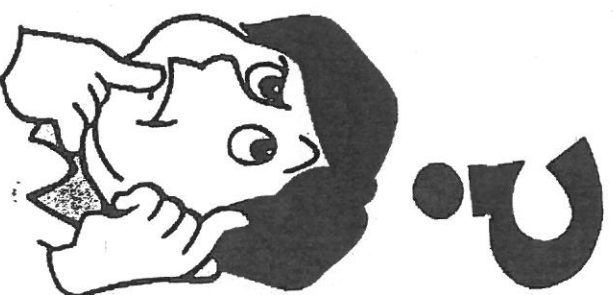

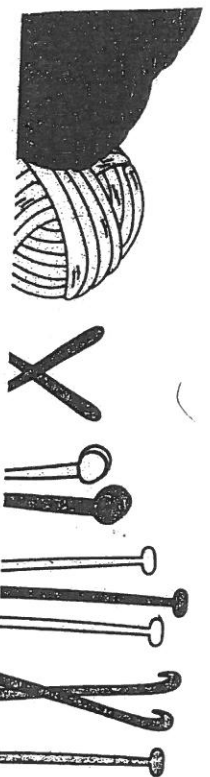

This would make a great Christmas gift!

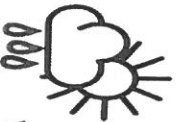
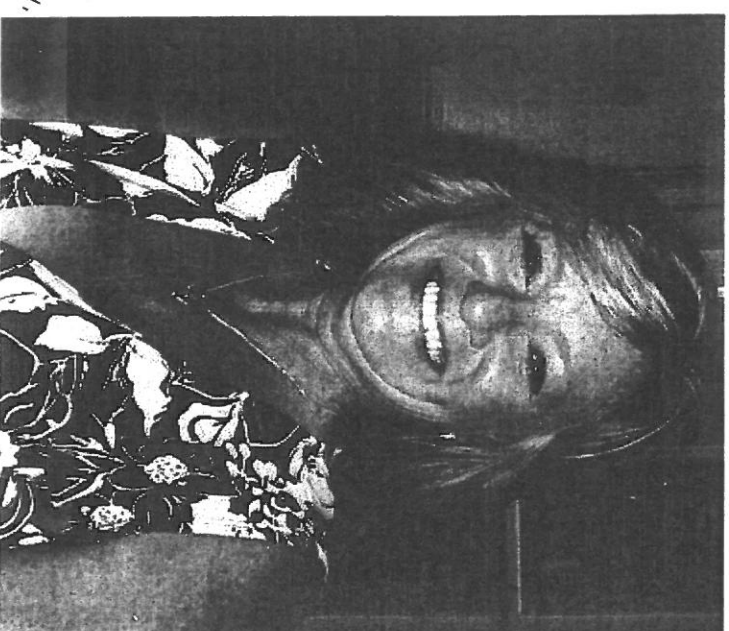


## In passing...

# Halloween Safety Tips

## Follow these steps to celebrate safely and make sure the only thing to be scared of is the costumes.

Halloween may look a little different this year, but it can still be a lot of fun. Follow public health advice and measures from public health experts, and make good decisions based on your own unique situation.

### Costumes

When choosing a costume, stay away from billowing or long trailing fabric. If you are making your own costume, choose material that won't easily ignite if it comes into contact with heat or flame. Look for costumes labelled "Flame-Resistant" – nylon or heavyweight polyester costumes are best. Flame Resistant does not mean 'fire proof'.

The best costumes are brightly coloured, flame resistant and reflective. Add reflective tape to costumes for better visibility.

Children should stay away from open flames. Be sure they know how to stop, drop and roll if their clothing catches fire. (Have them practice stopping immediately, dropping to the ground, covering their face with hands, and rolling over and over to put the flames out.)

Swords, knives and similar accessories should be made of soft, flexible material.

Trick-or-treaters should wear sturdy walking shoes that fit properly.

### Trick-or-Treating

Make sure you maintain physical distancing from others. Wear a mask.

Have flashlights to carry for lighting or glow sticks as part of their costume.



