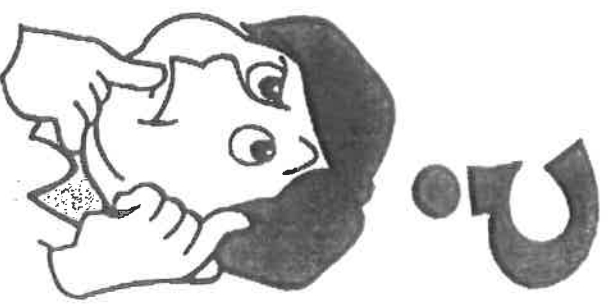

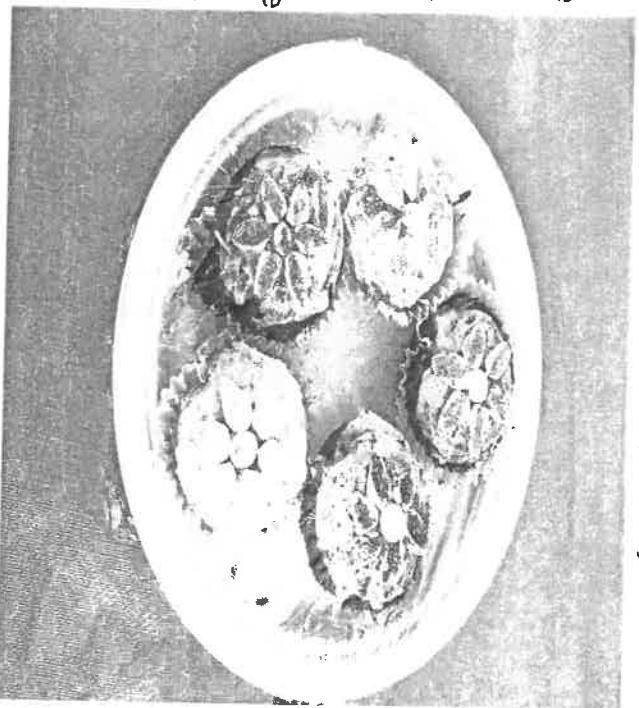
What's Happening at Carnival This Year?

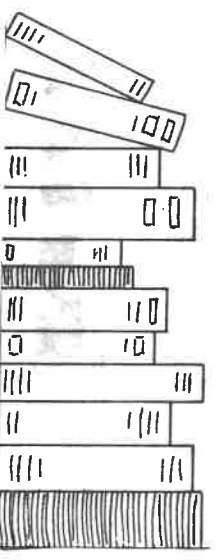

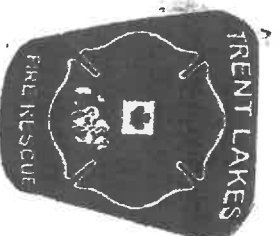

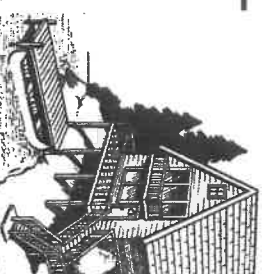
Apply for a Burn Permit

Are you planning on having an open air burn in Trent Lakes? If so, you must have a burn permit. Permits are free and they are valid until December 31st of the year you obtained it.

Key Messages:



- ✓ Just like your home, your cottage or cabin must have working smoke alarms on every storey and outside sleeping areas. It's the law. Pack a smoke alarm with fresh batteries when heading to a hunt camp or cabin.
- ✓ Clear brush and debris from around the structure. Make sure the roof is clean and there are no overhanging branches.
- ✓ Have all chimneys cleaned and inspected every year. Heating systems should be inspected annually by a qualified service technician.
- ✓ Check with the local municipal office or Ministry of Natural Resources for burning restrictions or bylaws.
- ✓ Allow the ashes from your woodstove or fireplace to cool before emptying them into a metal container with a tight-fitting lid. Store the container outside.
- ✓ Make sure the entrance to the property has a clearly visible sign indicating the property number.

