First Influenza Case of the Season Confirmed

COVID-19 and Influenza Vaccine are Available for High-Risk Populations

Peterborough Public Health is reporting the first confirmed case of influenza (flu) in the region.

“Compared to previous years, this is an early case of flu in the region as we typically expect to see the flu pop up around November or December,” says Dr. Thomas Piggott, Medical Officer of Health. “But we have seen the season become earlier over the past 3 years with our first cases arriving before the vaccine does. Fortunately, the COVID-19 and flu vaccines should be available in local pharmacies next week for those who are at highest risk.”

The best prevention against COVID-19 and Influenza infections is to receive a vaccine this fall. Starting Monday, COVID-19 and flu vaccines will be available at some local pharmacies for [high-risk residents](#). Starting October 28, all residents 6 months of age and older will be eligible to receive the COVID-19 and Influenza vaccines.

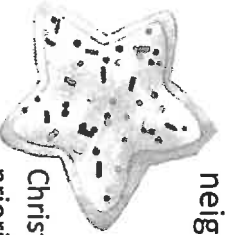
Halloween Pot Luck

Patients of Kawartha Endodontics Encouraged to Seek Testing for Bloodborne Infections

2019 Lapse at Kawartha Endodontics May Pose a Risk for Exposed Patients

Peterborough Public Health (PPH) is once more encouraging individuals who were patients of Kawartha Endodontics between January 1, 2017 and July 16, 2019 to consider being tested for blood-borne infections, as a precautionary measure.

In 2019, a serious lapse in infection prevention and control (IPAC) practices at Kawartha Endodontics was identified by PPH. Public Health Ontario conducted its own IPAC risk assessment and verified these findings. As IPAC lapses may pose a risk of transmission of blood-borne viruses and bacteria, Dr. Rita Kilislijan, the owner of Kawartha Endodontics, was ordered to provide contact information for patients who had received treatment between January 1, 2017 and July 16, 2019 so they could receive information on obtaining testing for blood-borne illnesses. This Order has been upheld by the Health Services Appeal and Review Board, the Superior Court of Justice and the Divisional Court. Both the Court of Appeal and the Supreme Court of Canada have declined to review the Order.

Yesterday, PPH was made aware that certain patients of Kawartha Endodontics have received the attached letter. The letter does not comply with the Order and contains information which is false and misleading. PPH is therefore alerting the public to this issue.

“Under Ministry of Health directives and protocols, patients have the right to be made aware of serious IPAC lapses in clinics such as Kawartha Endodontics. PPH is mandated to uphold these directives and protocols but, since 2019 and despite a further Court Order issued on August 16, 2024, Kawartha Endodontics has refused to provide the information needed to contact patients directly”, says Dr. Thomas Piggott, Medical Officer of Health and CEO of Peterborough Public Health. “Without proper notification, patients are left without the information they need to make informed decisions for their own health care”.

If you were a patient at the clinic and received treatment between January 1, 2017 and July 16, 2019, please visit Peterborough Public Health’s website at www.peterboroughpublichealth.ca/IPAClapseKawarthaEndodontics to download and print a copy of the patient letter for their health care provider and laboratory requisition. For the men who marched away.*

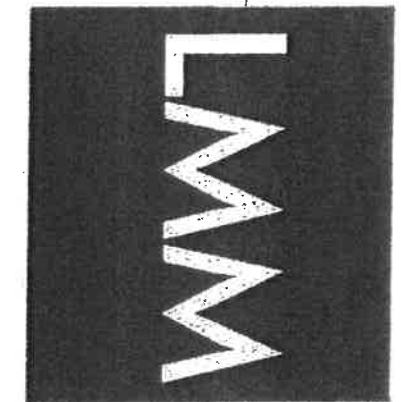
*But why have they chosen a poppy, Mummy?