Follow an safety and rules of the road. Trick or treating should be made along one side of the street first and then the other, and that it's best to cross the street only at intersections or crosswalks. Walk and don't run. Do not cut across yards or driveways.

Make your home safe for trick-or-treaters. Remove all objects around the outside of your house that could cause children to trip or fall. Turn your outside light on.

Do not to eat any goodies until they are inspected. Make sure that your child eats dinner before they set out, so they'll be less tempted to eat their goodies along the way.

Stay in well-lit areas and only visit homes that have their outside lights turned on, and that you can be sure they are participating in trick-or-treating. Children should never go inside homes or cars.

Throw out any treats that are not wrapped, those in torn or loose packages, or any that have small holes in the wrappers. Check toys or novelty items for small parts and do not allow children under three years to play with them.

Keep pets inside and away from trick-or-treaters and lit candles, especially if they are easily frightened or become over-excited in the presence of strangers.

If you are driving on Halloween, be aware of children, drive slowly and enter and exit driveways and alleyways with extreme caution. Avoid driving on Halloween, if possible.

### Parties Should only be hosted within your household!!

- Remember to keep exits clear of decorations, so nothing blocks escape routes.
- Ensure that all children in your home know the location of the exits should

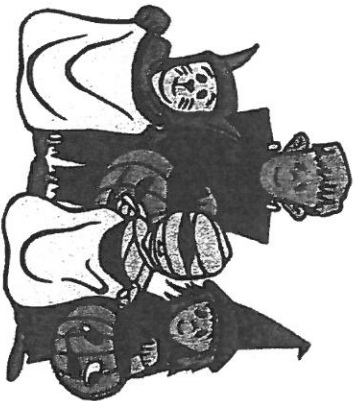




an emergency arise.

- Ensure you have installed, working smoke and CO alarms, and practice your home escape plan.

## Decorations



It is safest to use a flashlight or battery-operated candles in a jack-o-lantern. If you use a real candle, use extreme caution. Tea lights are a safer option and should be outdoors only. Make sure children are watched at all times when candles are lit. When lighting candles inside jack-o-lanterns, use long fireplace-style matches or a utility lighter. Be sure to place lit pumpkins well away from anything that can burn and far enough out of way of trick-or-treaters, doorsteps, walkways and yards. **Ensure you extinguish the flame - not leave it burning.**



Avoid decorating with candles or torch lights.

Ensure that combustible Halloween decorations such as crepe paper, cornstalks, and dried flowers are kept well away from sources of heat, including light bulbs and heaters.

Keep all exits clear of decorating materials.

If using decorative lights indoors or outdoors, use lights certified by a recognized organization such as the Canadian Standards Association (CSA) or the Underwriters' Laboratory of Canada (ULC or C-UL). Check lights for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires or loose connections. Discard damaged sets. Do not overload extension cords.

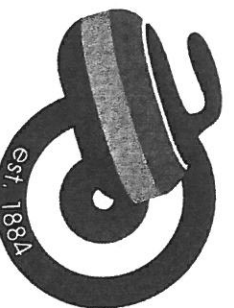

October 26<sup>th</sup>, 1965 – Actress Kelly Rowan was born.

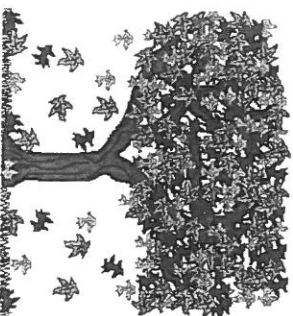

# Autumn Fire Safety



## Outside the Home

- Never park your car or truck over a pile of leaves. The heat from the vehicle's catalytic converter or exhaust system can ignite the leaves below. The resulting fire could destroy your vehicle.
- Flammable liquids should not be stored in inside the home or in an attached garage or shed. This includes any unused fuel still in the fuel tank. Store this equipment away from your home or drain excess fuel out of the tank before storing. This simple safety precaution will help prevent accidental fires from escaping fuel vapors.
- Remove fuel from lawn mowers before storing them for winter.
- Contact your utility company if trees or branches are not clear of power lines
- Prune back trees, and rake up leaves and debris. If you live in an open area with a lot of natural vegetation, consider creating a defensible fire zone around your home. Prune the bottom branches from trees and remove shrubs and trees within 20 feet of your home
- Don't store cardboard boxes, paper or other flammable materials in the backyard. These materials provide ready fuel for a fire and all it takes is one spark.