Walking on roadways safely requires maximizing visibility and awareness: **use sidewalks when available, or walk facing traffic if not, allowing you to see oncoming vehicles.** Wear bright or reflective clothing, make eye contact with drivers before crossing, and avoid distractions like phones. Always cross at intersections or marked crosswalks. 🚶 Ontario Road Safety +5

Essential Pedestrian Safety Tips:

- **Walk Facing Traffic:** If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left side of the road facing oncoming traffic.
- **Be Visible:** Wear bright, light-coloured clothing in daylight and reflective materials at night.
- **Make Eye Contact:** Ensure drivers see you before crossing, especially at intersections or when stepping out from between parked cars.
- **Use Crosswalks:** Cross at marked crosswalks or intersections; avoid crossing mid-block, notes the NHTSA.
- **Be Predictable:** Follow traffic signals and walk on sidewalks, not the road, when they are available.
- **Avoid Distractions:** Do not use phones or wear headphones while crossing or walking near traffic.
- **Look Left-Right-Left:** Always check for traffic in all directions before crossing, including vehicles turning right on red.
- **Watch for Turning Vehicles:** Be aware of vehicles backing out of driveways or turning at intersections.

- Make eye contact, smile and wave
- Don't crowd other road users
- Do not impede the passage of others



- Look out for obstacles and others
- Vehicles turn your lights on
- Cyclists have required reflector lights

- Be prepared to stop
- Yield all ways crossing the road
- Stop and help turtles cross safely



Gardening Tips

- Harvest garlic and onions once the leaves turn yellow and start to flop over.
- Net strawberries as they start to ripen so that the birds don't get to them before you can enjoy them.
- Deadhead repeat-flowering roses and pick sweat peas regularly so that they will keep on flowering over the summer
- Once geraniums have finished flowering, cut them back to promote a flush of new foliage and floers
- water in the early morning or evenings to reduce water loss through evaporation.
- Trim evergreen hedges to keep them neat.

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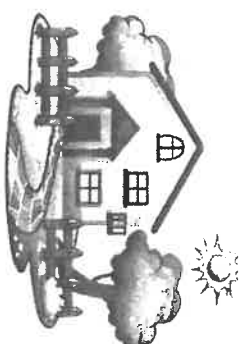

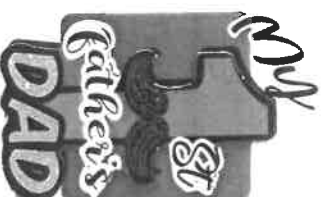

Recipe of the Month

Honey Celery Seed Dressing

Ingredients:

1 cup	Salad oil	1/4 tsp	Salt
1 tbsp	Lemon juice	1 tsp	Celery seed
1/3 cup	Vinegar	1 tsp	Paprika
1/3 cup	Honey	1 tsp	Dry mustard
2/3 cup	Sugar	1 tbsp	Onions, chopped (optional)

ABANDONED DOCKS INITIATIVE

Your dock has hosted more than its share of afternoon cocktails, launched a million cannon ballers and water-skiers, and rocked friends to sleep for sunburnt naps. It's time to upgrade to something new. But how to say good-bye?

Every year on our lake system, abandoned docks drift onto cottage properties or are dumped in back bays. Do the owners feel that "out of sight is out of mind", or that the dock will somehow revert back to nature? It's a simple "NO" on both counts. Dumping of docks on municipal, private, park, or crown land is not only illegal, but also poses environmental and navigational risks. And they are horrible eyesores.

Many older docks were constructed using unencapsulated foam floatation which has been banned in Ontario since 2021 (new construction or resale). These blue or pinkish foam bats break down into small pieces that litter the shoreline and cause untold damage to bird, wildlife and fish habitat and to lake health. Older docks may also have been treated with creosote or other wood preservatives that leach into the lake water once submerged. From a navigational standpoint, our fluctuating water levels can cause abandoned docks to break free and roam the lakes as serious boating hazards. This is especially noticeable this spring due to the high-water levels on our lake system from all the snowmelt and precipitation resulting in many docks floating about currently.

Any and all dumping – whether it's a dock, unloved paddleboat, deflated floaty, or even a beverage can tossed overboard is illegal. Fines range from \$300 to over \$10,000 depending on the item dumped and who is responsible for the land it lands on.

So – what to do? The Cavendish Community Ratepayers Association Inc. (CCRAI), are coordinating an abandoned dock initiative with the support of, and in collaboration with, all the local lake, cottage and road associations on the Catchacoma-Mississauga lake chain, the Municipality of Trent Lakes, Kawartha Highlands Signature Site Park, Curve Lake First Nations and the Ministries of the Environment, Conservation and Parks and Natural Resources. The goals of this initiative are to educate fellow cottagers on the proper disposal of unwanted docks, to conduct an initial shoreline cleanup of abandoned docks this spring and develop a plan to prevent future dumping.