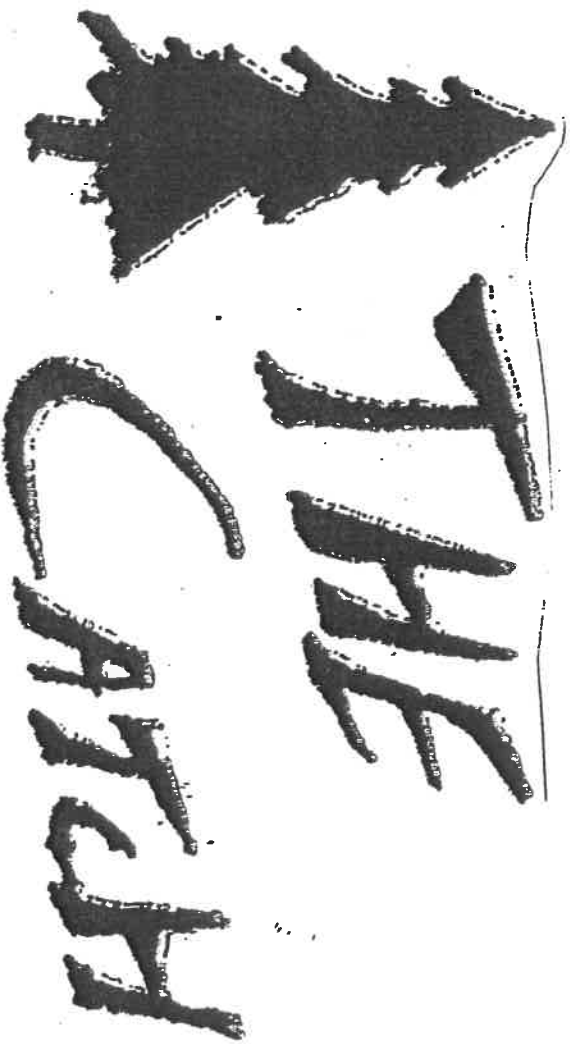

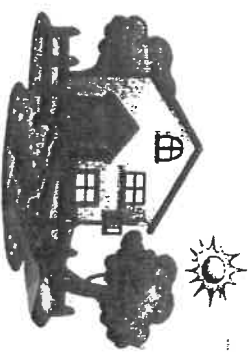

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- Out of cream rinse for your hair – try a little dab of fabric softener in a glass of warm water. It leaves your hair soft and snarl-free.
- Fleas will flee – brewer's yeast rubbed on your dog's coat prevents fleas.
- Dried seeds from melons, pumpkins or squash make great birdseed.

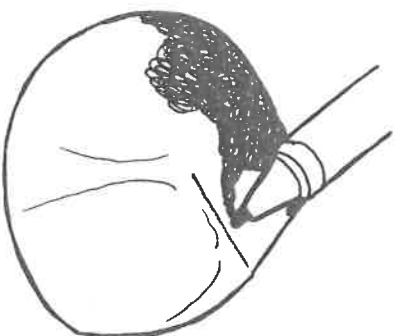
1. Cut an egg cup out of the carton. Trim it so it is smooth and straight all around.



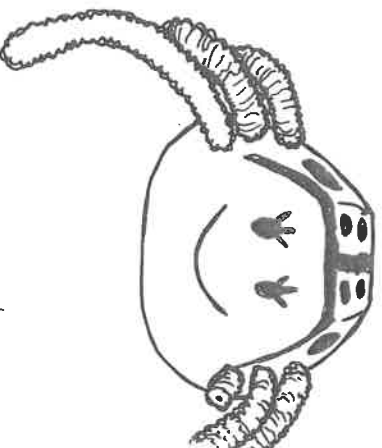
3. Draw or paint on a face, black spots and a line down the center of the ladybug's back.



2. Color or paint the egg cup red.

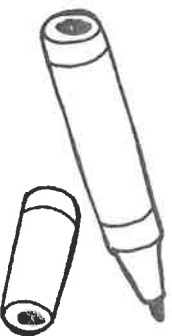

Recipe of the Month

HOMEMADE TACO SHELLS

1 1/2 cups cold water	1/4 tsp salt
1 cup all-purpose flour	1 egg
1/2 cup cornmeal	Vegetable oil

Heat an 8 inch skillet, over medium/low heat, just until hot. Grease skillet if necessary. Beat water, flour, cornmeal, salt and egg together, by hand, until smooth. Pour 1/4 to 1/3 cup of batter into skillet and immediately rotate skillet until batter forms very thin tortilla about 6 inches in diameter. Cook until dry around the edges, turn and cook other side until golden, about 2 minutes longer. Heat 1 inch of oil, in a 3 quart saucepan, to 375°F. Slide tortilla into oil. Fold in 1/2 with 2 forks or tongs and hold so that 1 inch remains between halves. Fry, turning occasionally, until crisp and golden brown; drain on paper towel. Yield: 1 dozen shells.