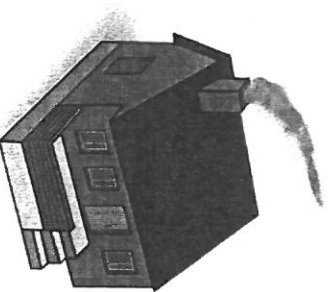
## Heating your Home

### Most Important!

- Check all smoke and carbon monoxide detectors to make sure they work, and change the batteries. It is the law for all Ontario homes to have a working smoke alarm on every storey and outside all sleeping areas. This covers single family, semi-detached and town homes, whether owner-occupied or rented.
- Have a useable fire extinguisher available.

## Central Heating

- Get your central heating system cleaned, inspected and serviced by a certified HVAC (heating, venting and air conditioning) contractor every year before using it.
- If you have a gas heater, make sure that you have a sufficient quantity of fully functioning carbon monoxide detectors installed in your home.
- Keep all flammable materials away from your furnace. This includes, clothing, paint products, toxic materials, cardboard and more.



## Fireplaces and Woodstoves

- Have heating appliances serviced and chimney flues examined for defects.
- Have fireplaces and fireplace dampers checked.
- Fireplaces should be equipped with an appropriate screen or glass enclosure to prevent sparks from flying out.
- Wood burning stoves should be examined and the flue and chimney checked for creosote buildup. Creosote is a deposit from smoke that can build up in a chimney and can start a fire.
- Use only seasoned woods, and avoid soft woods like Pine, etc.
- Never use a flammable liquid to start a fireplace.
- Never overload the hearth with wood or artificial logs, the resulting fire may be too large for the unit.
- Put all ashes outdoors and away from the house in a metal container.

## Space Heaters

- Make sure that any space heaters are surrounded by at least three feet of empty space.
- Never place clothing or any other objects on a space heater to dry.
- Do not place space heaters near furniture or drapery.
- Turn space heaters off when you leave the house or go to bed.
- Avoid storing any combustible items near heaters.

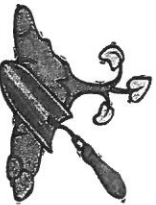
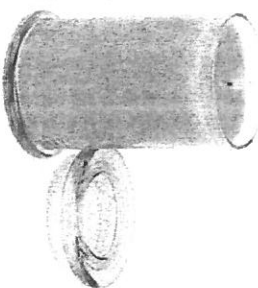
- Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries. The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking. Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove. If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking. Keep anything that can catch fire — oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your stovetop.
- Do not overload electrical outlets or use extension cords in the place of additional outlets.
- Check electrical appliances regularly for wearing cords and plugs. Do not leave electrical appliances plugged in if they do not need to be.



- Lack of maintenance is the number one cause of dryer fires. That is why it is critical to clean the lint filter before and after each use, and wipe away any lint that has accumulated around the drum. Perform periodic checks to ensure that the air exhaust vent pipe is unobstructed (lint accumulation) and the outdoor vent flap opens readily. Do not run the dryer without a lint filter. You are encouraged to not leave the dryer running if you go out, in case it malfunctions.

## Candles

- Extinguish candles when leaving the room or going to sleep. Keep lit candles away from items that can catch fire
- Place candles in sturdy, burn-resistant containers that won't tip over and are big enough to collect dripping wax.
- Don't place lit candles near windows, where blinds or curtains may close or blow over them.
- Don't use candles in high traffic areas where children or pets could knock them over.
- Never let candles burn out completely. Extinguish them when they get to within two inches of the holder or decorative material.
- Never leave children or pets alone in a room with lit candles.
- Do not allow older children to light candles in their bedrooms. A forgotten candle or an accident is all it takes to start a fire.
- During power outages, exercise caution when using candles as a light source. Many destructive fires start when potential fire hazards go unnoticed in the dark.
- Never use a candle for light when fuelling equipment such as a camp fuel heater or lantern.
- Keep candle wicks short at all times. Trim the wick to one-quarter inch (6.4 mm).
- Be wary of buying novelty candles. Avoid candles surrounded by flammable paint, paper, dried flowers, or breakable/meltable containers.
- Extinguish taper and pillar candles when they burn to within two inches of the holder, and container candles before the last half-inch of wax begins to melt.
- When buying or using novelty candles, try to determine if they pose a potential fire hazard (if they contain a combustible component for instance). If they do, or if you suspect that they might, inform your local fire department.
- Use extreme caution when carrying a lit candle, holding it well away from your clothes and any combustibles that may be along your path.



