### RASPBERRY PRETZEL


2 cups slightly crushed pretzels

1/3 cup sugar
8 oz Cool Whip

1 cup sugar 8 oz cream cheese 6 oz pkg raspberry Jello 3/4 cup boiling water 2 pkg frozen raspberries

- keep anything that burns a safe distance from the stove, including:
- oven mitts
- cooking utensils
- dishcloths
- o paper towels
- potholders



wear short or tight sleeves or roll sleeves up when cooking, to avoid loose-fitting clothes from catching fire on stove burners
