrounding the main structure were just shells. Turning Catchacoma Landing back into a viable business required a lot of hard work but the new owners the Krajc family was certainly up to the challenge. Like the Wagar's before them they were determined to get it up and running and with each year they made at least one improvement to the business. Despite the winter weather, increasing taxes and the many other challenges faced by seasonal businesses, they managed to succeed.

They decided early on to get out of the boat and motor reapir business and converted the building into a restaurant. They leased out the business for several years and it was known as "The Loon's Nest". They then took over the restaurant themselves and renamed it "The Leaping Lizard"

Several years later the Krajc Family made the very difficult decision to sell the marina and so ends the property known as Catchacoma Landing or for those who have been around much longer on the lakes – Wagars's Point.

Driving Near Emergency Vehicles

Types of emergency vehicles:

- Police cars
- Fire trucks
- Ambulances
- Tow trucks

You can be charged if you don't slow down or move over for emergency vehicles or tow trucks that are stopped with sirens or lights flashing.

When an emergency vehicles approaches follow these steps to allow the vehicle to pass by:

- 1. Slow down.
- 2. Signal
- 3. Move to the right side of the road, clear of any intersection
- 4. Stop.

When the emergency vehicle has passed, check to make sure the way is clear and signal before merging back into traffic.

Penalties: Drivers can be charged if they do not slow down or move over when it is safe to do so. Drivers can face the following penalties: First Offence:

- Fines from \$400 to \$2,000
- 3 demerit points if convicted
- Possible suspension of driver's licence for up to 2 years

Subsequent offences (within 5 years)

- Fines ranging from 41,000 to \$4,000
- 3 demerit points if convicted
- Possible jail time of up to 6 months
- Possible suspension of driver's licence for up to 2 years

It is also illegal to follow within 150 metres of a fire vehicle or ambulance reporting to a call.

- Pilot light on the furnace or water heater goes out
- Chalky white powder or soot build up occurs around exhaust vent or chimney.

How Can I protect Myself and my Family?

- Regularly maintained appliances that are properly ventilated should not produce hazardous levels of carbon monoxide
- · Have a qualified service professional inspect your fuel burning appliance(s) at least once per year.
- Have you chimney inspected and cleaned every year by a W.E.T.T. certified professional.
- Be sure your carbon monoxide alarm has been certified to the Canadian Standard Association (CSA)
 CAN/CGA 6.19 standard or the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) 2034 standard.
- Install a carbon monoxide alarm in or near the sleeping area(s) of the home.
- Install the carbon monoxide alarms(s) in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.

What Should I Do if my Carbon Monoxide Alarm Starts Beeping?

ALWAYS REACT TO A CARBON MONOXIDE ALARM THAT HAS ALARMED! GET OUT OF YOUR HOME AND CONTACT YOUR LOCAL FIRE DEPARTMENT FOR ASSISTANCE.

To Keep Safe Please Remember:

You have a responsibility to know about the dangers of carbon monoxide. Your knowledge and actions may save lives.

A carbon monoxide alarm is a good second line of defense. It is not a substitute for the proper care and maintenance of your fuel burning appliance(s). Take the time to learn about the use of carbon monoxide alarms in your home to ensure you are using the equipment properly and effectively.

Where To Install A Carbon Monoxide Alarm

Since carbon monoxide moves freely in the air, the suggested location is in or as near as possible to sleeping areas of the home. The human body is most vulnerable to the effects of carbon monoxide during sleeping hours. To work properly the unit must not be blocked by furniture or draperies. Carbon Monoxide is virtually the same weight as air and therefore the alarm protects you in a high or low location.

For maximum protection, a carbon monoxide alarm should be located outside primary sleeping areas, in sleeping areas and in each level of your home.

Where NOT to Install a CO Alarm

Some locations may interfere with the proper operation of the alarm and may cause false alarms or trouble signals.

CO alarms should not be installed in the following locations:

- Where the temperature may drop below 4.4o C (40oF) or exceed 37.8oC (100oF).
- Near paint thinner fumes or household cleaning products. Ensure proper ventilation when using these
 types of chemicals.
- Within 1.5m (5 feet) of any cooking or open flame appliances such as furnaces, stoves and fireplaces.
- · In exhaust streams from gas engines, vents, flues or chimneys.
- · Do not place in close proximity to an automobile exhaust pipe; this will damage the alarm.

Maintenance

Test your carbon monoxide alarm regularly to make sure it is operating properly. The owner's manual should tell you how to test your alarm. Remember to check the manual for information on when to buy a

Carbon Monoxide



Quick Facts

- More than 50 people die each year from carbon monoxide poisoning in Çanada, including 11 on average in Ontario.
- · Bill 77, an Act to Proclaim Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week and to amend the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997, received royal assent in December 2013.
- The first Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week will take place November 1-8, 2014.
- The Ontario Building Code requires the installation of carbon monoxide alarms in homes and other residential buildings built after 2001.

Why Should I Care About Carbon Monoxide?

It Kills.

Many Canadians die every year from carbon monoxide poisoning in their own homes, most of them while

It Injures.