## Gardening Tips

- Transplant shrubs or young trees to new locations
- Cut diseased areas out of perennials. Do not compost.
- Rake and compost any fallen leaves
- Clean up garden debris. Remove all vegetable plants and fallen fruit.
- Remove dead annuals from the garden, after a frost.
- Cut back perennial foliage to discourage over wintering pests. Leave flowers with seeds for the birds.
- Continue watering trees and shrubs until the ground freezes.
- Sharpen lawn mower blades and pruners.
- Trim tall grass away from trees and corners of your home to discourage small rodents from creating nests.
- Dig up tender bulbs such as dahlia, canna and gladiola. Wrap them in moist material and store in a cool, dark place.

## Recipe of the Month

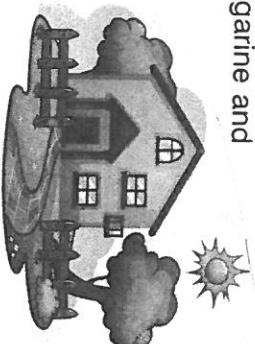


### CLAM CHOWDER

3 to 4 potatoes, cut up  
2 carrots, thinly sliced  
2 to 3 celery stalks, thinly sliced  
1 onion, chopped  
1 can baby clams

1 tsp salt  
1 1/2 Tbsp chicken bouillon mix  
2 Tbsp cornstarch  
2 Tbsp margarine  
1 can Carnation milk

Put vegetables in a pot with water. Add salt and boil until vegetables are cooked. Add baby clams and bring to a boil. Stir in chicken bouillon mix. Lower heat to medium and add Carnation milk, stirring often so the milk doesn't burn; bring to a boil. Mix cornstarch with warm water. Add to chowder, stirring until thickened; you may have to add more cornstarch, if not thick enough. Bring to a boil and add margarine and pepper to taste.

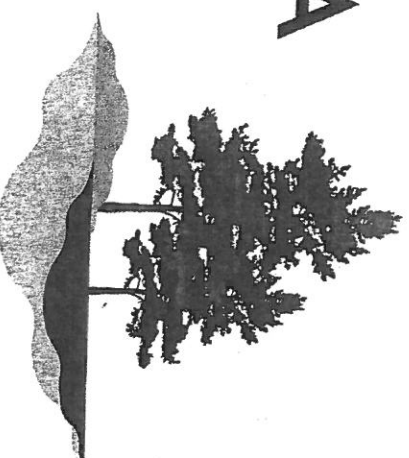


### HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- Freshen your dog's coat by sprinkling the fur with cornstarch, then brushing out.
- Remove greasy stains on carpet by applying cornstarch to the stain. Let sit for a half hour, then vacuum.
- If your marshmallows are sticking together, sprinkle a little cornstarch into the bag and shake.
- A bit of cornstarch applied to your hands will help prevent blistering when working in the garden.
- Wipe furniture and kitchen counters with dryer sheets – dirt, dust, grit and pet hairs cling to the sheet.
- Tuck a sheet into toilet paper rolls for bathroom freshness.
- Clean latex paint from brushes by soaking them in a can of warm water along with a used dryer sheet.
- Place a dryer sheet on the bottom of the kitchen trash can to soak up any spills and help prevent bad odors.
- Clean windows and blinds with used dryer sheets to easily remove dirt and dust.
- Drop a sheet in the dirty laundry hamper, diaper bag, gym bag, and suitcase to cut down on odors.