This is step 1 – education. **Options for properly disposing of an unwanted dock:**

- Many dock construction companies will include disposal of your old dock (for a fee).
- If your dock is still sea-worthy, advertise on Facebook Marketplace or other online groups. Note that most of our lakes have their own Facebook page, and the "507 North of Flynn's- Good Neighbours " page covers off an even wider area.
- Repurpose the wood and other components in building projects.
- Offer the wood to local ATV or snowmobile trail associations, or to local marinas.
- Dismantle and take the whole shebang to the transfer station.

Regardless of what you do, remember that disposal of **your** dock is **your** responsibility. Tying it up in a back bay is not an option.

The Municipality of Trent Lakes is graciously providing funding for this initiative and the community at large is most grateful to our Municipal Council and Staff for their support on this project.

We come to these lakes for their natural beauty, clean water, and fantastic recreational opportunities. Let's do everything we can to work together to preserve that.

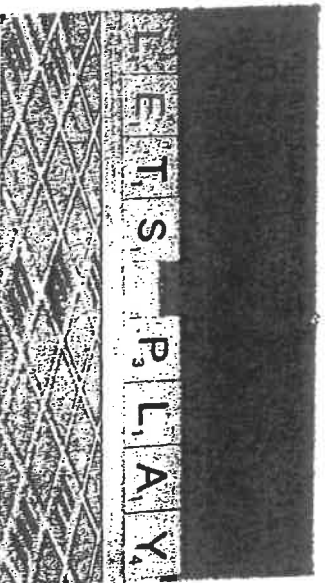

ANGLERS | Action Plan

When invasive species enter our waters, they can eat native species, out-compete them for food and habitat and introduce and spread disease.

Learn what you can do to stop them from taking over.

KNOW THE RULES

It's illegal to:

- Import, possess, deposit, release, transport, breed/grow, buy, sell, lease or trade prohibited invasive species in Ontario. If you catch one, you must destroy it right away so it can't reproduce or spread. Don't return it to the water.
- Stock fish into Ontario waters without a permit.
- Transport live fish over land (except baitfish) without a permit.
- Transport baitfish or leeches, whether live or dead, into or out of a Bait Management Zone, with limited exceptions.
- Introduce aquatic species to areas where they are not naturally found.

Sport fish transported over land must be dead and should be transported on ice, not in a livewell filled with water.

KNOW THE RULES FOR BAIT MANAGEMENT ZONES

As of January 1, 2022, Ontario is separated into four **Bait Management Zones** (BMZs).

BMZs limit the movement of baitfish and leeches between zones to help reduce the risk of anglers introducing invasive species or diseases.

KNOW YOUR FISHING HOLE

You can't use bait in some sensitive rivers and lakes. Visit **Fish ON-line** to learn if your favourite fishing spot is one of them.

NEVER DUMP YOUR BAIT INTO THE WATER OR ON THE ICE

It is illegal to deposit, or release into or within 30 metres of any waters (including onto the ice):

- live or dead bait or baitfish, including fish eggs, gametes or fish parts
- any water, soil or other materials you used to hold live or dead bait

FISHING WITH A BOAT

As of January 1, 2022, Ontario has regulated watercraft (boats) and watercraft equipment as a carrier of invasive species under the **Invasive Species Act**.

These rules help prevent the introduction and spread of aquatic invasive species in Ontario.

RINSE OUT YOUR LIVEWELL BEFORE TRAVELLING TO A NEW BODY OF WATER

Prevent the spread of fish-harming pathogens like Viral Hemorrhagic Septicemia (VHS) by cleaning your livewell with a 1:10 solution of bleach and water.

DON'T MOVE PROHIBITED INVASIVE SPECIES

It's illegal to import, possess, deposit, release, transport, breed/grow, buy, sell, lease or trade prohibited invasive species in Ontario. If you catch one, you must destroy it right away so it can't reproduce or spread. Don't return it to the water.

If you're boating in a body of water where prohibited invasive aquatic plants are found, avoid the infested area. You must also:

- avoid spreading these plants to another part of the body of water
- remove the plants from your boat, motor and trailer before travelling over land
- dispose of the plants so they won't end up back in the water

USE BAIT LAWFULLY

There are rules about the bait you can use and where you are allowed to transport bait in Ontario. For example:

1. Baitfish or leeches, whether live or dead, cannot be transported into or out of a BMZ, with some limited exceptions
2. You can only use crayfish in the same body of water you catch them in and can't transport them over land
3. Northern leopard frogs are the only species of frog that you can use as bait
4. Not all small fish or minnows are legal baitfish

Learn about the laws and rules of fishing with live bait and which species of baitfish you can use as live bait.