Hundreds of Canadians are hospitalized every year from carbon monoxide poisoning, many of whom are permanently disabled. Everyone is at Risk - 88% of all homes have something that poses a carbon monoxide threat.

Carbon Monoxide is a colourless, odourless, tasteless, toxic gas that enters the body through the lungs during the normal breathing process. It replaces oxygen in the blood and prevents the flow of oxygen to the heart, brain and other vital organs.

Where does Carbon Monoxide Come From?

Produced when carbon-based fuels are incompletely burned such as:

- Wood
- Propane
- Natural Gas
- Heating Oil
- Coal
- Kerosene
- Charcoal
- Gasoline

What Are the Main Sources of Carbon Monoxide in my Home?

Wood burning/gas stoves, gas refrigerators, gasoline engines, kerosene heaters and others.

How Can I Tell if There is a Carbon Monoxide Leak in my Home?

- Headache, nausea, burning eyes, fainting, confusion, drowsiness.
- Often mistaken for common ailments like the flu
- Symptoms improve when away from the home for a period of time
- Symptoms experienced by more than one member of the household.
- Continued exposure to higher levels may result in unconscious, brain damage and death.
- The elderly, children and people with heart or respiratory conditions may be particularly sensitive to carbon monoxide.

Environment

- Air feels stale/stuffy
- Excessive moisture on windows or walls
- · Sharp penetrating odour or smell of gas when furnace or other fuel burning appliance turns on.

Mpox Vaccines Available for Eligible Residents

Eligible Individuals Can Book an Appointment to Receive a 2-Dose Series

Peterborough Public Health is reminding eligible residents who are at-risk of contracting Mpox (formerly known as monkeypox) to complete their 2-dose vaccination series of Imvamune®.

"We are cautioning residents that the risk of contracting Mpox is a bit higher after a recent outbreak in Toronto this past month," said Dr. Thomas Piggott, Medical Officer of Health. "While our region has not seen a case since July 2022, we want to ensure residents who are at higher risk of contracting Mpox are vaccinated to provide themselves with the best protection."

Mpox is a virus that is spread by close and prolonged contact with a person or animal that has Mpox, or with contaminated materials (e.g., clothing, bedding). At this time, Mpox has spread mostly between people who have had close/intimate or sexual contact with a person who has the virus.

Residents who are part of the at-risk population are asked to remain vigilant for symptoms and take precautions to prevent infection. The Imvamune® vaccine is available as pre and post exposure prophylaxis. Residents who are eligible for the 2-dose vaccine series as a pre-exposure prophylaxis include,


- Two-spirit, non-binary, transgender, cisgender, intersex, or gender-queer individuals (18+) who self-identify or have sexual partners who self-identify as belonging to the gay, bisexual, pansexual, and other men who have sex with men (gbMSM) community AND at least one of the following:
 - Had a confirmed sexually transmitted infection within the last year
 - Have or are planning to have two or more sexual partners or are in a relationship where at least one of the partners may have other sexual partners
 - Have attended venues for sexual contact (i.e., bath houses, sex clubs) recently or may be planning to, or who work/volunteer in these settings
 - Have had anonymous sex (e.g., using hookup apps) recently or may be planning to
 - Are a sexual contact of an individual who engages in sex work
- Individuals who self-identify as engaging in sex work or are planning to, regardless of self-identified sex or
- Household and/or sexual contacts of people who are eligible for pre-exposure vaccination—listed above AND who are moderately to severely immunocompromised or pregnant.

Eligible residents can book an appointment for the Imvamune® vaccine by calling 705-743-1000, ext. 331

Residents who present with symptoms or believe they have been exposed to Mpox should reach out to their healthcare provider for guidance. The vaccine is available to some residents who present with symptoms following the recommendation of their healthcare provider. Symptoms typically appear within 5-21 days after exposure and include,

- A rash or blisters (lesions)
- Swollen lymph nodes
- Fever and chills
- Muscle aches
- Headaches
- Exhaustion





Peterborough Public Health Launches Smoke-Free Ontario Act Enforcement Campaign

Tobacco Enforcement Officers to Focus on Reducing Youth Access to Tobacco and Vaping Products, and Protecting Against Second-hand Smoke and Vapour

Peterborough Public Health (PPH), in collaboration with public health units across Central East Ontario, are stepping up tobacco enforcement efforts to ensure compliance with the Smoke-Free Ontario Act (SFOA).

The SFOA prohibits the sale of tobacco and vape products to anyone under the age of 19, restricts most flavours and high nicotine vape products to specialty stores, and prohibits the use of these products at schools and arenas, among other public places. Peterborough Public Health's enforcement efforts will focus on compliance of the sale of tobacco and vape products as well as protecting smoke-free spaces, with the intention of reducing access and exposure to second-hand smoke for youth in our community.

"The SFOA is designed to protect youth from accessing highly addictive tobacco and vape products, while at the same time, creating healthy spaces, free from second-hand smoke and vapour," said Julie Ingram, Manager of Environmental Health at PPH. "Despite the law, Tobacco Enforcement Officers (TEOs) are dealing with a surge in complaints and observing increased non-compliance for youth accessing flavoured, high nicotine vapes, and people smoking and vaping at local arenas."