# Peterborough Public Health COVID-19 Risk Index Moves to Moderate Risk

## *First Case of COVID-19 BA 2.86 Variant Confirmed in Region*

Peterborough Public Health (PPH) COVID-19 Risk Index moves to moderate risk due to increase in case rates, outbreaks, and wastewater signal. The Respiratory Risk Index remains at low risk for community members in our region.

“The increase in COVID-19 indicators is a clear sign that transmission of COVID-19 is increasing in our region,” says Dr. Thomas Piggott, Medical Officer of Health. “With students in schools and more people gathering indoors, there are more opportunities for close contact and we anticipate COVID-19 and other respiratory viruses will continue to circulate in our community.”

Dr. Piggott adds “This week we received confirmation of our first COVID-19 case with the BA 2.86 variant in the region. Other reports of this variant do not indicate an increase in the severity of symptoms compared to other COVID-19 strains. However, this variant does show signs of high transmissibility. There are also early reports of this variant being able to escape the protection that previous COVID-19 vaccines provide. Fortunately, the new COVID-19 XBB vaccine shows promising results in protecting against this strain.” The team at PPH is working hard to plan for the arrival of COVID-19 vaccines in the coming weeks to help protect residents in our community. More information on the availability of the COVID-19 and Influenza vaccines should be available shortly.

In the moderate risk level, we recommend wearing a well-fitted KN95/N95 style mask in high-risk indoor settings, gathering outdoors, or in spaces with proper ventilation. In general, all residents who feel unwell should stay home to prevent further spread of infection and practice respiratory etiquette. These protections are not only lifesaving for individuals at high risk of severe illness, but the overall health of our community.

Peterborough Public Health has also introduced a weekly alert system to help residents stay up-to-date with the COVID-19 and Respiratory Risk Index updates. Starting today, residents who sign up for the alerts will be able to receive the updated COVID-19 and Respiratory Risk Index to their email inbox weekly, which will be important information as we progress through the fall. 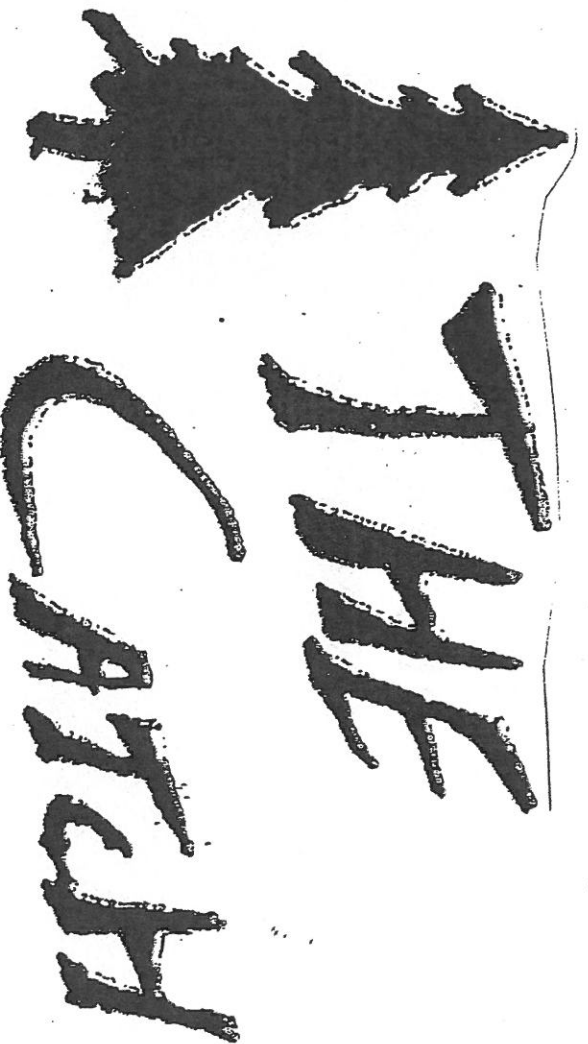

# COVID-19 Vaccine Fall Guidance Released

## *SPIKEVAX XBB.1.5 Vaccine Will be Available to Residents 6 Months and Older*

The Ministry of Health has released guidance for Fall COVID-19 vaccines. In the coming weeks, Moderna's updated SPIKEVAX XBB.1.5 COVID-19 vaccine will be available for all residents 6 months of age and older. This vaccine, which better protects against the new Omicron XBB variant, can be received by those who have not received a COVID-19 vaccine and those who have not received a COVID-19 vaccine within the last 6 months (168 days). Individuals who have been previously vaccinated but have had a COVID-19 infection recently are asked to wait 6 months after the infection, and at least 6 months after the last COVID-19 vaccine dose, to receive their fall dose.