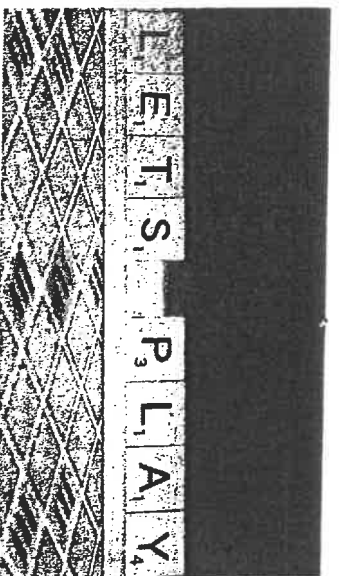

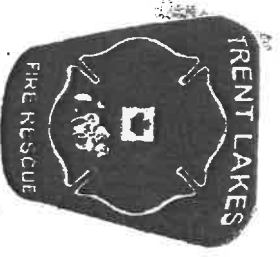

Heating safety

Stay safe while keeping warm. To prevent fires:

- ensure woodstoves, fireplaces and fireplace inserts are installed by a qualified technician according to the manufacturer's instructions
- have your heating system, vents and chimneys inspected and cleaned annually by a qualified service technician
- ensure all outside heating vents are not blocked
- let ashes from your woodstove or fireplace cool before emptying them into a metal container with a tight-fitting lid and keep the container outside
- always use a fire screen in front of a fireplace
- burn dry, well-seasoned wood in fireplaces and woodstoves to reduce the risk of excessive creosote build-up in chimneys
- keep space heaters at least one metre or three feet away from anything that can burn, including curtains, upholstery and clothing

In relation to heating and vehicle safety:

- replace worn or damaged electrical wires and connections on vehicles and extension cords and use the proper gauge extension cord for vehicle block heaters
- consider using approved timers for vehicle block heaters rather than leaving heaters on all night
- ensure that vehicles are not left running inside any garage or building

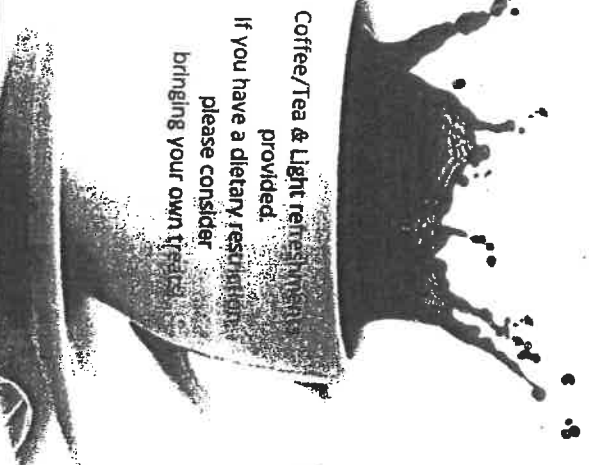

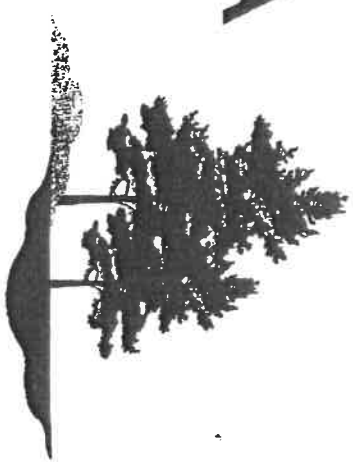

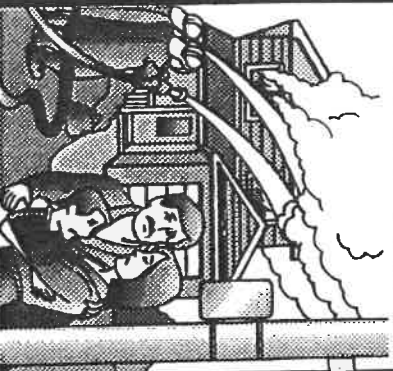