The most recent data from the Canadian Student Tobacco and Drug Survey (2018-2019) noted that e-cigarette prevalence rates have doubled among students in 2018-19 compared to use observed in 2016-17.

This trend is observed locally as well. "In 2022, we issued 26 SFOA warning to students in local schools," said Katrina Ryall, Tobacco Enforcement Officer. "Of those warnings, 25 were for vaping in or on school property. During the same time frame, 10 charges were laid; 9 for vaping and only one for smoking – it's clear that youth vaping is a problem locally."

Nicotine impacts the development of the teenage brain, affecting learning, memory, and concentration. Some e-liquids or 'juice' used in vapour products contain as much nicotine as one pack of cigarettes. Evidence also shows that youth who vape are more likely to begin smoking cigarettes. Likewise, the research is clear that there is no safe level of exposure to second-hand smoke and vapour, making compliance with the SFOA even more important when it comes to protecting youth.

"The principle of this campaign is simple," said Ingram. "We want there to be compliance with the SFOA to protect youth from accessing these products, and ensure that everyone visiting an arena can do so without being exposed to harmful second-hand smoke and vapour. Kids walking into an arena should be focused on the sport they are about play - not be worried about the air they are breathing."

In addition to reducing exposure to second-hand smoke and vapour, the SFOA is designed to reduce the normalization of smoking and vaping to youth. Research has linked the likelihood of youth experimenting with tobacco and vapour products to children seeing their role models use these products. Making sure that parents and coaches are not smoking or vaping at arenas is important to prevent use among youth.

In a recent blitz of local arenas, 19 warnings were issued for adults smoking on the property, and 2 warnings were issued for vaping on the property.

PPH is advising all tobacco and vapour product retailers, and people at local arenas, that TEOs will be conducting compliance inspections to ensure the requirements under the Smoke-Free Ontario Act are being followed.

Smoking or vaping on or within 20m of a school or arena property can result in a \$305 charge.

In a mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar. Add eggs, chocolate and vanilla; mix well. Combine flour and baking powder; stir into chocolate mixture. Fold in pecans. Pour into greased 13x 9x2 inch baking pan. In a mixing bowl combine cream cheese and butter. Beat in the sugar, eggs, flour, and vanilla; mix well. Fold in pecans. Spread over chocolate layer; sprinkle with chips. Bake at 350 F. for 20-25 minutes or until edges pull away from the sides of the pan. Sprinkle with marshmallows; bake 2 minutes longer or until puffed. Spread evenly over cream cheese layer. Cool on wire rack. In a saucepan, combine first four topping ingredients cook and stir over low heat until smooth. Transfer to a mixing bowl. Add the confectioners' sugar and vanilla, beat until smooth. Spread over cooled bars.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- Turn on your oven's self-cleaner immediately after you finished cooking. Doing this is more efficient as the oven doesn't have to be heated a second time.
- Before you pour paint into the paint tray cover it with a plastic bag or aluminum foil. When you are finished, throw away the lining...no mess to clean up!
- To touch up small spots where the paint has been scraped off improvise a brush by using a toothpick, stir stick for a drink or the non-sulfurous end of a match.
- Have trouble remembering the name of the paint you used in a particular room?
 Next time you are painting put the manufacturer and the paint name or number on the back of the light-switch plate.
- If you need to paint your stairs paint every other step so that you can still use the stairs if necessary. After the first set has dried you can than paint the remainder.
- Deer repellent stuff pantyhose with clippings of human or dog hair and hang them in your garden to ward of the deer.
- Preserve peppers by freezing them, just dice or chop them up and place into plastic bags. They are one of the few vegetables that don't need to be blanched.
- If you have trouble swallowing pills prescription or non-prescription chew a
 piece of banana thoroughly and swallow. The banana should help the pill to go
 down.
- Baking beets is the easiest and most nutritious way to cook them. Wrap each beet in aluminum foil and bake for 1 hour at 350'. The skins should slip right off ready to be eaten.
- Hard boiled eggs will peel easily if you boil them in salted water. Egg whites will whip up faster if you add a pinch of salt when beating them.



EARLY BIRDS

The birds that arrive north first after winter or a sure sign of the warmer days that will soon prevail. Here are some of our feathered friends to keep an eye out for:

Horned lark This bird heads home in early spring and can even be seen in farmers' fields while the snow is still on the ground.

Killdeer A sure sign of spring, it's often observed during the first mild spell in February-or March.

American robin It's the official harbinger of spring but not as reliable as it once was thanks to a growing number that are indifferent to migration.

Red-winged blackbird In the spring, the males arrive at least two weeks ahead of the females

Mallard duck The familiar common duck appears as soon as the ice goes out.

Canada goose They return early if they migrated at all. Fewer and fewer geese fly south these days thanks to ample food in urban parks in golf courses.

Tundra swan We see them in late winter to early spring as they make their way back up north.