"At this time, sub lineages of the XBB COVID-19 strain are circulating in the country with predictions that it will become the dominant strain this season. This means that the new XBB vaccine should provide an important update to people's current protection, even if they have previously had booster doses including the bivalent vaccine," says Dr. Thomas Piggott, Medical Officer of Health. "Those who are at higher risk for complications related to a COVID-19 infection are strongly advised to receive a booster dose with the XBB.1.5 formulation"

### Immunization Eligibility

Eligibility for the COVID-19 vaccine will align with eligibility for the Influenza vaccine.

First eligible group:

- Hospitalized individuals and hospital staff
- Long-Term Care Home and Elder Care Lodge residents, staff, and caregivers

Next eligible group:

- Individuals at high-risk for influenza and/or COVID-19 related complications or hospitalization:
  - Residents and staff of congregate living settings (e.g., chronic care facilities, retirement homes)
  - Pregnant individuals
  - Individuals ≥ 65 years of age
  - All children 6 months to 4 years of age [Influenza risk]
  - Individuals who are from a First Nation, Inuit or Métis community, and/or who self-identify as First Nation, Inuit, or Métis, and their household members
  - Individuals 6 months of age and older with underlying health conditions per NACI (Influenza & COVID-19)
  - Members of racialized and other equity deserving communities
- Health care workers and first responders

Final eligible group:

- Administration for the general public will begin as soon as supply permits.

While data has shown that the XBB.1.5 COVID-19 vaccine will provide a stronger immune response and greater protection this fall, individuals who wish to receive the bivalent BA.4/5 sooner should speak with their health care provider or local pharmacist who is administering the COVID-19 vaccine.

Throughout October and November, Peterborough Public Health will be holding community COVID-19 immunization clinics across the county and at our office. Residents who are eligible can book an appointment through the provincial vaccine booking centre call line at 1-833-943-3900 or online at [COVID-19 vaccines | ontario.ca](https://www.ontario.ca/covid-19-vaccines). Some PPH immunization clinics will be offering COVID-19 vaccines and Influenza vaccines. Additional information will be available on the provincial vaccine booking centre website. Many local pharmacies will be offering both COVID-19 and influenza vaccines this season. Please confirm with the pharmacy what vaccine types they have available. 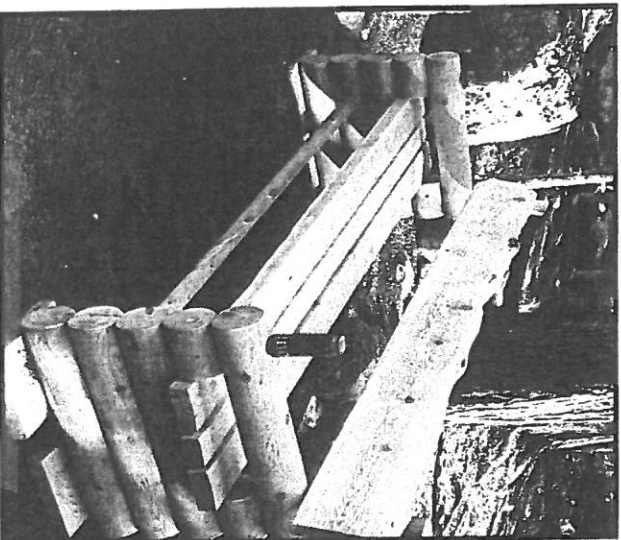
Pfizer XBB and Novavax XBB COVID 19 vaccines are still awaiting approval from Health Canada and are therefore not available at this time.