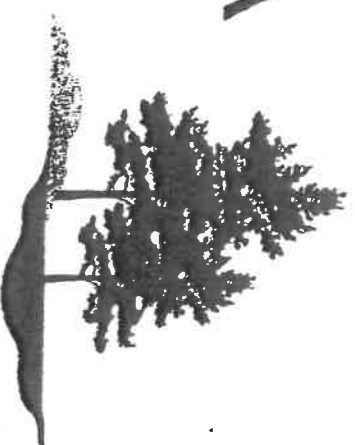

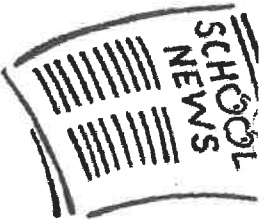

The End of another School Year – Congratulation All!

Tobacco, Electronic Cigarettes (Vaping), and Related Products

All members of the school and community must understand that:

- the Smoke-Free Ontario Act, 2017 prohibits smoking (tobacco and cannabis) and the use of electronic cigarettes (vaping) at schools, on school grounds, and all public areas within 20 metres of these grounds. Anyone smoking or vaping on school property is guilty of an offence and if convicted may result in a fine under the Smoke-Free Ontario Act, 2017,
- the Smoke-Free Ontario Act, 2017, includes an exemption for the traditional use of tobacco by Indigenous people for cultural and spiritual purposes. This means that Indigenous individuals are allowed to smoke or hold lit tobacco in places where it would normally be prohibited, as long as it's for traditional practices. This exemption is rooted in the recognition of Indigenous rights and cultures, acknowledging the significance of tobacco in various ceremonies and traditions,
- the Smoke-Free Ontario Act, 2017 also prohibits the sale and supply of tobacco or e-cigarettes to anyone under 19 years of age. Anyone who sells or supplies tobacco or an e-cigarette to a student under 19 years of age is guilty of an offence and if convicted may result in a fine under the Smoke-Free Ontario Act, 2017,
- smoking (tobacco and cannabis) and the use of electronic cigarettes (vaping) will not be accepted at school, on school grounds, on school buses and at any school related activities,
- at minimum, in the case of these substances being found in the possession of students, parents/guardians must be notified, and the student must forfeit the item(s) to an educator or administrator,
- if the student does not forfeit the item(s) above when required, they shall be addressed by school administration. Principals have discretion to consider a range of responses, using a bias-aware progressive discipline approach, to address such behaviour.

It's a Part of Our History

**Over the years, all the structural evidence of the past is now gone. It was eaten up by a forest fire which swept thru the area in 1913 – 1914

Prior to 1938

Willy Telford of Bridgenorth had hunted the Bottle Lake area for most of his entire lifetime. In fact when he and the rest of the gang hunted here, they would actually come and stay for a minimum of a month at a time. Willy was appointed by his hunting gang, to paddle back out to Catchacoma Lake every couple of weeks or so, to pick up any mail and supplies for the rest of the men. After spending so much of his life in this neck of the woods, he not only knew the country inside and out, but he had also heard lots of what had gone around these parts, in the past.

Willy had a great memory and told many a tale to his friends. Fred Ray, a young boy at the time, lived and grew up right across the road from Willy. Fred found this unique fellow quite interesting with all his tales of the woods, the waters, of the fish and game and of so many other things which had taken place here in times gone by.

Bear Wise: tips and tools

Outdoors

Bears do not like surprises. To avoid bear-human encounters while outdoors in bear country:

- travel in groups of two or more—people who travel alone are most vulnerable
- scan your surroundings and do not wear headphones
- watch for signs of bear activity such as tracks, claw marks on trees, flipped-over rocks or fresh bear droppings
- leash your dog—an uncontrolled, untrained dog may lead a bear to you
- pay attention, especially if you are working, gardening or berry picking
- rise slowly if you are in a crouched position so that you don't startle nearby bears
- avoid strong fragrances that may cause a bear to be curious, put any food you are carrying in sealed containers in your pack
- carry a whistle or air horn
- understand the use and limitations of bear spray and carry it where it's easy to access. Bear spray is highly effective at deterring bears at close range

When out camping

Bears are attracted to anything that looks or smells like food. Items like unwashed utensils, food packaging, toiletries and trash are tasty treats for bears. To avoid bear-human encounters:

- never cook, eat or store any food (including snacks), coolers, cooking equipment or toiletries in your tent
- pack and store these items in your vehicle, out of sight, with windows closed (not in a truck bed or outside of the vehicle)
- clean food preparation areas promptly after use
- routinely take your garbage to the park's waste depot

Backcountry camping

When backcountry camping away from a vehicle, store food properly so bears cannot access it. You should either:

- store food in a bear resistant location or container
- hang food and garbage at least four metres (13 feet) above the ground and three metres (10 feet) from tree limbs or trunks that can support a bear
- eliminate food odours from your campsite and wash dishes immediately after each meal
- burn any food scraps/fat drippings thoroughly in a hot fire

Boat wake can damage shorelines and wash out loons' nests. Keep enhanced wake activities (tubing and wake boarding) a considerable distance from shore. Be respectful of small craft on the lake. Watercraft can easily carry invasive species on trailers, motors, and gear—or in standing water like bait buckets, live wells, and bilges. When boats move between waterbodies, these species can spread and establish. Provinces, including Ontario, regulate watercraft as “carriers” of invasive species. Since January 2022, Ontario requires boaters to remove visible plants and debris and drain all water before transporting boats, vehicles and other gear over land.

- **Clean** the hull, rudder, and propeller with a brush.
- **Drain** the bilge, live wells, motor, and anything containing water.
- **Dry** for 2-7 days or disinfect with hot or pressurized water.

Clean any plants, mud, mussels or debris from your boat and equipment.
Drain all standing water from your bilge, motor and livewell.
Dry your boat for 2-7 days or disinfect it with hot or pressurized water.

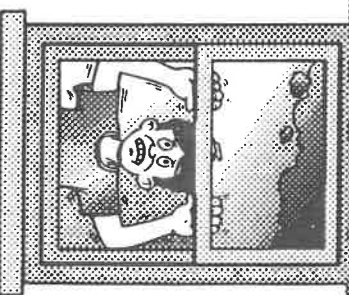

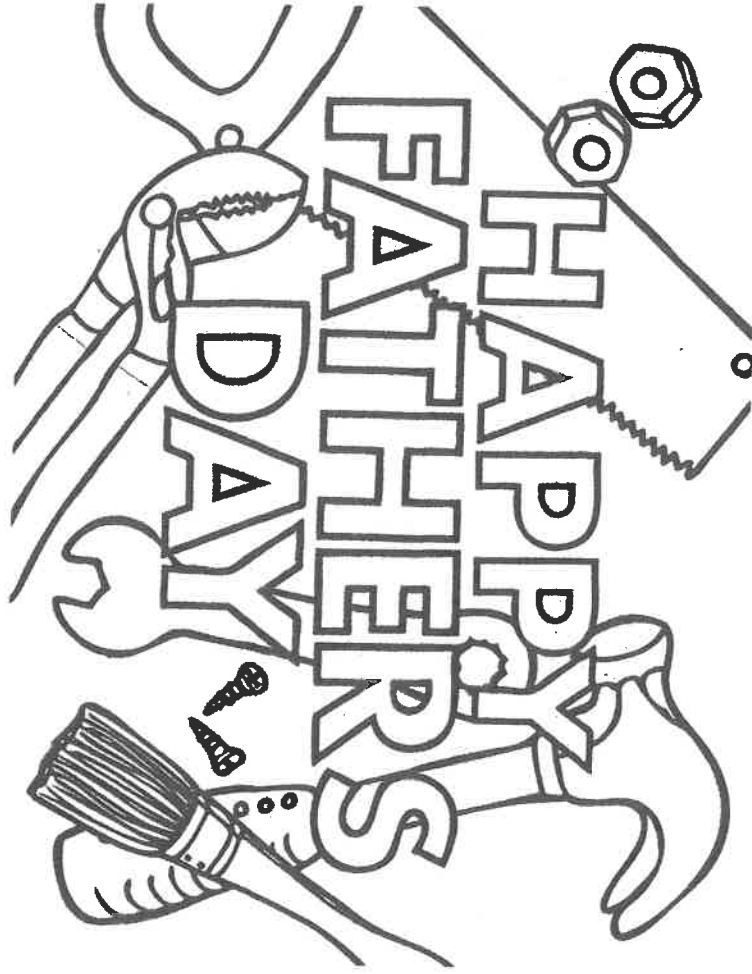