## Horse in Peterborough Region Tests Positive for Eastern Equine Encephalitis Virus (EEEV)

### Residents Reminded to Protect Themselves from Mosquito Bites

Peterborough Public Health (PPH) is reminding residents to protect themselves from mosquito bites following a positive horse case of Eastern Equine Encephalitis Virus (EEEV) in the Peterborough region, last week. This is the first equine case in our region and the sixth confirmed in Ontario this year.

EEEV is transmitted to horses through mosquito bites. Like West Nile Virus, EEEV can also be transmitted to humans through mosquitoes carrying the virus. It is important to note that humans cannot acquire the virus from horses or other humans, it is only the bite of an infected mosquito that can transmit the disease to humans. While human infection of EEEV is extremely rare, the symptoms can be severe and life threatening. The best way to prevent an infection of EEEV is to prevent mosquito bites.

#### Preventing Mosquito Bites:

- Wear long sleeved, light coloured clothing, or special clothing (e.g., clothing treated with permethrin) designed to protect you from bugs
- Use mesh screens and close routes of entry (e.g. windows, doors) to prevent mosquitoes from entering your home
- Stay indoors during dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are most active
- Use insect repellent containing DEET or icaardin
- Remove sources of stagnant/standing water from your property to prevent mosquito breeding

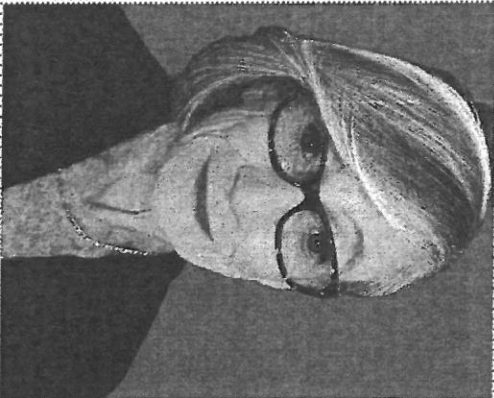

- Nearly 200 Peterborough Public Health septic inspections were completed in the Catchacoma area for Water Access Only properties. Inspection results for 2016 – 2022 are shown on page 2.
- In 2022, Trent Lakes diverted 61% of its waste, highest in the County and better than the County average of 54% management report.
- Trent Lakes disposes 185 kg of garbage per household vs. 311 kg average for the County. Go to: [Trent Lakes 2022 Waste Management Report.pdf](#) ([civicweb.net](http://civicweb.net))
- The Municipality is applying for a grant from the Rural Transit Fund to establish a "Mobility Hub" in Buckhorn to support alternative modes of transportation.
- The Municipality is exploring development of the Lakehurst Hall property as a trail head, performance space, and/or other use.
- Approval of the new County Official Plan (which will encompass Trent Lake, going forward) has been further delayed. Changes are being made to the Provincial Planning Statement, requiring revisions to our Official Plan. One good change will remove Trent Lakes from the Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe, recognizing the rural nature of Trent Lakes vs. the Greater Toronto area.
- A tender has been awarded to MWV Construction and Engineering Inc., and The Greer Galloway Group Inc. for construction of the shared Public Works / Recreation & Facilities Building on County Road 49; funding will be through a Construction Loan with Infrastructure Ontario.

- A comprehensive Communications Plan has been approved and is being implemented. Go to **DRAFT Communications Strategy**. The goals are to:

- Staff are directed to expedite the relocation of the cell tower at Flynn's Corners prior to lease expiration March 31, 2024.

## TOWN HALLS

The Mayor and I held Five Town Halls in June and July. These were informal, drop-in sessions (Thanks to Councillor Franzen who subbed in for one.) Locations were Galway Hall, Covenaidish Community Centre, Lakehurst Hall, Buckhorn Community Centre and Oak Shores Community Centre. Over 60 people came by to share concerns, ideas and even thank yous.

The topics most often raised were:

- Short Term Rentals
- Road Safety
- Waste Management
- Building & Planning

We addressed these directly at each session, and Staff has prepared an excellent status on each of these at: [Your concerns 2023](#)

- I will just touch on **Short Term Rentals** here, as this was the most vocal issue in every Town Hall. Go to <https://www.trentlakes.ca/en/government/short-term-rentals.aspx> The intent of municipal actions is to ensure a Safe and Incident-Free situation for residents and renters. Specifically:
- Ensure that traditional residential neighborhoods are not turned into tourist areas to the detriment of residents
  - Ensure any regulation of short-term rentals does not negatively affect property values
  - Ensure that homes are not turned into pseudo hotels or "party houses"
  - Minimize public safety risks and the noise, trash and parking problems often associated with short-term rentals
  - Give permanent residents the option to occasionally utilize their properties to generate extra income from short-term rentals

With the increased number of municipalities adopting STR control programs (including our neighbors to the north and west – Hailburton and City of Kawartha Lakes) we don't want Trent Lakes to be the "preferred" or "default" destination for investors and corporations who run STRs as commercial businesses or ghost hotels.

### Phases 1 and 2 of our 3 year strategy are now complete:

- Mailout of Good Neighbour Approach document.
- Tracked complaints/warning letters and reported repeat offenders.
- Implementation of an Administrative Monetary Penalty (AMPS) which includes new By-laws for Nuisance, Noise, Open-Air Burning, Fireworks and Hearing Officer. [AMPS \(civicweb.net\)](#)
- Hiring of Maxama for additional by-law enforcement for evenings and weekends on a three-month trial.

### Phase 3 (to be completed in 2024)

- Working Group reconvened with direction to create a draft Short Term Rental Licensing by-law for Council consideration in 2024.
- Consideration of budget and staffing resources required under licensing.

## SEPTIC PROGRAM

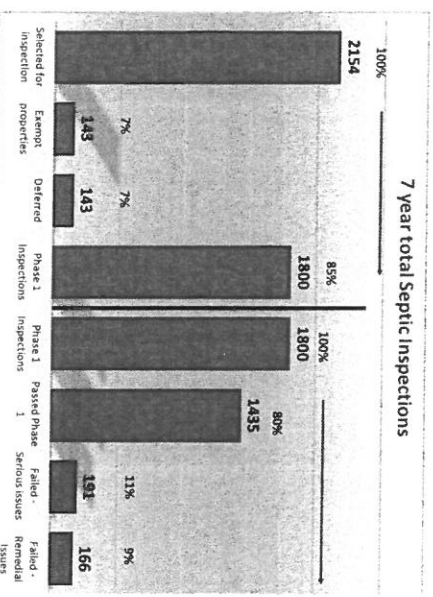
We have over 50 lakes and many rivers and watersheds in Trent Lakes. The two most important actions that ensure continued healthy water quality are maintaining a natural shoreline (to prevent erosion and filter runoff) and maintaining a properly operating septic system. Both are responsibilities of individual shoreline property owners. The Municipality has a role in supporting these actions through education, bylaws and inspection programs like septic inspection.

Two inspection programs are managed by Trent Lakes, and currently performed by Peterborough Public Health:

**Mandatory** – 64 properties in communities with Municipal water systems (Alpine Village, Pirates Glen, Buckhorn Lake Estates) inspected every 5 years

**Discretionary** – Up to 300 shoreline properties inspected every year – rotating locations throughout the municipality

WHY do we do this? In Ontario, 70% of on-site sewage systems aged 7-15 years are failing and 55% of these failures are related to poor maintenance and management\*



### Key Messages:

- 11% of Inspections reveal serious issues with septic systems and PPH follows up on their resolution
- 9% of Inspections reveal serious issues with septic systems and PPH follows up on their resolution

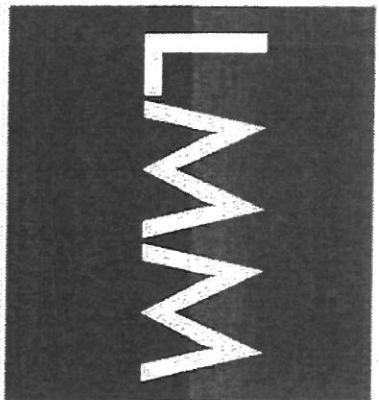
